

U. S. GIRL TRIES TO SWIM CHANNEL

SCARE HEAD CAMPAIGN IN MEXICO

Juarez City Claims Land Long Under U. S. Control.

AMERICAN FLAG PLANTED
The Disputed Territory is Inhabited by Mexicans.

Mexico City, Aug. 3.—The afternoon paper "El Imparcial" has begun a scare head campaign over the disputed border territory of St. Laurens, a seventy acre section of river land claimed by the City Council of Juarez, but long under American control.

"The United States has planted her flag on a plot of Mexican territory" the paper told its readers.

The area in question is inhabited chiefly by Mexicans, but according to American lawyers rightfully belongs to the United States.

BIG SALMON WAS WOUNDED BY A SPEAR

It is quite evident that salmon spearing, supposed to have become a lost art, has been revived on the Saint John River. On Sunday some boys playing near the West End bathing beach saw a large salmon moving slowly in the shallow water close to the shore. They secured it without difficulty, and noticed that it had a wound in its head evidently made by a spear. The supposition is that the fish was struck with a spear at some point up river and being unable in its wounded condition to make headway against the current had drifted back, and on reaching the bathing beach had worked its way in shore. It is evident from the nature of the mark on the fish that a single pointed spear such as is used by the Indians when spearing bass, was made to do duty in this case. Salmon spearing can only be carried on with the aid of a torch and it ought not to be difficult for the fishery guardians on a river like the Saint John to put a stop to it. The Chapel bar, located near the Indian Village and also the Grand Pass used to be favorite spearing grounds in the old days. The salmon is one of the most intelligent of fish and hardly likely to work injury to themselves by bumping into a protruding spike.

Egg Laying Contest

The birds taking part in the egg laying contest at the Experimental Station increased their production last week as compared with the previous week. The total was 878 eggs which means a yield of 62.7 per cent. The pen of A. D. Fournes of Moncton led with 58 eggs, with those of A. T. Read of Rollingdam and Fred H. Ferguson of Fredericton in second place with 55 each. W. E. B. Tait's pen produced 52. Bird No. 2 in Mr. Ferguson's pen continues to do splendid work. This bird has laid 77 eggs without a break, and has only missed once in thirteen weeks.

AN ARCH PRIEST IN MEXICO IS SUSPENDED

He Tried to Provoke a Schism Among the Catholics.

ORDER FROM ARCHBISHOP

Disobeyed a Collective Pastor Letter Forbidding Services.

Mexico City, Aug. 3.—Maurice Jacobo Calvo, arch priest attached to the basilica of Guadalupe, has been suspended from his position by Archbishop Moray DeL. Rio, for an attempt to provoke a schism among Catholics at Villa Guadalupe, making an effort to renew religious services in disobedience to the collective pastoral letter calling for the abandonment of churches.

Angel Vivanco, a prominent Catholic at Villa Guadalupe began the attempt it is understood, influencing Calvo and three canons who were also suspended to join him. The catholic townspeople opposed the move. The suspension was urged by Estaban Soto Russ, president of the court of honor of the knights of St. Mary of Guadalupe.

BIG TIME AT GRAND FALLS NEXT TUESDAY

Grand Falls, Aug. 3.—Extensive preparations are being made for the celebration on August 10th to mark the beginning of the development of the great water power here. Although the celebration falls on the first anniversary of the provincial election, which resulted in a change of government it will be entirely non-political. A number of prominent men of all shades of politics are expected to take part in the great event. A special train from St. John will bring hundreds of people from that city and intervening points and thousands are expected to arrive by auto from both sides of the international boundary. Tuesday of next week promises to be a gala day in the history of Grand Falls.

AN AMERICAN GIRL IS HEROINE OF THE LONDON PRESS TODAY

Miss Clarabelle Barrett, of New York Made Gallant Attempt to Swim the English Channel—Was Handicapped by Fog—Gave Up the Attempt When Two Miles From the French Coast.

DOVER, England, Aug. 3.—Exhausted after swimming more than 21 hours through the English Channel, Miss Clarabelle Barrett, 31 year old New York swimmer, abandoned her swim when two miles from the French coast at Cape Greis Nes at 5.40 this morning.

