CAMPAIGN
OPENS TONIGHT IN
YORK-SUNBURY

Two Liberal Candidates
at Minto — R. B. Han-
son at Nashwaaksis—
Picnic at Hoyt This
Afternoon.

The nomination of Peter J. Hughes,
K. C., as Liberal candidate on Tues-
day with Richard B. Hanson, K. C., al-
ready in the field as Conservative
candidate, gave York-Sunbury an un-
expected election campaign, and both
parties opened committee rooms in
Fredericton last night and proceeded
to organize for the campaign and
election. The committee room in each
case is located where it was previous-
ly. The Liberals are in the Edgecombe
Building at the intersection of York
and King streets and the Conserva-
tives are in the Gibson Building,
Queen street.

Mr. Hanson's Plan of Meetings.
The meetings to be addressed by R.
B. Hanson are listed as follows:—to-
night, Nashwaaksis; Thursday night,
McAdam; Friday night, Cross Creek;
Saturday night, Canterbury Station.
This afternoon a picnic is being held
at Hoyt Station and Mr. Hanson at-
tended and spoke. Conservatives of
Minto are desirous that he speak
there and he may fill a date in that
community before election day.

Two Liberal Candidates Speak.
Tonight at Minto two Liberal can-
didates will speak at the one meet-
ing. They are Dr. D. H. McAllister of
Royal and P. J. Hughes of York-Sun-
bury. The candidates can speak joint-
ly because Minto is partly in one con-
stituency and partly in the other.

The balance of Mr. Hughes' speak-
ing program has not been announced.

Wants to Promote Boxing Bouts
James L. McNulty of Saint John has
applied to the City Council for per-
mission to put on boxing bouts in
Fredericton during the week opening
on the 20th. The application was re-
ferred to the Police Commission for
action.

PARTIALLY
DECIDED RE THE
POLICE CELLS

Steel Lattice Cells Now
on Order— Difference
of Opinion Concern-
ing Further Change in
Guardroom.

The improvements to be made at
the police station at the instance of
the Fredericton Sub-district Board
of Health have been partially decid-
ed upon by the committee in charge
and three steel lattice cells are now
on order. A difference of opinion
has arisen concerning further im-
provements. Ald. Thompson has ex-
pressed the opinion that the guard-
room and detention cell, which is
used for women, could be left as
they are with a saving to the city.
Ald. Goodspeed chairman of the
Administration of Justice Committee,
and other aldermen are desirous of
making a larger expenditure and mak-
ing improvements which would put
the police quarters in condition to
meet requirements for years to come.

Improvements To Be Made.
The present cell-room is to have
the three wooden cells removed and
three steel cells installed in their
stead but with the tier running at
right-angles to the present tier. A
toilet for the use of prisoners would
be in the room and controls worked
from the guardroom would open any
or all of the cell doors. A steel
floor of the same level as the pre-
sent guardroom floor is to be install-
ed in the cell room. For this im-
provement all members of the com-
mittee are willing.

Desired Improvements.
Further improvements desired by
some aldermen but opposed by Ald.
Thompson are the removal of the
present wooden detention cell and
the substitution of a steel lattice
cell at the western side of the guard-
room which would be partitioned off
completely from the intended guard-
room. The latter also would be com-

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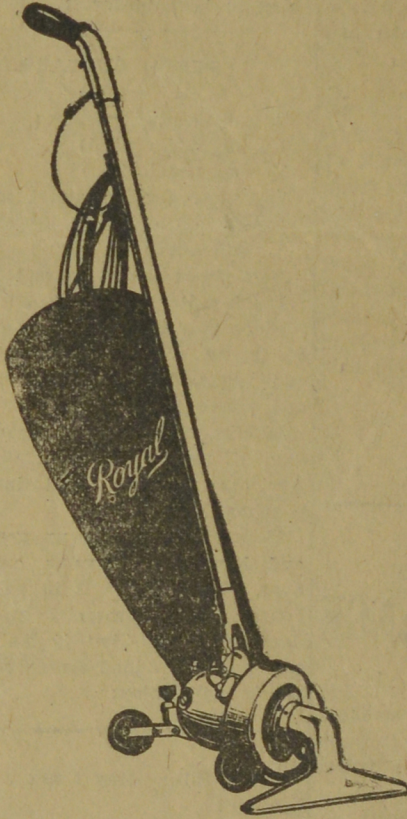
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
