NON CONFIDENCE MOTION

Ottawa, Jan. 12—Hon. Hugh Guthrie, Solicitor-General in the Meighen administration, definitely announced in the House today that if the government was defeated and a Conservative administration formed, Rt. Hon. Arthur Meighen would endeavor to carry on from session to session without dissolution and would do so just so long as he received parliamentary support.

Some significance is attached to this statement of Mr. Guthrie that has been spoken as another gesture towards the Progressives who are strongly opposed to another Federal contest this year.

Uncertainty Injected.

Frequent meetings of the Progressives during the day and a flood of rumors in the corridors have injected a large element of uncertainty into the parliamentary situation. At one time of the day it was stated on good authority that on this first test vote the Government would be sustained by a majority ranging from five to eight. At another time of the day it was reported on equally good authority that sufficient Progressives were ready to align themselves with the Conservatives to bring about a change of government.

Progressive bargaining is responsible for this kaleidoscope aspect. It is known that they are seeking some undertaking from Rt. Hon. Arthur Meighen on the tariff question, and it is understood that, if that undertaking can be given and can be accepted as such, enough western members will vote against the government to upset it. At the present moment, however, neither of the major groups will speak with certainty on the situation, although both are hopeful of success.

Vote Likely Thursday.

Whatever success the Progressives will have achieved in dealing with the two major groups will be disclosed on Thursday, when a vote

is expected. Tomorrow the House will adjourn at 6 o'clock and there is enough speaking material to carry the debate over tomorrow.

Mr. Guthrie declared in making the statement given above that he spoke in the presence of his leader, Mr. Meighen and with his authority. **In Dominant Position.**

Mr. Guthrie went on: "Honorable members who form the Progressive group in the House will realize this; their position will be just as strong under a new administration as it is under the present one. They will occupy the same dominant position in the councils of this House which they do today. If a new government were formed and legislation satisfactory to them introduced and proceeded with there is no reason why such government should not continue until the end of the parliamentary term. But they have this safety valve: should legislation introduced be not acceptable to them, then on account of the peculiar position which they occupy they would have the remedy in their own hands."

This declaration of Conservative attitude came in the evening of today's debating which had not been productive of startling developments. Crowds packed the galleries and approaches just as they had packed them on the opening day.

Debate Continues Today.

A speech by Henri Bourassa, Independent, of Labelle, featured the afternoon sitting. Mr. Bourassa urged a broad Canadian spirit, that Canada should become Canadian and not British in name and Yankeeified in spirit.

Hon. Charles Stewart, Minister of the Interior, argued that the Government was maintaining the authority of Parliament.

Two Progressives, Miss Agnes McPhail and M. N. Campbell of MacKenzie spoke during the day, but gave no definite indication how they would vote. The debate continues tomorrow afternoon.

**ROCKEFELLER
HAS FORMULA
FOR RICHES**

Ormond Beach, Fla., Jan. 12—To his golf caddy John D. Rockefeller, Sr., has confided his formula for the making of riches. Harmon Small is the boy who carries bags and hunts lost balls for the aged golfer, and this is what Mr. Rockefeller has told him is the way to get wealthy:

Don't buy anything you don't need.
Save your money.
Be punctual.
Form good habits.

There are just four rules, but the caddy believes they represent the formula on which the great Rockefeller fortune was built—and on which Harmon Small is going to build his fortune.

Mr. Rockefeller, now 87 years old does not miss a day at the golf links here. He follows his own rule of punctuality—arriving promptly at 10.15 A. M., rain or shine.

At that hour the Rockefeller automobile drives up to the golf course and Mr. Rockefeller, usually accompanied by Mrs. E. F. Warren, and Gen. Albert Ames, guests at the oil magnate's home, steps out.

The three play nine holes. Mr. Rockefeller pays careful courtesy, according to his caddy to Mrs. Warren gallantly assisting her in placing the ball and showing her kindly attentions.

"You ought to kiss my hand for that," Mr. Rockefeller remarked to Mrs. Warren during yesterday's game when he executed a particularly good stroke.

He takes particular delight in defeating Gen. Ames. The oil man's average score has been 48 for nine holes this year. He never plays more than nine.

