CENTENARY OF TOM SAYERS CHAMPION

Born at Brighton in 1826
— Lost But One Bout
in Eleven Years, Lon-
don Rules.

One hundred years ago Tuesday Tom Sayers famous Englishman, who was a fighter in the days when boxing was fighting and not the clever scientific sport it now is, was born in Brighton. Most, if not all of his "fights" were under London Prize Ring rules. At the age of 23 years he quit his trade as a bricklayer and engaged in "prize-fights" another term now obsolete. The boxers of today are hired for guaranteed sums to display their prowess in quite the same way as in hockey, baseball or other professional sports. Sayers was beaten only once in eleven years, meeting defeat in a battle with Nat Langham in 1853. He was a compact and powerful man of 5 feet 8 inches in height and he never weighed more than 151 pounds. He was possessed of enormous hands and could hit terrifically with either of them. Perhaps his most famous fight was that with John C. Heenan, "The Benecia Boy" of California, on April 17, 1860 at Farnborough, Eng. Intense interest was aroused on both sides of the Atlantic over the outcome of the battle. The contest ended in a draw. Lord Palmerston, famous statesman of the Victorian era, was among the notables at the ringside. The sum of £3,000 was raised for Sayers by public subscription when he retired. He died in 1865.

MICKY WALKER SAYS BEATEN BY OVERTRAINING

Wants Another Chance
at Lotzo and Predicts
That He Will Win the
Next Time.

Rumson, N. J., May 26—Predicting that he will be back on the welterweight throne before the end of the year Mickey Walker who lost the 147-pound crown to Pete Latzo in Scranton, Penn. last week attributed his unexpected defeat to being "over-trained."

"I had been out of the ring eight months when I took on Latzo and I pushed myself too hard to get in tip-top condition," said the ex-champion. "The stories about Broadway life undermining my vigor are untrue and unfair to me I put in six hard weeks' training for the match and was on edge too soon to be right."

"I have my youth and strength yet. In five or six months I'll be up there again. The Pennsylvania Commission has promised me a return fight and this upset isn't going to worry me."

Walker's confidence was shared by his mother, who has assisted in training him for important matches ever since he was a preliminary fighter. "Long absence from the ring and local popularity of Latzo beat Mickey," she said.

DELANEY MAY GET BOUT WITH GENE TUNNEY

New York, May 26—Humbert (Jack) Fugazy is seeking to match Gene Tunney, regarded as light-heavyweight champion and Jack Delaney, French-Canadian who holds knockout victories over two of the present champions.

Delaney appears to have attached himself to Fugazy for the summer following Tex Rickard's failure to match him with Paul Berlenbach in a title contest again. He will be one of the principals in Fugazy's first outdoor show, at Ebbets Field, Brooklyn, next week, opposing Tommy Burns of Detroit.

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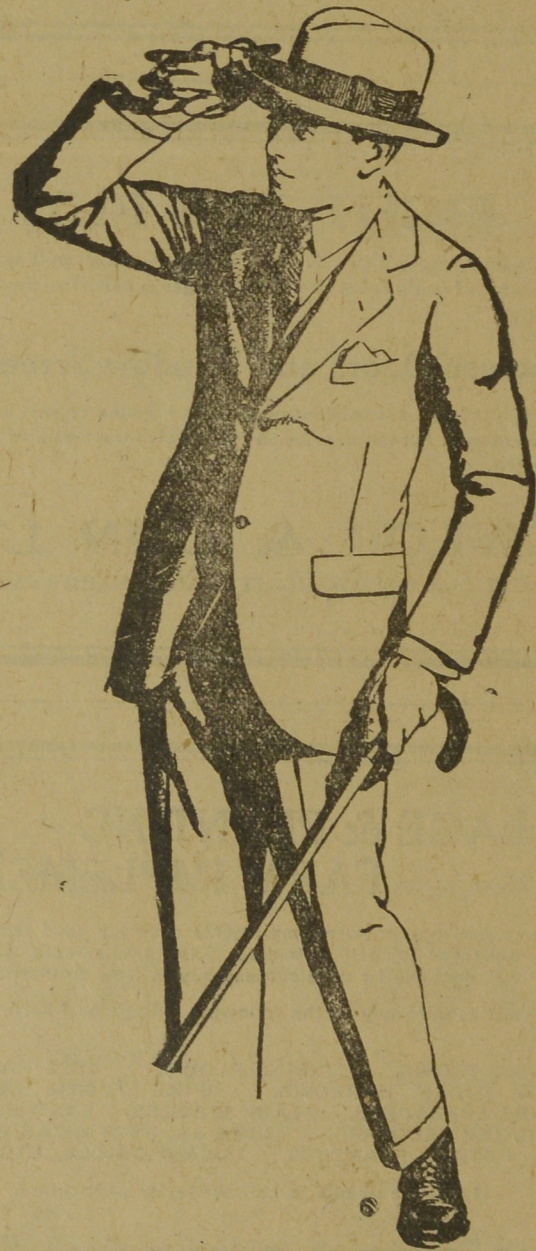
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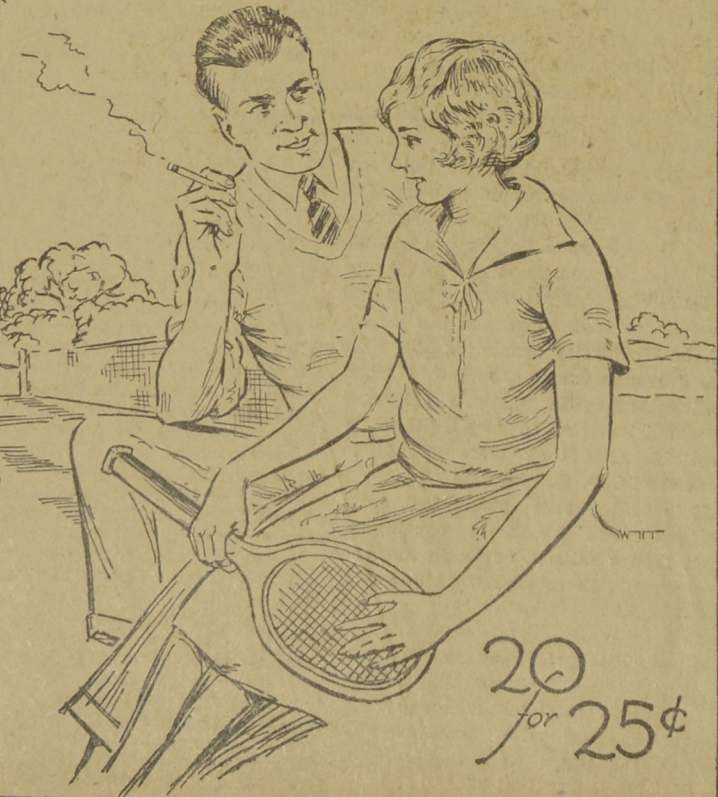
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
