SUCCESSFUL TOUR OF N.S. AND P. E. I. IS BROUGHT TO A CLOSE BY THE CONSERVATIVE CHIEFTAIN

Summerside, July 29—Closing his two-days tour of Prince Edward Island "one of the bases of the Dominion," as he put it, Premier Meighen tonight spoke to a crowded hall.

It had been arranged that he should speak in the open, but a severe storm swept over the Island and the outdoor meeting had to be abandoned. For the first time in his tour, the Prime Minister met with comment from the back of the hall, but the comment was brief.

"The King Government did not reduce the tariff on automobiles. Are you surprised to hear me say that," Mr. Meighen asserted. "Yes," interrupted a voice, "you will be still more surprised when you hear me say that they did," Mr. Meighen shot back, and the crowd laughed.

Protection Restored.

He went on to say that the King government, by removing the luxury tax on Canadian-made cars, had restored the protection to manufacturers of automobiles in Canada, as it was before.

"Liberals say that prices of automobiles have been reduced," Mr. Meighen continued. "Of course they have been reduced. They have been reduced because the treasury loses the money. Every dollar saved by the buyer of a car is a dollar taken from the treasury."

If the treasury can afford it, all the better. But the King Government, while removing the luxury tax from Canadian-made cars, has increased the

sales tax on the poor men's clothes. When we were in power that sales tax was three per cent. Mr. Mackenzie King's Government raised it to six per cent. two years ago, they reduced it to five per cent., it stands now at five per cent.; the highest we ever had it was three per cent.

"These apostles of Liberalism reduced the tax on the rich man's car but increased the tax on the poor man's coat."

King's Reply.

"I see," Mr. Meighen continued, "that Mr. Mackenzie King, replying to this argument of mine which I have advanced asks why I did not move to reduce the tax on clothing. Mr. King says that if I had moved to reduce it he would have supported me."

"Think of a Prime Minister saying that he did not put legislation there because the Opposition did not move it. If that was right, what kind of a Prime Minister is he, that he did not introduce it? A private member of parliament or a leader of the Opposition cannot indicate legislation of that kind under the rules of parliament and the former Prime Minister knows it."

"The puerility of it all. Imagines the leader of a government saying that the reason he did not legislate was that the Opposition did not make him." At this the crowd broke into loud laughter.

THE POLITICAL CAMPAIGN IS WARMING UP

Lapointe Goes After Premier Meighen and Stevens Raps Hon. Mr. King.

Quebec, July 29—"I ask the Canadian Press to send my message to the Pacific Coast and I declare, blushing, that the Prime Minister of Canada is a coward."

So perorated Hon. Ernest Lapointe, ex-Minister of Justice to a large Liberal rally this evening in his honor. The declaration came at the end of a statement in which Mr. Lapointe heatedly denounced what he termed the "infamous story" concerning an alleged cruise of the customs steamer Margaret with which his name had been connected in the Maritime Provinces by A. J. Doucet, ex-M. P., speaking on the same platform as Premier Meighen.

Mr. Lapointe declared he had wired the Prime Minister asking that he repudiate the statement of Mr. Doucet and no reply had been received. "Mr. Meighen has just given the citizens of this country a despicable example. First, he hid behind the governor-general instead of shouldering the responsibility that is his for the violation of the constitutional charter of this country. And now he hides behind a slanderer to throw mud at an adversary that always met him in honorable combat," the ex-minister proceeded.

The meeting was presided over by Premier L. A. Taschereau of Quebec.

Hot Shot From Stevens.

Ottawa, July 29—In an open letter to the leader of the Liberal party, handed out this evening, Hon. H. H. Stevens, minister of customs, describes as "dastardly innuendo" certain remarks made by Rt. Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King in his Sarnia speech.

Mr. Stevens declared that Mr. King attempted in that speech "to fasten in the public mind the thought that I am personally responsible for the death of these 13 victims of alcoholic poisoning." He quotes extracts from Mr. King's speech as a basis for this declaration.

Mr. Stevens states that immediately after taking office he gave orders that not another ounce of denatured alcohol was to be released from any Canadian bond, and this order was being strictly observed.

