### SOME NEW THEORIES.

Benito Mussolini, Italy's dictator, believes nations will follow the example of the Fascisti. "Liberty or death was a fine phrase," says he, "but co-operation or poverty is more accurate now."

Italy has its Mussolini, Spain its De-Rivera, Poland its Pilsudski, Portugal its Gen. Carmona, Hungary its Horthy, Russia its triumvirate, even little Belgium has made its King dictator, while France's latest cabinet proves little more than a committee of public safety, and in Turkey there is Kemal Pasha. These are Europe's "iron men." Great Britain and Germany, of the great European nations, preserve their constitutional governments.

"Fascism replaces individual sovereignty by state sovereignty, the nation for the individual," reads Mussolini's latest dictum. So have conceptions of government changed in the welter of political complexities following the chaos of the war. Strong men with minority control seek to restore tranquility and prosperity by stern measures. In doing so they advance new theories of government. But what comes after them?

### OUT OF TOUCH.

Some churches are so interested in fine music, fine furniture, expensive buildings, solemn ritual and beautiful ceremonies that they have lost touch with life as it is. This is no plea for putting motion pictures and free shows in churches. But a church ought not to be so highfaluting that ordinary folks, like the most of us always will be, do not feel at home there. Leaving a New York church for one in a smaller town, Dr. Tertius Van Dyke said in his parting sermon:

"A church must never become an exclusive little club, shut off from the bitter needs of a troubled and lost world. That would be putting the church above the purpose for which it exists."

As was forecasted last week ex-Premier Veniot has accepted nomination as the Liberal candidate in Gloucester, replacing Mr. John G. Robichaud, who has represented the county for several years. The ex-Premier's acceptance of the nomination means his retirement from the provincial field in which he had been conspicuous for some years past. Last session while acting as leader of the provincial opposition he intimated that he did not propose remaining long in public life. It was then thought that he would be appointed to the International Waterways Commission, but during the flare up at Ottawa his claims were overlooked. Now he is a candidate for Ottawa which practically means that he has taken over the Federal leadership in New Brunswick. The ex-Premier is a vigorous campaigner and will no doubt carry on a stiff fight on the North Shore.

Whether or not ex-Premier Veniot is elected in Gloucester in the Federal election the indications are that he is out of provincial politics for good. He was first elected to the Legislature in 1894 but dropped out a few years later to become Collector of Customs at Bathurst. In 1917 he was reelected and joined the Foster Government in that year as Minister of Public Works. He took over the Premiership in 1923 and on appealing to the country last year his government was defeated. During the last session he acted as leader of the opposition. His successor will likely be Hon. A. A. Dysart, a former speaker.

In speaking before the Maritime Royal Commission at Saint John yesterday Premier Baxter strongly urged that the Valley Railway be taken over by the Federal Government. He explained that the road had been built by the provincial government to remedy a defect and had cost to date over \$8,000,000 and was operated by the C. N. R. at an annual loss to the province of \$260,000. Premier Baxter is determined that this road shall be taken over by the Federal authorities and should the Meighen administration be sustained at the polls, it will be taken over or Premier Baxter will know the reason why.

Mr. A. J. Doucet the fighting member for Kent in the last House, was unanimously renominated at a Conservative convention at Rexton yesterday. Mr. Doucet was first elected at a by-

election in 1925, and was reelected in October last by an increased majority. Being one of very few French speaking members sitting on the Conservative side his services proved invaluable to his party at Ottawa. He served on the Customs Investigating Committee, and last week accompanied Premier Meighen on his tour of the Maritime Provinces.

Some plain talk setting forth the ills of New Brunswick as a partner in Confederation was indulged in by Premier Baxter, Mr. J. D. McKenna and others before the Maritime Royal Commission at Saint John yesterday. They not only talked plainly but what they said was all truth, and there was not the slightest tinge of partisanship in their statements. The able presentation of the case for this province by Premier Baxter, must have made a profound impression on the members of the Commission.

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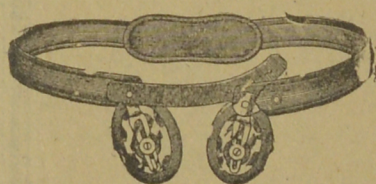
