AMERICAN PRO GOLFERS OVERWHELMED

The British Team Played with Remarkable Brilliance—The Score Stood 13½ to 1½, Two Days.

Wentworth, Eng., June 6—Overwhelmed in a riot of magic golf, the United States team of ten professionals, captained by Walter Hagen was vanquished 13½ to 1½ points in the two-day matches against British professionals headed by Ted Ray in the competition for the Ryder Cup.

Of the five foursomes played Friday and ten singles contested yesterday at Wentworth, the United States won one solitary match. Bill Melhorn defeating Archie Compston, while Emmett French managed to Halve with Ernest Whitcombe thanks to a masterly finish. But in every other contest the British players scored heavily.

The route which began with the foursomes and continued uninterruptedly in the singles over the hills and valleys of this picturesque course left Hagen's warriors strewn over greens so far distant from the clubhouse that it was with great difficulty they re-assembled for the speech-making ceremonies of Ambassador Houghton.

Never in history of international golf matches between Great Britain and the United States has the United States taken such a drubbing. Only one United States player was ever up on his opponent and only two matches reached the home green.

In the foursomes played Friday, Great Britain won all five matches.

British Play Superb.

It is conceded that the play of the British team throughout was superb and if it can be duplicated in the British open championships a fortnight hence the Old Country will win. In the foursomes Mitchell and Duncan severely punished Barnes and Hagen and what they did collectively Friday they repeated individually yesterday. Mitchell was miraculous and the only consolation for "Long Jim" Barnes is that in all probability no man could have stood up against the British star and won.

BILL MISKE'S WIDOW SINGS ON THE STAGE

Minneapolis Minn., June 6—A woman's contralto voice is to substitute for the big fists of "Billy" Miske, heavyweight boxer, who died two years ago as the bread winner for three of the boxer's children.

Miske died nearly penniless after heavy losses of his prize ring winnings in investments. Immediately Mrs. Miske began training the voice. She appeared here last night in her first recital and received an ovation.

Miske met Jack Dempsey heavyweight champion three times—boxing the last unsuccessful battle despite a long illness in an effort to relieve his financial losses.

W. E. STERLING HERE IN WEEK-END RE REGISTRATION

Says Local Suspended Players Have a Good Chance for Reinstatement — York County League to Register.

During the week-end W. E. Stirling of Saint John and Mr. Cleary of the same city held a conference here with officials of the recently organized York County Amateur Baseball League, relative to the registration of the players of the three teams in order that the winning team may be qualified to enter into a playoff for the Provincial and Maritime titles. Representatives of Fredericton, Devon and Marysville teams were in attendance.

The registration of the players is expected to be completed promptly. A number of local ball players including Kierstead, Davis and Donovan and Wheeler have not been in good amateur standing for some time but Mr. Stirling said that he had no doubt that application, with the required forms properly filled out, would result in reinstatement and the issue of cards.

There also was discussion with regard to softball players. The M. P. B. would like to have this game organized also in the event of a playoff for Provincial or Maritime titles. The G. W. V. A. league being a house-league would not be concerned but the Industrial league would be. It is likely to be approached in the matter. C. R. Hawkins is local representative of the M. P. B. and the conference was held in his office.

SCHOOL SPORT MAY HAVE ITS OWN ASSOC.

Saint John, June 6—An association to handle interscholastic sport entirely in this province is being fostered now by W. E. Stirling, New Brunswick vice-president of the M. P. B., and something of a definite nature is expected at meeting of school teachers in Fredericton the latter part of this month. Interscholastic sport is developing gradually throughout the province and it is the desire of Mr. Stirling to see the development placed on a well-nigh perfect basis. In fact, there are few countries in Canada that can show a better record.

With this as guide, it is expected to interest the school teachers in healthy, organized sport and thereby develop a morale and school spirit otherwise lacking. C. B. Burden of the Provincial High School staff, Fredericton, is associated with Mr. Stirling in the work and is scheduled to bring the matter before the Teachers' convention. Mr. Stirling is to confer with Mr. Burden at Fredericton.

In the doubles, paired with Charles Watson, Yale captain he won two victories to enter the finals. In their first doubles they won over Buckingham and Hoffman of Bridgeport 6-0, 6-4 and in the second doubles they defeated Frank Smith of Waterbury and A. Merriam of Farmington, Conn.

A. H. Chapin of Springfield, Mass., won three singles matches to enter the final round with Tilden. The feature of his play was his hard fought victory over Charles Watson of Yale who gave him a close battle throughout and forced him to 11-9 to win the second set.
