Marysville's pinch-hitters, who were sent into the game at the last minute Monday night at Devon saved them from a shut-out by the Devon team, but their rally was stopped after they had scored five runs. For five innings Johnson Keene had held the visitors to one lone hit, and his team-mates had piled up ten runs.

Umpire Brewer let the game go into darkness, and the Marysville batters hit Keene freely in the sixth and with four costly errors helped Marysville to save themselves from the worse trimming in the league this year. Up to that it had looked like a shutout.

Both teams played ragged ball in the field, four of Marysville's errors coming in the first frame when Devon scored five runs. Devon found their batting eye in the fifth however and by hard hitting scored four more.

The Play.
Four errors, a stolen base, a base on balls and Malloy's two-base hit netted Devon five runs in the opening inning.

One run was added in the fourth. E. Miles shot a single into right field and went to second on a passed ball. Brother Henry sacrificed him to third, and he scored on Estey's bad throw to first on Rutter's grounder.

In the fifth session from four singles, a base on balls, a sacrifice hit and a two-base wallop by Lawrence netted Devon four runs and put the game on ice.

Marysville Came To.
The sixth inning opened with darkness closing in and Marysville ten runs behind and nothing in the

score column. Marysville put in all the relief batting material they had on the bench, and at one time E. Macpherson was piling up sweaters right and left. Minue the first batter was thrown out at first by Keene Dougherty hitting for Mike White struck out. Stewart batting for L. Macpherson singled and both J. Watson and Irvine fumbled the ball and Stewart held up at third. Cochrane was sent to the plate for Estey and singled scoring Stewart. Amos Macpherson was given a free pass. Rutter dropped Hodgson's fly and Cochrane scored. Earle Macpherson and Hodgson came in. Rutter picked up Bailey's drive and threw high to first and E. Macpherson trotted home with the last Marysville run. H. White ended the inning by flying out to E. Miles.

Owing to an error L. White's batting average was omitted from the list published Saturday. White's average up to July 31st was 45 times at bat, 10 hits with a percentage of .222.
