The registration at the University of New Brunswick continues. Four more students have been announced since the registration announced Monday. This makes a total registration of ninety-two of whom eighty-nine are Freshmen and three Sophomores.

The Freshman Class now has the following classification: Electrical Engineering 22, Forestry 24, Arts 31, Civil Engineering 2, Special 3, Pre-medical Arts 2, Science 4.

More new students are expected in the course of the next few days. The registration of new students now surpasses any previous registration.

Chancellor's Remarks

Dr. C. C. Jones, Chancellor of the University, addressed the student-body at the University at noon Monday and referred to the fact that the incoming class was the largest in the history of the institution. He estimated a total registration of 250 students in all courses which is considerably larger than last year when the registration was the largest.

The Chancellor also made reference to the fact that the college year almost on the centennial of the laying of the corner-stone of the Arts Building for many years the only building devoted to academic instructions. The corner-stone was laid September 15th, 1826.

Reid's pen holds second place with 2152 eggs and 2112.8 points.

The Fredericton Exhibition got away to an excellent start on Monday. The weather was fine and the light rain which fell at night did no damage and cleared away before morning. The prospect is for cool fine weather for today and Wednesday. Judging was begun on Monday and continued this morning. Agricultural products were judged on Monday by S. J. Moore of Truro who gave the section highest praise. This morning the horses and cattle were before the judges and the Poultry section also was begun.

Attendance Was Good

The attendance was considered good for the first day and compared well with preceding fairs. The midway and other attractions did good business. Today the first day's card of the racing meeting was run off and attracted an increased number of people.

Outdoor Attractions

The outdoor attractions were shown last night in front of the grandstand in the racetrack. Each day during the week they will be shown afternoon and night. The turns are up to the standard of previous shows.

Donald Innes of Tobique River is again at the exhibition this year in charge of the display of seed grain and vegetables. Mr. Innes is eighty-six years of age, and while he might be classed as a retired farmer, he is active, bright and can discourse in the language of Scotland as fluently as he ever could.
