THE SCHOOL BONDS.

The law committee of the Legislature does not view with favor the proposal of the City School Board to use the vocational grant for capital expenditure instead of placing it in a sinking fund as was originally the intention. The whole trouble seems to be due to the fact that the bond issue of \$150,000 was insufficient to provide for the cost of the new High School building. This might as well be acknowledged and provision made for another bond issue to cover the additional capital expenditure which may or may not have been necessary. The original bond issue of \$150,000 is for a period of twenty-five years, to be retired serially, and the extra issue could be retired ten or fifteen years later. There is no reason why some of the cost of the new high school building should not be passed along to be next generation. It may be too late now to secure the necessary legislation this session but it should be attended to next year.

THE INCOME TAX.

The reduction in income taxes by the Federal Government is quite a substantial one and should add to the peace of mind of many people. A man in receipt of a salary of \$3500 a year who has been paying \$60 will now contribute only \$10. A county court judge with a salary of \$5000, formerly paid \$126 but will now pay \$50. A Supreme Court judge with a salary of \$9000, has been paying \$505 will now pay \$220. A person in receipt of a salary of \$50,000 a year formerly paid \$9,649 but will now be let off with \$8300. The million dollar salary man used to pay a tax of \$696,349.50, but under the change in the law he is now called upon to pay only \$453,660. The change will apply to the 1925 taxes, providing it is approved by Parliament before April 30th, but with so many M. P.'s and senators having a personal interest in the matter there is not likely to be any unnecessary delay.

FOLLOWING CUSTOM.




