## GREAT STRUGGLE HERE THURSDAY BY COLLEGES

### U. N. B. to Work Hard for Game — Wander- ers Captured Halifax City League Beating Dalhousie.

All U. N. B. undergrads, alumni and supporters are hoping for fine weather Thursday to give the Red and Black team an opportunity to show its stuff in the second game against Mt. Allison in the Western Intercollegiate Section. The one-point margin which U. N. B. took at Sackville means practically nothing and the section depends upon the result here Thursday.

The squad will be driven hard today and Tuesday in preparation and there will be lighter workout for Wednesday. The team may show a changed personnel as more weight is desired. Mount A. having been defeated on their own field are not an unknown quantity now. The over-confidence which affected U. N. B. at Sackville is not likely to be shown.

A big crowd of alumni and well-wishers are expected to come here for the game and Mount A. also will have a big crowd of rooters. Under the circumstances the match will be one of the hardest fought ever seen here unless all signs fail.

#### Wanderers Have Their League.

By beating Dalhousie 14 to 6 Saturday in the Halifax City League, Wanderers won the league title as they will defeat the United Services without doubt. This again gives the Halifax Red and Black team the right to represent its league and from this distance the club looks like the best Nova Scotia team. As University of New Brunswick is expected to meet Wanderers at Halifax on Monday next and here on the Saturday following the score indicates that U. N. B. will have strong opponents. The score at Halifax however as far as tries go is no greater than at Sackville last Thursday. U. N. B. scored two tries to Mount A's one and Wanderers scored four tries to Dalhousie's two. The variation is caused by the winning team converting at Halifax and the losing team converting at Sackville.

## Fredericton High is Out After School Rugby Title Of New Brunswick

### Cleaned Saint John High Up 24 to 0 Here Saturday — Mt. Allison Academy Won in Westmorland League by Beating Moncton High.

Fredericton High School is now out after the New Brunswick Provincial school rugby title. Mt. Allison Academy is the contender having beaten Moncton High at Sackville 11 to 0 Saturday. Previously the two teams had tied at Moncton. At the same time Fredericton High was making sure of the N. B. Interscholastic League title by giving Saint John a beating to the tune of 24 to 0 here. That score might have been larger as the home team did not try very hard to score in the last part of the match.

It is reported that the Mt. Allison Academy authorities object to the team going far afield for a game and that complicates the situation. Fredericton High journeyed to Sackville last autumn and won 3 to 0 on Mount A. campus but this year are inclined toward a neutral field. That win last season gave the Yellow and Black the title of the Province as Newcastle High as leaders of the North Shore League had previously been beaten here 30 to 0.

Negotiations with Mt. Allison Academy were opened Saturday night as soon as the results of the two high school games were known but no reply was received.

#### THE GAME HERE.

Red and Grey Outclassed—Visitors on Defensive Practically Entire Game—Home Team Strong.

There was a big crowd out at Colce Field Saturday afternoon to see Fredericton High clinch the league honors. The result was considered a foregone conclusion after Saint John lost on home grounds. The Red and Grey appeared in new pattern jerseys but failed to show anything in football offensive. The visitors were defending almost the entire time and their defense was not good enough to keep the Yellow and Black out. Thirteen points were scored in the first half and eleven in the second.

## N. B. BASKETBALL ASSOCIATION IS TO BE FORMED

### Meeting for Purpose Called at Saint John for November 13th— Playoff is Intended.

Saint John, Nov. 1—A call has been issued for a meeting of delegates to be held here on November 13 for the purpose of forming a New Brunswick Basketball Association, which will be affiliated with the Eastern Canada Basketball Association and will have control of this sport in New Brunswick. At the same time that the men's organization is formed a similar association will be formed it is expected for the control of girl's basketball under men's rules. These two organizations will have control of senior, intermediate and junior play throughout the province.

The reason for the formation of the association is that a winner in each class for New Brunswick may be declared, and just as soon as such a winner is declared in this province that team will come under the jurisdiction of the Eastern Canada Association which will have charge of all play-offs.

Similar organization meetings have been called for Nova Scotia, Province of Quebec, Central Ontario and Ottawa and the winners of each of these sections will play off for the Lord Byng trophy and the Eastern Canada title. In the event of Nova Scotia not forming an association, the winner of the New Brunswick section will have to play only one team for the title.

It was said that there should be at least 30 representatives of teams at the meeting here next month, as notices have been sent to all parts of the province where teams are at present or are expected to be formed.

## MONCTON BEAT TROJANS 12 TO 8

Moncton, Oct. 31—Piling up six points in the first period and three more in the early stages of the second session the Moncton rugby team pulled out of a hard fought battle with the Saint John Trojans here Saturday afternoon by a 12-8 score.

The game, played under ideal weather conditions and witnessed by only a fair sized crowd of spectators did not display any brilliant rugby the play being confined to loose scrim work with only a few half line runs throughout.

## SUNDAY BALL ILLEGAL IN STATE OF PENNSYLVANIA

### Blue Law of 1794 Invok- to Stop Games—Phil- adelphia American League Club to Ap- peal.

Harrisburg, Penn., Oct. 31—Sunday professional baseball is unlawful in Pennsylvania under a decision of the Dauphin County Court which defined it as "a worldly employment," in violation of the old Pennsylvania Blue laws of 1794.

The court denied the Philadelphia American League Baseball Club the right, privilege or authority to maintain or conduct any games of baseball in the city of Philadelphia on Sunday.

The club's counsel indicated it would take an appeal to the State Supreme Court.

The decision held that the act of 1794 includes baseball within its terms, although such a game was unknown at the time of its passage. The case reached the court through a proceeding by Atty Gen. Woodruff against the club as the result of a game played between the Athletics and the Chicago White Sox, Aug. 22.

"Laws are prospective," the court declared in answer to the claim that the act cannot be properly construed to indicate baseball within its inhibitions. "A general law," it added, "applies to all who come within its terms, to new subjects that are created and to new conditions as they arise."

To the argument that the respondent is engaged in a sport and that such a sport must be "otherwise unlawful" to violate the act, the court said:

"If we adopted the construction contended for and there were no other statute against hunting on Sunday in the open season because it is lawful and prohibit the hunting on Sunday in the closed Sunday season. Such Sunday observations would be a farce."

## CANADIAN RUGBY DOPE IS NOT UPSET

Montreal, Oct. 31—Senior rugby games in Eastern Canada Saturday went true to form. At Toronto the Blue and White University of Toronto team retaliated against McGill for their defeat at the opening of the season, downing the young Red and White machine, 11 to 5, in whirlwind battle in which McGill fought like mad in the second half to catch Varsity's early 11 point lead, but could only count five points, breaks going against them in other gallant attempts.

Ottawa practically clinched the Inter-provincial Union title, the Dominion champions coming from behind, despite crippled ranks, to nose out the Hamilton Tigers at the Capital City, 9 to 8. Only the greatest type of an upset can oust Ottawa from the lead. Argonauts of Toronto, kept in contention with an outside chance of tying the Ottawa squad, when they beat Montreal in Montreal, 7 to 2. Montreal and Hamilton are definitely out of the running for the Big Four title.
