

## NO EVIDENCE OF ROT IN THE POTATO BELT

Woodstock, N. B., Sept. 7—Although it was admitted that the heavy rains experienced during the past few days, if followed by warm, muggy weather, might have the effect of precipitating rot in potatoes remaining undug, C. W. Clark, Woodstock prominent potato dealer expressed the opinion here, tonight, that so far, there is no evidence of rot in the Carleton county potato area.

Referring to potatoes that have already been dug in Carleton county, Mr. Clark stated that the yield reported from various sources ran all the way from 70 to 100 barrels to the acre, a yield which on the whole measures up equal to the crop of 1925.

Potatoes already dug, generally are free from rot of good quality and well matured Mr. Clark stated.

## WOMAN GOLF PRO MAKES HER DEBUT

London, Sept. 8—The first woman golf professional in England, and perhaps in the world, was brought to light today with publication of an advertisement reading:

"Young girl desires post as golf professional; good player and coach; has been with well known professional eighteen months."

It developed that she was Miss Sophie Seymour, sister of Mark Seymour pro at the St. Leonard's Club, Hastings, and a cousin of Abe Mitchell. She has for more than a year been learning how to make and repair clubs. Seymour says she has done St. Leonard's course in 79 or better and has a virtually flawless style.

## CANDIDATES LINED UP IN THE DIFFERENT CONSTITUENCIES; ONLY ONE SEAT GOES BY DEFAULT

Ottawa, Sept. 7—The battle lines of the opposing political parties were drawn closer to one another at official nominations today; and, with one exception, contests will be waged on September 14 for every seat in the Federal Parliament. The exception is Provencher, Manitoba where A. L. Beaubien, Liberal-Progressive was elected by acclamation at the advance nominations held last week in 27 constituencies of wide area and inaccessibility.

Featured by the large number of triangle figures, final nominations today for the other 219 seats brought the total number of candidates to 528. Of this number 235 are Conservatives, 199 Liberals, 20 Progressives, 21 Liberal-Progressives, 12 U. F. A., 23 Independents and 18 Laborites.

All the ministers in the Meighen government and the former ministers in the late King administration who are running face straight party fights with the exception of Hon. H. H. Stevens minister of customs, and Hon. J. H. King, former minister of public works. Mr. Stevens is opposed in Vancouver Center by a Liberal and a Laborite, while in Kootenay East, a Conservative and a Laborite are running against Dr. King.

Thirty triangular contests will be held, while 212 straight party fights and two quadrangular battles will be fought.

### 132 Nominees in Quebec.

Montreal, Sept. 7—With the filing today of nomination papers for 132 candidates in the province of Quebec the curtain ascended in the last act of the election play. Added to the three constituencies in which nominations had already been held, Pontiac Gaspé and Charlevoix-Saguenay, the figure representing the total number of candidates in Quebec reaches 138. In 58 ridings there are straight party contests, except in Port Neuf where Simeon Delsile, the former Liberal member is opposed by Armand Marcotte, who runs as an Independent-Liberal.

### Independent Liberals.

Six divisions will see triangular fights. In four of these the Liberal former member is being opposed by an Independent-Liberal in addition to a Conservative; in one Labelle, the former Independent member Henri Bourassa is fighting a "Protectionist" and a straight Conservative, while in Quebec-South the triangle is made up of one Liberal and two Conservatives one of the latter running as an Independent.

### Triangular Battle.

In one constituency the Cartier division, of Montreal, the battle is quadrangular, S. W. Jacobs, the ex-member, facing an opposition comprising Louis Wolfe, (Conservative), Paul Parent (Independent-Liberal) and Michel Buhay, (Socialist).

The four Quebec ministers are contesting seats in which they have previously run, Hon. George Perley soliciting the suffrages of Argenteuil Hon. E. L. Patenaude, Jacques Cartier, Hon. Andre Fauteux, Bagot and Hon. E. Paquet, Bonaventure.

