Maritime Electric Plant Annoyances Again Subject Discussed by City Council

Legal Action to Compel Abatement of Subject of Complaint to Be Taken if City Solicitor So Decides — Proposal to Light Hospital From Pumping Station—Other City Business.

The City Council on Tuesday night combined the committee meeting and the Council meeting in one and disposed of a considerable amount of business in quick time. Chief among the items discussed was the complaint of residents of King's Ward concerning the noise and vibration caused by blowers and other apparatus at the plant of The Maritime Electric Co., Shore street, to which it was alleged the company had not given a satisfactory reply. Ald. Goodspeed and Ald. Currier moved for legal action to compel an abatement of the annoyance but Ald. Thompson and Ald. Davidson took the position that action should not be precipitate and that the opinion of the City Solicitor should govern it. The motion was amended as to meet the views of the objectors and was passed in its later form.

The Council also decided to have the Street Light Committee investigate the proposal to have Victoria Hospital lighted by surplus power from the pumping station of the city's water system. The Street Lighting Committee will report on the proposal. The same committee is to act in the matter of placing the standard-lights about the Canadian Legion grounds in commission, the Legion agreeing to maintain them after installation, and also will extend its activities to include the lights about the New Brunswick Liquor Commission's property if possible.

Members in attendance were Ald. Ross, Ald. McKnight, Ald. Currier, Ald. Goodspeed, Ald. Davidson, Ald. Thompson and Ald. Richards. On motion Ald. Ross performed the duties of chairman.

Municipal Home.

For the Municipal Home committee, Ald. Currier in the absence of Ald. Smith, reported a total expenditure of \$291.53 of which \$105 was for Outside Relief and \$186.53 at the Home. A cheque for \$600 in favor of the Commissioner was ordered to issue the increased amount being necessary to pay for coal.

For the Finance Committee Ald. Thompson reported on tax collections as follows:—

Request of Legion.

Charles L. Dougherty and C. Robert Hawkins appeared as a delegation from the Fredericton Branch, Canadian Legion, and asked that the electric lamps on standards about the margin of the branch's grounds be placed in condition for operation. Repairs were estimated to cost \$600 and lighting for three hours per night practically every night of the year, \$150 per annum.

Ald. Currier moved that \$600 be voted to make the necessary repairs on condition that the Canadian Legion take over the lights and operate them.

In amendment Ald. Thompson moved that the Street Light Committee be requested to investigate the matter of putting the lights about the N. B. Liquor Commission's premises in commission also.

The alderman stated that the merchants of that part of Queen street

should be given as much consideration as those farther east. If \$600 were the estimate for the lights about the Canadian Legion, \$1,200 should be enough for both pieces of work. The amendment was adopted.

Other Items.

The City Hall committee was authorized to make necessary repairs to the roof of the City Hall.

C. L. Sypher by communication drew attention to the fact that no action had been taken on the requested extension of the water system to New Maryland road and Albert street.

The communication was referred to the Water Committee.

E. B. Yerxa by communication drew attention to the fact that city employees had broken a bridge belonging to him which crossed the so-called "back drain". He requested that the city rebuild the bridge or reimburse him for so doing.

This was referred to the Roads and Streets Committee.

On the motion of Ald. Davidson the request of Miss Sweeney that a dangerous tree near her property at the intersection of Saint John and Brunswick Streets, receive attention, was referred to the Roads and Streets Committee.

Maritime Electric Plant.

Ald. Goodspeed moved that the special committee which had investigated the complaint against the Maritime Electric Co., by residents in King's Ward, be instructed to take legal action to compel the company to do away with cause of the noise and vibration complained of.

The alderman said that he had visited the locality and knew that the residents had just cause of complaint. There also was a smoke nuisance which ought to be dealt with as it was an injury to one of the city's best residential sections.

Ald. Currier seconded the motion. He said that the City Solicitor had informed the company of the decision of the city. A letter in reply had stated that a noise-proof room would be built to reduce the noise of the blowers. No statement was made concerning the vibration.

Objection to Motion.

Ald. Thompson expressed the opinion that the attitude intimated by the motion was too pugnacious. He would prefer an opinion of the City Solicitor before any such motion were passed.

Ald. Davidson supported the view of Ald. Thompson. It seemed to him that the motion was giving advice to the City Solicitor rather than taking advice from him.

Ald. Currier said there was no inclination to instruct the City Solicitor. He was going to exercise his right as an alderman to represent the views of the people of his ward. He had no doubt of the city having a case if the blowers were continued. Ald. Thompson had said the attitude was pugnacious. It could be no more pugnacious than that of Vice-president Donaldson of New York who said that if all the people of Fredericton petitioned the blowers would be continued.

Ald. Davidson repeated his objection. The statement of Mr. Donaldson indicated that he considered the company had a good case. He had referred to the date on the chimney—1850.

Ald. Currier said the blowers were not there in 1850. They were not necessary in the time of the late Supt. White. There was no intention of pro-

ceeding unless on the advice of the City Solicitor.

Both Sides Satisfied.

Ald. Goodspeed changed his motion to meet the objection of Ald. Thompson and Ald. Davidson and the motion was carried.

Hospital Lighting.

Ald. Goodspeed also brought up the matter of lighting Victoria Public Hospital from the surplus power of the pumping plant of the city's water system. He referred to the recent break in the lighting service on a Sunday night and the inconvenience which easily could be caused at the hospital by such an accident. It had been estimated that the city streets could be lighted by the surplus power at the pumping plant and the hospital easily could be accommodated. At present \$2,000 a year was spent by the hospital on lighting. The proposition was that the Maritime Electric Co. be used as a standby thus providing a dual system. City Engineer MacKay and Prof. A. F. Baird both said the proposal was feasible.

He moved that special committee be appointed to confer with the Hospital Board.

Ald. Richards asked if the Maritime Electric Co. might not object to such an arrangement.

Ald. Goodspeed said that the company already had been approached and was ready to accept the proposition at a "ready to serve" rate.

It finally was decided to have the Street Lighting Committee investigate the proposal.

ADDRESSED A BIG MEETING AT MONTREAL

Montreal, Sept. 6—The greatest crowd which he has faced in the campaign of 1926 greeted Rt. Hon. MacKenzie King here tonight. Nearly twelve thousand rose to their feet when the first cheering announced the arrival of the Liberal leader.

For an hour the assembly had been welcoming popular senators and candidates as they appeared, by intermittent cheering. Mr. King, accompanied by Senator Dandurand, Hon. P. J. A. Cardin, Hon. J. G. A. Robb and Mayor Martin was preceded through the throng by a squad of city police. As the applause melted the crowd took the singing of "Il a Gagne ses Epaulettes."

Mr. King speaking into a battery of seven microphones, said, "I am sure that your presence here is not so much a personal tribute as it is a desire on your part to express appreciation and support of those Liberal policies instituted by Sir Wilfrid Laurier."

Mr. King prefaced his remarks by a few words in French.



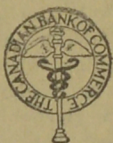
