LIBERALS TO HAVE LARGEST GROUP IN THE NEW HOUSE

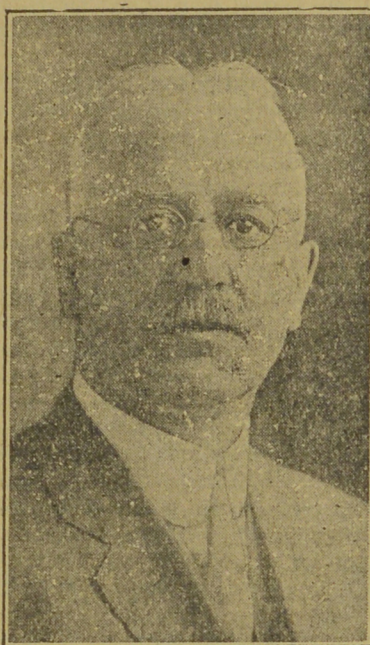
Mr. Duff was deputy speaker of the House in the last Parliament and correspondence he had with the customs department came in for considerable comment before the customs inquiry committee. Premier Meighen visited Queens-Lunenburg and opened the campaign against Mr. Duff.

In the election of Hon. Charles Maclell in Bonaventure county, Quebec, a fourth member of the Meighen administration was defeated. He is Hon. Eugene Paquet, minister of health and soldiers' civil re-establishment.

Returns From Prairies.

First returns from today's election from the prairie provinces indicated that the Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta representation in the next House of Commons would not be vitally changed.

Two Liberal gains had been recorded in Manitoba in the constituencies of Winnipeg South, where J. S. Mc

Diarmid defeated Hon. Robert Rogers, member of the last House, and Winnipeg South Centre, where J. P. Thornton was successful over M. W. Kennedy, also a member of the last House.

King Re-elected.

In Saskatchewan it was indicated early in the night that the Liberal character of the representation from the province would be retained. MacKenzie King, Liberal leader, was re-elected in Prince Albert, while Liberals were either elected or leading in a large majority of the other seats. Hon. W. R. Motherwell was elected in Melville and Hon. Charles Dunning in Regina.

Alberta returned a large company of members who ran under the U. F. A. banner. In ten of the 16 constituencies in the province, U. F. A. candidates were leading or elected. Hon. R. B. Bennett, minister of finance, was returned for Calgary West, while Hon. Charles Stewart, Liberal, and former minister of the interior, was re-elected to represent West Edmonton. The results were mostly unchanged from the last election.

Saskatchewan Returns.

Returns in Saskatchewan compiled up to ten p. m. (Maritime time) indicated that supporters of Hon. MacKenzie King would again sweep the province. At that hour the Liberals were conceded eight seats, while they were leading in ten. John Millar, running as Liberal-Progressive in Qu'Appelle, has been placed in the elected column and in two other cities of Progressive and a Liberal-Progressive are ahead. The possibility of a Conservative candidate carrying any of the ridings is regarded as very improbable.

Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King, leader of the Liberal party, was conceded victory in Prince Albert by his Conservative opponent, Diefenbacher. In Regina Hon. Charles A. Dunning had a hard fight, defeating McKinnon by 654 votes. Hon. W. R. Motherwell, former Minister of Agriculture, was having things his own way in Melville. His election is conceded.

Other seats secured by Liberals are: Assiniboia, Humboldt, Long Lake, Moosejaw, and Saskatoon. Progressive are leading in MacKenzie, where M. N. Campbell, sitting member, is opposed by J. A. MacMullen, Liberal. John Evans, running as Liberal-Progressive in Rosetown, had a substantial majority over his Conservative opponent.

Ex-Ministers Returned.

The men who represented Quebec in the Mackenzie King administration were all returned to Parliament by their constituents, and the speaker of the last House of Commons, Hon. Rodolphe Lemieux, was again successful in Gaspe.

P. E. Boivin, cousin of the late Minister of Customs, was elected in Hon. G. H. Boivin's old constituency of Shefford.

When polling places closed for the night, final figures had been ascertained in only a few constituencies. Most of them are incomplete, but with few exceptions the polls still to be reckoned with are not expected to effect the result.

Close Vote in Wright.

Wright, where the election of ex-member F. W. Peras, Liberal, is conceded by a narrow majority, is one exception. Final figures from outlying polls may not be available for several days. In Montmagny, where the Liberal ex-member, L. K. Laflamme is conceded elected by a small majority, the result may be the subject of a court appeal. On the ground that he is not really a Canadian citizen. Mr. Laflamme's right to sit in the House has been challenged by his Conservative opponent, Armand Lavergne. Mr. Lavergne stated a week ago that he intended to press his challenge of Mr. Laflamme's citizenship, claiming that he was born in the United States and has never been properly naturalized.

14 Seats Change in Ontario.

With five ridings still doubtful, the results in Ontario showed at midnight that the Liberal party, with their Progressive and Independent allies, had increased their representation in this province from 14 to 27 and that there had been corresponding losses in doubt are Port Arthur-Thunder Bay, Kenora-Rainy River, Parry Sound, Temiskaming South, and Renfrew South. In the last house, four of these seats were held by Conservatives and in the event of no change, Conservatives will have a total of 54 seats from Ontario, a net loss of 14 seats.

Result in Maritimes.

Halifax, N. S., Sept. 14—A net gain of three seats for the Liberals was recorded today in the voting throughout the Maritime Provinces.

The Conservatives gained two seats and lost one in Nova Scotia, lost three in New Brunswick and one in Prince Edward Island. The seats gained in Nova Scotia were, Lunenburg-Queens where William Duff, a former deputy speaker was defeated and Antigonish-Guysborough, the former constituency of Hon. E. M. MacDonald, minister of defence in the Mackenzie King government, which returned Hon. John C. Douglas, formerly attorney-general of Nova Scotia in the Rhodes government.

The seat lost by the Conservatives in Nova Scotia was Kings-Hants where A. DeWitt Foster went down to defeat before J. Lorimer Iseley. In New Brunswick the Conservatives lost three seats, Kent where A. J. Doucet, who figured prominently in the Customs investigation, was defeated; Northumberland and Restigouche-Madawaska. In Prince Edward Island, Hon. John E. Sinclair, a former minister without portfolio in the Mackenzie King government, defeated J. A. Messervy, the sitting member.

Ministers Elected.

All three members of the Meighen government were elected, Hon. W. A. Black, Minister of Railways, in Halifax, with a greatly reduced majority. Hon. George B. Jones, Minister of Labor, in Royal, who also had his majority cut in two, and Hon. John A. MacDonald, minister without portfolio, in Kings.

Original Families Represented.

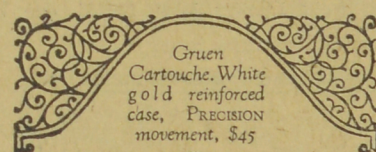
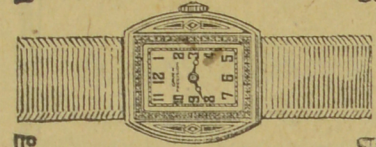