The actual time in the water was 21 hours and 40 minutes. She covered between 35 and 40 miles, which experts declared a marvellous feat. The American woman was beaten by fog, against which she had fought for 12 hours. Her time in the water and distance covered indicated, swimmers here believed, that she would have won and been the first woman to swim the channel, if it had not been for the handicap of the fog. The swimmer was nearly hit by a Boulogne-Folkstone mail boat about 8 o'clock last night and was badly frightened.

Called a Heroine

London, Eng., Aug. 3.—Clarabelle Barrett, was the heroine of the London Press today. The paper's headline the story of Miss Barrett's attempt to swim the English Channel "As Woman's Great Swim", "Woman's Great Fight in the Channel".

The stories commented on the fact that Miss Barrett was crying with disappointment as she stepped ashore at Dover.

FIVE LOCAL STUDENTS IN FIRST DIVISION OF PASS LIST OF MATRICULATION

Miss Catherine C. Jones the Leading Fredericton High School Student — Saint John Students Make Particularly Good Showing—Donald Blake Fraser of Saint John High Leading Student.

Candidates who took Matriculation and High School Leaving examinations were notified of their marks some days ago and today the list of First and Second Divisions as furnished by the Department of Education is published.

Of twenty-eight candidates in First Division in matriculation five are from Fredericton High School which is officially Fredericton Grammar School. All are girls. Miss Catherine C. Jones who leads her school and is in twelfth position in the list is a daughter of Dr. C. C. Jones, Chancellor of the University of New Brunswick. Jane S. Clayton, second from her school and fifteenth in the list is a niece of the late Thomas S. Wilkinson, Margaret A. Scott third from her school and twenty-third in the list is a daughter of J. M. Scott, M. L. A., Louise M. Sterling fourth from her school and twenty-fourth in the list is a daughter of Dr. A. Sterling. Doris M. Saunders fifth from her school and twenty-fifth in the list is a daughter of the late Sterling Saunders.

Fredericton High School has twenty-six in Second Division in the Matriculation List and five in Second Division in the High School Leaving List.

The report of the Matriculation Board of Examiners shows that there were 356 who wrote the Matriculation, and 95 who wrote the High School Leaving Examinations.

Of the Matriculation candidates 28 passed in first division; 154 in the second division; 78 in the third

division, 80 in the third division conditionally and 9 failed.

Of the Leaving Candidates 1 passed in first division; 41 in the second division; 13 in the third division; 31 in the third division conditionally and 9 failed.

Pass Standards.

Pass Standard is for first division 75 per cent. of aggregate marks obtainable with not less than 50 per cent. of the possible marks in each subject. For Second Division 50 per cent. of the possible aggregate marks with not less than one third of the possible marks in each subject.

TRIPLE TRAGEDY IS REPORTED FROM MICHIGAN

Father, Daughter and Grandchild Were the Victims.

A NOTE WAS LEFT BEHIND

Girl Hanged Herself and Parent Used Same Rope.

Adrian, Mich., Aug. 3.—The authorities today were investigating the apparent double suicide of John Boyer, 58 and his daughter, 25 and the slaying of his six year old grand child.

Entering Boyer's home late yesterday at the request of a neighbor, Sheriff A. T. Wilson found the three bodies and note written by Boyer saying his daughter had hanged herself Sunday and that he had cut the body down and used the same rope to hang himself.

No mention was made in the note of the child, which had been killed by strangulation.

A YOUNG BOY WAS BURNED AT THE STAKE

George Cannac, Aged 9, Victim of His Play-fellows.

WERE PLAYING INDIAN GAME

Companions Fled in Terror When the Fire Started.

Whiting, Ind., Aug. 3.—George Cannac, aged nine, is dead the victim of his playfellows who "burned him at the stake." He died before rescuers could reach him.

The group of playmates decided upon George as the captive to be burned in the "Indian Pageant" he was tied to a stake, but the fire wouldn't light so someone poured turpentine on the wood at his feet and burned his clothing. He was in flames a moment later.

Policemen were unable to learn the names of his companions, who fled screaming when the fire started.
