LOSSES PILED UP LIKE A BIG SNOWBALL

(Toronto Globe.)

"Just like a snowball rolling down hill, the losses got bigger all the time." Thus did Percy F. Ham, Ontario Government employee in the Land Titles Office now in custody at Toronto Jail, describe his experiences in the Toronto bond market when he spent an hour in the office of Crown Attorney Armour with Chief of Detectives George Guthrie, at the City Hall, last Saturday morning.

Began in Stock Market.

His troubles began, he said, in the stock market, a few years ago, but he transferred his first losses to the bond market, and they grew and grew until they assumed the proportions of the \$300,000 figure specified in the charges upon which he is now held at the jail. There are four charges, each of forgery and uttering notes, and one of attempting suicide.

Ham declared he had no confederates and out of the whole long list of transactions, involving hundreds of thousands of dollars, not a dollar remains.

Ham will appear again in the Police Court on Thursday, but his counsel, W. K. Murphy, said last night that the defense would not be ready to go on for at least another week. No effort was made yesterday to obtain bail for Ham. Mr. Murphy, during the afternoon, had a conference with G. F. McFarland, the prisoner's solicitor.

BIG SUM IN TRADE LOST IN BRITISH STRIKE

London June 17—How the nine day general strike beginning on May 4, hit British trade is revealed in the board of trade returns for May published today. They disclose that as compared with the like month last year the value of exports decreased by nearly £18,500,000 and imports by more than £23,000,000.

Coal, with nearly a £3,500,000 loss was responsible for a large proportion of the decrease in exports but the textile and manufacturing industries also were hard hit. In this category the chief decreases were in cotton goods, with more than £5,500,000; machinery, nearly £250,000; worsted yarns, more than £1,000,000, and iron, and steel more than £1,000,000.

The record for imports shows decreases under most heads, but the rubber importation registered an advance of more than £1,000,000 presumably due to the demand arising from the expansion of motor service during the strike. The returns further show that in the first five months of this year, as compared with the corresponding period of last year this country's exports fell by more than £45,500,000 and the imports by more than £61,000,000.

Of Interest to the Women

CEREAL MUFFINS.

1 cup cold boiled cereal or left over cereal
2 cups flour
6 level teaspoons baking powder
1 teaspoon sugar
2 tablespoons melted butter or margarine
1 cup milk
2 eggs
1 teaspoon salt

Put the cereal and milk into bowl; stir until smooth then add the well beaten eggs and melted butter; then sift the flour baking powder sugar and salt into mixture; mix lightly. Brush hot muffin pans with melted fat or oil; fill half full with batter and place in hot oven; bake 25 to 30 minutes.

CORNMEAL GEMS.

1 cup cornmeal
1 cup flour
1 cup cold milk
1 cup boiling milk
1 egg
2 tablespoons melted butter or margarine
2 tablespoons sugar
1 teaspoon salt
4 level teaspoons baking powder

Put the cornmeal into bowl; add the boiling milk, in which the butter has been melted and beat well. Let cool then add the cold milk and well beaten egg, salt and sugar. Sift the baking powder and flour; add slowly and mix lightly. Have muffin or popover irons very hot and well greased; fill half full of batter put in hot oven and bake 25 to 30 minutes. Cream of wheat can be used the same way.

CORNMEAL GRIDDLE CAKES.

1 cup cornmeal
1-2 cup flour
1 cup boiling milk
1 egg
1-2 teaspoon melted butter
2 teaspoons molasses
Put the cornmeal into bowl; pour over the boiling milk add the salt butter and molasses; when cold, add the flour and baking powder, sifted together and the well beaten egg; mix well. Bake on hot well greased griddle using a small amount of butter for each cake. If the batter is too thick add more milk.

OATMEAL COOKIES.

1 cup sugar
1-2 cup shortening
1-2 cup seeded raisins cut fine
1 egg
1-4 cup milk
1 cup oatmeal
1 cup flour
2 teaspoons baking powder
1-2 teaspoon salt
Cream the sugar and shortening until light; add the well beaten egg milk oatmeal and raisins; mix well then add the sifted flour and baking powder salt and mix well. Brush bakesheet with melted fat; dust with flour and then with a teaspoon drop the dough leaving room to spread. Sprinkle top with a little cinnamon if desired.

STRAWBERRY FANNY.

One cup fine ripe strawberries 1 cup sugar and white of 1 egg. Crush berries add sugar and egg white, beat with a wire whip until stiff. Into stemmed glasses put a ladleful of ice cream and cover with strawberry whip. Decorate with whole ripe berries and serve with small cakes.

PINEAPPLE SPONGE PIE.

Beat yolks 2 eggs and add 7-8 cup sugar, grating of lemon rind 1 teaspoon lemon juice and 1 1-3 cup canned shredded pineapple. Fold in stiffly beaten egg whites, turn into pie plate lined with paste and bake until firm in center.

Delicious Round Steak.

Cut 2 lbs. round steak in pieces rolling each piece in flour, salt and fry until brown. Then put it in a roaster, cover with 1 can of vegetable soup and roast until meat is tender.

HOUSEWIVES FORM A UNION IN ENGLAND

London, June 17—In the opinion of Mrs. C. C. Peel, it is absurd that the largest profession for women—housewifery—is entirely without any union. Therefore the British Housewives Association of which she is the chairman has been formed with the purpose of urging co-operation among women for better domestic service and cleaner methods of handling food.

"The truth of the matter," says Mrs. Peel "is that all housewifery has come to be despised. We desire to overcome that and to use our influence to bring down the prices of meat and bread."

Mrs. Peel says she does not object to women going out of the house to work, but she is of the belief that generally women are happier in their own homes bringing up the children.

EVENING DRESS IS RESTORED IN LONDON

London, June 17—Evening dress is recovering from the wounds it received during the Great War. The manager of Covent Garden, the home of opera in England, has announced it is obligatory for evening dress to be worn in the boxes, orchestra stalls and dress-circle seats. In the years immediately following the war the tuxedo walked in where before only evening dress had dared to tread. Worse than that, even "plus fours" were seen there. In King Edward's reign no opera-goer would have dared to enter the portals of Covent Garden in anything but evening dress.
