

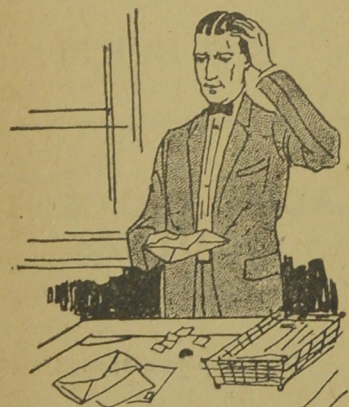

LISTING FARM HOUSES AND PRIVATE HOMES FOR TOURISTS

As a result of the extensive advertising campaign which has been, and at the present time is being, carried on by the Canadian National Railways throughout the United States and Canada, along with the efforts of the various Tourist Associations and Publicity Bureaux, it is expected that a large number of tourists will visit the Maritime Provinces during the coming season, which will tax the combined hotel and resort facilities to their utmost. But there would appear to be an almost unexploited field of opportunity as regards farm houses and private homes of the Provinces in which vacationists would be welcomed as paying guests, that may, with advantage, be opened up, and which will bring in visitors who, for some reason or another, are not attracted to hotel and resort accommodation. It is essential, of course, that such places be equipped with reasonable sanitary conveniences.

To have available a reserve of tourist accommodation and to provide for this class of visitor, your co-operation is asked and any of those who may be desirous of accommodating paying guests this season are requested to send in to the General Passenger Department of the Canadian National Railways at Moncton, N. B., their names, with Post Office address and information as to rates per day and per week, number of persons that can be accommodated, distance from railway station and mode of conveyance from and to railway station with rates charged therefor, whether room and meals or room only can be furnished, and particulars as to any exceptionally attractive features in the district, such as boating, bathing, fishing, golf or tennis and the like. This information will be listed and kept available for the information of prospective visitors.

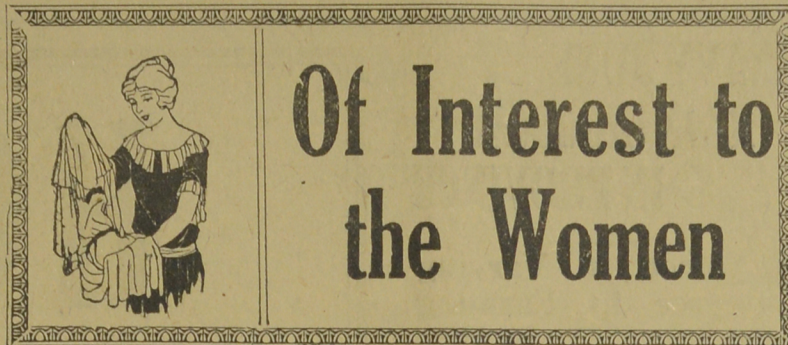

Rhubarb-Raisin Conserve.

5 pounds rhubarb
5 pounds sugar
2 pounds raisins
2 lemons (juice)

Cut rhubarb in small pieces; add raisins (seedless) and lemon juice. Cover with sugar and let stand overnight. In the morning boil gently for 1-2 hours or until thick.

Rhubarb is apt to stick so we suggest that you stir it from the bottom occasionally.

DAISY SALAD.

4 hard boiled eggs
1-2 cup French dressing
2 cups shredded lettuce

Cut the eggs in half the long way, remove the yolks. Cut the whites in narrow strips; mash the yolks through strainer. Put a little lettuce on each plate and about a teaspoon of the yellow yolk in centre and arrange the pieces of white around the yellow so as to make it look like a daisy. Serve with French dressing. The dressing should have a little grated onion in it.

Cup Custard With Maple Syrup.

1 quart milk
4 eggs
1-4 teaspoon salt
1-8 cup maple syrup
1 teaspoon butter
flavoring to taste

Beat the eggs and syrup until well mixed; add the milk and salt; mix well. Brush custard cups with butter pour in pan of warm water. Put cups in pan of warm water. Put into oven and bake twenty minutes or until you can put a silver knife in centre and remove it dry. Set in cold place and serve with maple syrup.

Layer Cake With Butterscotch Filling.

1-3 cup shortening
1 cup sugar
2 eggs
1-2 cup milk

2 cups flour
3 level teaspoons baking powder
flavoring to taste

Rub the shortening and sugar together until creamy. Separate the eggs and add the well beaten yolks and milk very slowly to the sugar. Sift the flour and baking powder together; then add the well beaten whites of eggs. Bake in two large jelly or layer pans on paper 20 minutes. The time depends much on one's oven.

CHEESE BISCUIT.

3 cups flour
3 teaspoons baking powder
1 teaspoon salt
1 cup grated American cheese
3-4 cup milk
1-2 teaspoon paprika

Sift flour baking powder and salt into bowl, add the cheese and mix very lightly; add the milk. Roll out on floured board 1-2 inch thick cut with small biscuit cutter; brush the tops with milk. Sprinkle with a little grated cheese and dust with paprika. Put into hot oven and bake 15 to 20 minutes.