### In Argenteuil.

Last October Sir George Perley was victorious in Argenteuil by a majority of 200; Hon. Mr. Patenaude was defeated in Jacques Cartier by 1,870; Hon. Mr. Fauteux was defeated in Bagot by 774 but in the by election rendered necessary by the death of the member-elect, Joseph Marcell, Mr. Fauteux had reduced the majority in December to 479. Hon. Mr. Paquet was defeated in Bonaventure by 529.

Last October nine constituencies returned their victors by less than 1,000 votes. Of these the Conservatives had three and the Liberals 6. Those who went to the Conservatives were St. Lawrence-St. George, Argenteuil and St. Antoine, while those in which Liberals were elected by less than the millennial number were Montmagny, St. Ann, Wright, Yamaska, Bagot and Bonaventure.

In all other seats the elected candidates enjoyed majorities or pluralities running into the thousands, the highest being that of Hochelaga which returned E. C. St. Pere by 10,000 and the next Mount Royal which returned a Conservative, R. S. White, by 9,248.

### 176 Stand in Ontario.

Toronto, Sept. 7—One hundred and sixty-six candidates are officially nominated to contest Ontario's 82 seats in the House of Commons.

In 75 constituencies today nominations brought to completion the lineup throughout the province. The other seven had staged nominations

a week ago, on account of their wide area and inaccessibility.

Ten constituencies show three-cornered contests—Bruce North, Bruce South, Middlesex East, Port Arthur-Thunder Bay, Renfrew North and South, Toronto East-Centre, North East, North-West and West Centre.

The only other constituency in which there is not a straight fight is in Prescott, where Gustav Evan-tural, former Liberal member, is opposed by three others officially nominated this afternoon—a Conservative and two Independent-Liberals.

### Two Women Opposed.

Miss Agnes MacPhail, first woman member of the House of Commons, was again officially nominated in Grey South East as a Progressive.

The only other woman candidate in the Dominion is Miss Kathleen Bennett, officially nominated as a Liberal in Toronto East. Miss MacPhail is opposed by R. T. Edwards, Conservative and Miss Bennett by Hon. E. B. Ryckman, Conservative minister.

A feature of the official Ontario lineup is the contest in South York between W. F. McLean, dean of the House, and Conservative representative for the riding for many years and R. H. MacGregor. Mr. MacGregor is the nominee of the riding Conservative Association, while Mr. McLean is campaigning this time as an Independent-Conservative, having failed to secure the party nomination. There is no other candidate in the constituency.

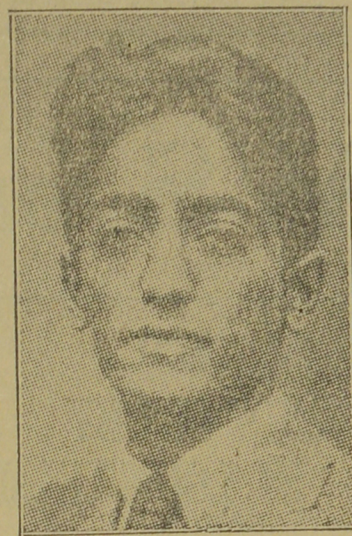
The bride entered the church on the arm of her father the wedding march being played by the organist. She was given in marriage by her father and during the signing of the register the choir sang.

## FIFTY-TWO PER CENT FLAGG DEAD

New York, Sept. 8—Jared Flagg, once known as "52 per cent" Flagg whose financial schemes and under world connections brought him frequently to the attention of the police has made his last explanation to authorities.

While being questioned in the office of the state bureau for the prevention of frauds Thursday, Flagg suddenly crumpled in his chair and slipped to the floor, dying from heart disease. He was 72.

Flagg son of an Episcopal clergyman first gained notoriety when he was tried and sentenced to 30 days in the tohms for the rental of "Flagg's Flatts" to members of the underworld.

In 1907 he opened a broker's office with a "sure way of beating Wall street," guaranteeing one per cent a week profit, "no matter which way the market goes" to those who invested with him. His 18 months sentence to Atlanta was finally set aside.

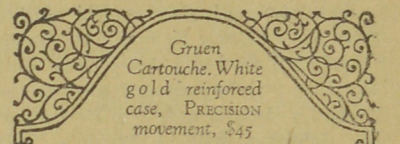