Alcohol Distributed.

"Therefore," he continues, "if any of this poisonous alcohol is still to be obtained in the Dominion of Canada it is alcohol that you and your colleagues released on the people. And I may say that from the middle of December last up to your inglorious exit from office your government distributed over 175,000 gallons of this poisonous concoction for beverage purposes."

A FILM STAR PASSES AWAY

Boston, July 30—Willard Louis, noted screen star, died at his home after a brief illness. Death was superinduced by pneumonia following an attack of typhoid fever.

Born at Woodfield, Me., 40 years ago Louis had been in pictures for 12 years. The major part of his career was spent in heavy roles, but when he demonstrated his ability as a comedian in "Beau Brummell," he immediately was assigned to comedy parts rapidly mounting the ladder of screen fame. Since he has starred in a number of Warner Brother productions and has been recognized as one of the screen's leading comedians.

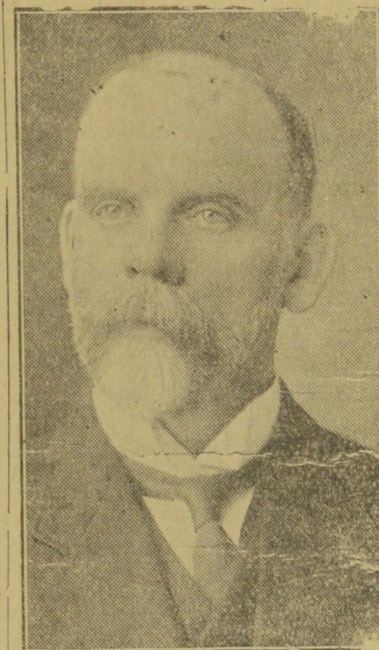

A car collided with a buggy on the highway bridge last night the top being smashed off the carriage.

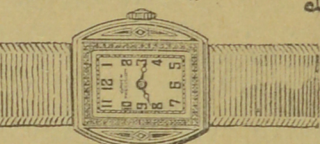
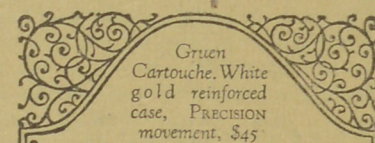

A CHAMPION FRUIT PACKER

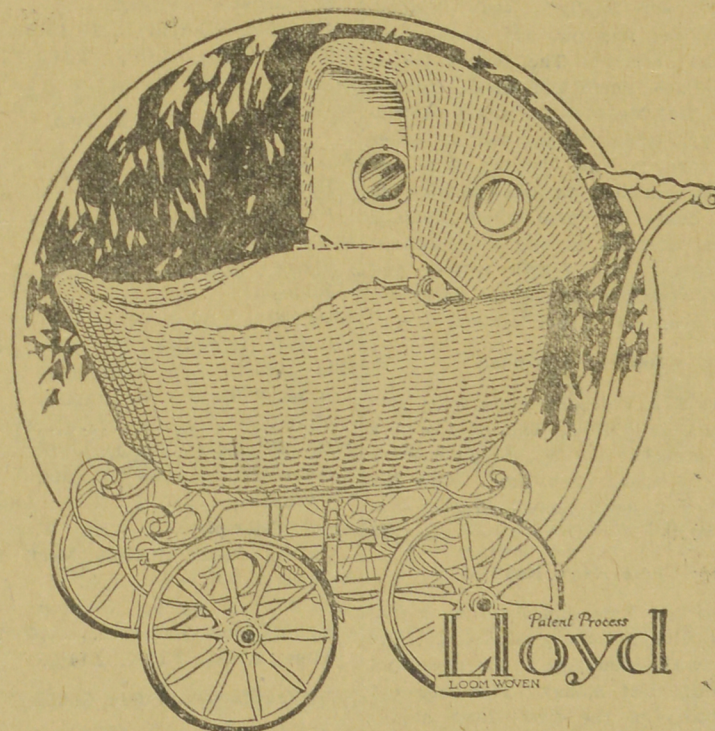
