

RACE CROWD WELL BEHAVED, CARS IN SWARMS

Million Dollars Worth of Motors Here Yesterday — Wilmot Park Presented a Remarkable Motor Display.

Thursday's big crowd for the second day of the Midsummer Race Meet was well behaved and everything went off smoothly. There was no disorder and the police report no trouble. Considering the large number of outside cars which were here traffic conditions were excellent. An American car and a local car bumped at the intersection of York and Queen streets but little damage resulted.

Million Dollars in Cars.

It is estimated that taking locally owned cars and those which came here from outside places particularly Maine and other towns in New Brunswick, about a million dollars in cars were represented here yesterday. Wilmot Park which was used for parking presented a remarkable appearance. The usual parking arrangements were in effect and the park was about half covered by motor vehicles. It was noticeable that the overwhelming majority of them were large expensive cars.

Arrangements Appreciated.

The visitors greatly appreciated the parking arrangements which allowed them to leave their cars within a few yards of the race track. The influx of visitors meant much money put in circulation in the city as each motor party would spend freely. The hotels were overtaxed and many residents placed their homes at the disposal of the hotel managements for the letting of rooms.

The Canadian Legion Festival which was operated at the Officers' Square, for a third night was well patronized with Americans being prominent.

The race meeting from every point of view was a pronounced success.

Died in Lowell, Mass.

Relatives in Marysville today received word of the death in Lowell, Mass., of Harry M. Arnold formerly of Marysville. The deceased located in the United States some twelve years ago. He was aged about forty years and had suffered from heart trouble for some time. A widow belonging to Lowell and one child survive. The deceased was a son of the late James Arnold and was well known throughout this part of the Province. Surviving are three brothers and one sister, Lloyd Arnold of Saint John, Frank Arnold of Marysville, Lorenzo Arnold of the same town and Mrs. Frank Stothard of Lowell, Mass. Interment will be made at Lowell.

FIFTH REMAND FOR JAMES DALY AS BIGAMIST

Case Likely to Get Down to Trial Next Week—Difficult to Secure Information.

James Daly again appeared in the police court this morning on a charge of bigamy and again was given a remand. The remand this time is until Tuesday next, August 3rd. The remand was given at the request of the prosecution which desired additional time for securing evidence. This remand is the fifth which has been given in this case the accused having been in custody for about a month on the charge of making a bigamous marriage, the complainant being Margaret E. Morton of Marysville with whom he went through a form of marriage in Devon some years ago. Three of the remands were at the request of the defence.

J. B. Dickson appeared for the accused and R. W. McLellan appeared for the complainant, P. J. Hughes, K. C., being away.

Hearing Next Week.

Hearing in the case is to take place next week it is expected. Both sides have been seeking information concerning Daly in Worcester, Mass where his relatives reside. There has not been any great amount of information forthcoming. A brother of Daly is said to be a constable. It is understood that he may be produced as a witness.

Proving the first marriage and also the alleged divorce which Daly says he secured in the United States will be important parts of the case.
