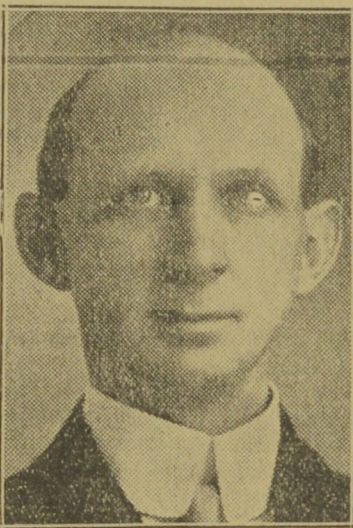
MINISTER OF LABOR WON THE BY ELECTION IN WEST MIDDLESEX BY BIG MAJORITY

Strathroy, Ont., March 29—Hon. J. C. Elliott, federal minister of labor in the by-election in the riding of West Middlesex necessitated promotion to a ministerial position in the federal cabinet, defeated T. A. Elliott his Conservative opponent today by a majority of 2,811 votes the total vote being:

Elliott (Liberal) 6,520.

Elliott (Conservative) 3,839.

T. A. Elliott, the defeated Conservative candidate, speaking from Parkhill over the long distance, telephone tonight expressed the opinion that the Progressives cast their votes largely in favor of the new minister, but he thought that the increase in the number of ballots cast on his behalf augured well for the future of the Conservative party in the riding. He expressed thanks to the workers who he said had worked ably and tirelessly throughout the campaign.

Liberals in the riding are highly elated over their representatives victory as he carried districts in which Mr. Elliott was expected to obtain leads, in fact of the 82 subdivisions the new minister was at the bottom of the poll in only seven.

In the general election last October with a Progressive candidate running in opposition to the contestants in today's battle, the vote polled was 11,290 or 931 more than in this contest. In that election the figures were:

J. C. Elliott4,926
A. MacDougall, Progressive ..3,548
T. A. Elliott2,816

Political observers scrutinizing the returns express the opinion that Mr. Elliott obtained approximately 1,500 of the votes cast for Mr. MacDougall in the general election.

Elliott's Views.

Mr. Elliott declared that the people of the country would now realize what West Middlesex

thought of the Liberal Government. The victory was not his, he said, but that of the electors and he was merely going to Ottawa to do their bidding. Mr. Elliott expressed appreciation of the assistance rendered by Liberal workers, declaring that he had never before been accorded such splendid help.

Conservatives attributed the success of the Liberal candidate to the organization perfected in the constituency on his behalf, while the claim of Premier King, who addressed electors in the riding on Saturday last that Ontario needed representation in the Ottawa government was also held to have been a large factor in the defeat of this candidate.

Bad Roads Encountered.

In the campaign just closed the candidates were handicapped by bad roads higher temperatures during the early part of the last week melting the deep snow in the country. Despite transportation difficulties, however, the candidates addressed a large number of meetings and the election fight proved keener than for many years.

Hon. Dr. D. J. Manion, M. P., of Fort William, led the forces working against Mr. Elliott and the former Conservative cabinet minister was responsible for the most interesting development of the campaign and one which resulted in a lot of platform crossfire throughout the campaign. At the public meeting in Strathroy following the nominations, Dr. Manion read a telegram from W. A. Boys, M. P., chief Conservative whip, purporting to give details of a deal in Saskatchewan in which Hon. Mr. Elliott had bought land in 1912 near Regina, three months later transferring the property to the government of the western provinces at a profit of approximately \$38,000.

Replying Mr. Elliott admitted the transaction and said that political capital had been made of the matter at the time but following an investigation he asserted the deal had been found to be "regular, correct, honest and square."

Many Workers Engaged.

In addition to Dr. Manion, the Conservative candidate was assisted by a large number of workers including John L. Stansell, M. P., of Norfolk-Elgin; Donald Sutherland M. P., of South Oxford and Fred Davis, M. P., of West Calgary.

Hon. Mr. Elliott received a great deal of assistance from Duncan Marshall, Liberal organizer, and to close the campaign, rallies were held in many towns and villages Premier King spending Saturday in the riding with Hon. Ernest Lapointe, Hon. C. A. Dunning, Hon. W. R. Motherwell, Hon. Charles Stewart and James Malcolm, M. P., North Bruce, and S. G. Tobin, M. P., Wetaskiwin, Alberta.

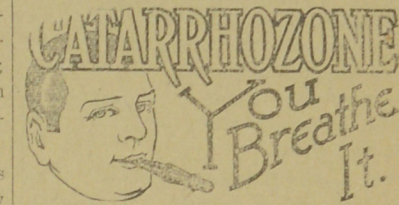
