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THE MINISTER OF RAILWAYS SUBMITS ANNUAL STATEMENT TO THE HOUSE OF COMMONS

Ottawa, May 25—"We hear various proposals from time to time intended to relieve our railway ills. My own view is that the solution of the problem must be found along the line of greater density of traffic," said Hon. C. A. Dunning, Minister of Railways, summing up the railway situation in his annual statement to the House of Commons today.

Greater density of population, Mr. Dunning urged, would provide greater density of traffic where most needed. Points in the statement were:

1—Given reasonably good harvest and freedom from traffic losses due to labor difficulties, this year may see the National Railways meeting entire interest charges due the public.

2—Operating net for first four months of 1926 shows improvement of \$5,914,435 over first four months of 1925.

3—Budget amount required for fiscal year 1926-27 is \$31,000,000. Gross capital expenditure proposed is \$19,127,284, including Central Vermont. The latter figure is reduced to \$15,727,284 by retirements recoverable through operating accounts.

4—Definite proposals expected during current year for placing of company's finances upon sound and permanent basis. Object sought is "a capital structure reasonably commensurate with the earning prospects of the country."

"What is desired," added Mr. Dunning, "is a capital structure that will simplify financial and accounting practice, with consequent saving of expenditures, and which will also ease the burden imposed on the Canadian National system by inheritance from private ownership."

Frantic Borrowings.

"It may well be questioned whether it is humanly possible for any railway management to make good the frantic borrowings which overwhelmed the former owners."

Later, however, Mr. Dunning said:

"We must not forget that when we come to the consideration of railway rates and capitalization that there is relationship one with the other. Call it what you may, there would be no object in writing down, or writing off, or suspending obligations due the government if, at the same time, we force upon the railways an uneconomic structure, that, so far as the Canadian National is concerned, would result in the piling up of fresh charges of government account, later to be similarly written off."

Mr. Dunning reiterated the Canadian position in regard to the Grand Trunk Pacific debentures. He outlined assistance given to the Grand Trunk and Grand Trunk Pacific. He attributed criticism of the government's attitude towards G. T. P. four per cent. debenture holders to lack of information.

Mr. Meighen Speaks.

It was late in the evening when Rt. Hon. Arthur Meighen, Opposition leader, joined in the discussion. He recognized that there had been a pretty general improvement since 1919. But the government had merely adopted the policy of its predecessor in amalgamating the roads into the Canadian National system. Furthermore, while all were glad to see signs of improvement, "we do not want to be deceived merely by appearances."

He analyzed Canadian borrowing to show that in 1925 the country had really gone into debt another \$35,000,000.

Proud of Debt.

"And," observed Mr. Meighen, "we are so proud of the accomplishment of being \$35,000,000 more in debt that we throw our hats in the air, kill the fatted calf, place an order with the liquor commission and reduce our taxes."

Following Mr. Meighen's speech, the Canadian National estimates were referred to the special committee.

TREASURER OF THE YUKON HAS RESIGNED

(Dawson City News.)

J. A. M. H. Maltby, territorial treasurer for the Yukon Territory, who has held that important government office for the last fourteen years with distinction and much ability, has handed in his resignation, to take effect on June 30 next. In resigning from this position friends will be pleased to learn that Mr. Maltby has been offered a very encouraging position on the outside to which he will journey immediately after the completion of his duties here.

During his long tenure of office in Dawson Mr. Maltby has proved himself a valuable and efficient government executive and one who has always had the interests of the Yukon at heart. Of late years he has handled the various sundry positions connected with the office of territorial treasurer in a manner which is enviable. In addition to the regular duties of his office, Mr. Maltby has supervised the government liquor stores throughout the territory since their inception, a task which in itself was no minor proposition. In the fulfillment of his duties Mr. Maltby has gained a fund of first-hand information relating to the territory.

Mr. and Mrs. Maltby and children expect to leave Dawson early in July. (Mr. Maltby is a nephew of Miss Dora Hanson of this city.)

A Veteran Rifle Shot.

Capt. J. D. Perkins of Sussex, formerly of this city is undoubtedly the best rifle shot of his age in this province. He has been keenly interested in the sport for over fifty years and in his younger days competed at Bisley as a member of the Canadian team. Last week Capt. Perkins competed in a match at Sussex and his score card which he enclosed in a letter to a friend in this city, showed the very creditable total of 91 points made at King's ranges. He scored 30 at 200 yards, 32 at 500 yards and 29 at 600 yards. Out of the 21 shots he put on eleven bulls eyes. Not a bad showing for a man in his 76th year.

A POLITICAL CRISIS IN THE ANCIENT COLONY

Premier Munro Accused Two of His Colleagues of Treachery.

St. John's, Nfld., May 25—Newfoundland was tonight in the throes of a political upheaval that was precipitated last week by the dismissal by Premier Munro of two of his ministers on charges of "treachery" and progressed today, with the defection of three more supporters of the Government supporters who crossed to the Opposition benches and left the membership of the House standing at 18 Government supporters, 17 Opposition and 1 Independent, Hon. W. R. Warren, former premier, holding the balance of power. The normal representation in the House is 36 members.

The House of Assembly adjourned until Thursday without any division occurring, the only feature of the afternoon's session being the statements by the members who crossed the floor, in explanation of their action.

More is Storm Centre.

Hon. A. B. Morine, Bonavista, a historic figure in Newfoundland politics, has become a part of the storm centre, resentment at his inclusion in the cabinet of Premier Munro when it was formed on June 9, 1924, being held up by the defecting members, as part of their reason for transferring their support.

The first sign of the present upheaval came Friday last when Premier Munro wrote Hon. C. E. Russell, minister of works, and Hon. Gordon Bradley, minister without portfolio, demanding their resignations "without further delay." To Mr. Bradley the Premier wrote, "I found it very hard to be convinced, as I now am, that when you sat at the executive council table that you were actually, at the time, under treaty with my political enemies to support, if not actually move, a vote of want of confidence in me as leader of the government."

Fredericton Birds Lead.

A pen of Barred Plymouth Rock hens owned by Fred H. Ferguson of this city led in the New Brunswick egg laying contest last week with a total of 62 eggs. No less than four of the ten composing the pen made a perfect score of 7 each. A. T. Reed's pen was second with 60 eggs, George Woods' produced 58 and that of John Woods 57. The total production for the week was 962. The pen of George Wood still leads the contest with 1315 eggs and 1391.5 points. The highest York County pen is that of John Moore with 1219 eggs and 1174.8 points.
