DIED TODAY IN
SAINT JOHN

Had Been in Ill-health
For Some Time—Tak-
en Away For Treat-
ment—Well Known in
City.

William F. Grace a well known resident of Fredericton died at Saint John early this morning in his fifty-fifth year. The deceased had been in failing health for some time and a few days ago went to Saint John for treatment. He was a native of Fredericton, a son of the late Henry Grace, and has resided here through out his lifetime. He was in business as a barber in Regent street and had a circle of acquaintances as wide as the Province and beyond. Some months ago Mr. Grace was struck by a car in Devon and sustained injury.

Supporter of Sport.

Throughout his life he was a strong supporter of baseball and other sport and in the days of the famous Tartar Baseball Club in this city almost thirty years ago was closely connected with the organiza- tion. The deceased was a Forester and a Prentice Boy and had mem- bership in other orders.

Surviving are his widow one son, two daughters, four sisters and five brothers. Walter H. Grace of this city is a son and Mrs. E. N. Landry of New Jersey and Miss Helen Grace at home are daughters.