Operation Was Performed

**BERLIN IS GOING
STRONG ON DOGS**

Berlin, Jan. 13—Recent returns from the dog taxes show that 218,000 dogs are kept in Berlin. The annual tax is 70 marks yearly for one dog and 140 marks for the second. The taxes are soon to be increased. There are nearly twice as many dogs in Berlin now as there were before the world war despite the increased cost of living.

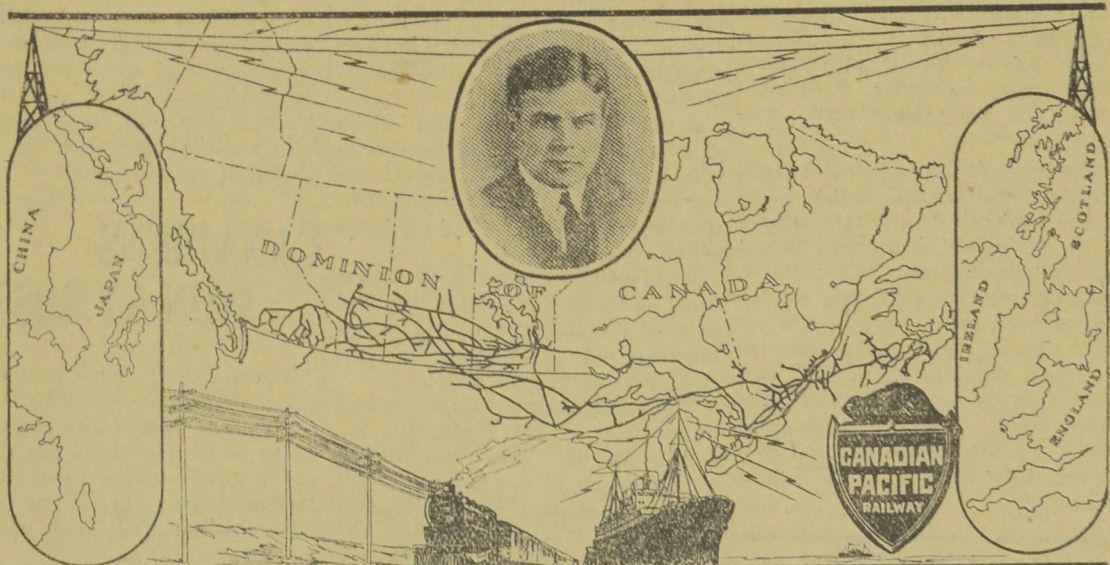

Ninety thousand employees received a New Year greeting, which hummed over the wires and buzzed over the air across twenty thousand miles and three continents, from E. W. Beatty, president and chairman of the Canadian Pacific Railways. The message was as follows:

"To All Officers and Employees:

"In sending on behalf of the Company my best wishes for the New Year, I desire to congratulate both officers and men on the high standard of efficiency they have maintained during the year, as evinced by many communications from those who have used Canadian Pacific Services, and as further proved by financial returns for a year which has been fraught with considerable and unexpected problems. Such work well done has helped to maintain and ensure the general prosperity of the Country whose interests we all feel it our chief privilege to serve. During the coming year we should all, in our various offices, when opportunity occurs, pay special consideration to the fostering of good feeling and of sympathetic understanding between the various peoples and interests throughout the Dominion, and thus help to conserve the spirit of national unity so necessary to the general welfare. For such duty we are particularly well equipped, as members of an organization stretching from Atlantic to Pacific and in close contact with all classes of the community. (Signed) E. W. BEATTY."

In order to despatch this message a remarkable feat of organization was staged at Canadian Pacific Telegraph headquarters in Montreal. The eve of

New Year's is always a day of great pressure and this year the amount of work over the usual heavy file of telegraph and cable wires, was nearly a record. The president's message, which was filed at ten o'clock in the morning and was going to stations up to midnight, while it added to the work, in not the slightest degree delayed current duties. Everything ran as smoothly as on any ordinary day of the year.

One copy of the message was put on every wire and was sent to every department head in Montreal and wires were sent to every centre in the Dominion from which it was relayed to offices within the district. F. R. Perry, New York agent, received the message first thing on opening his office and distributed it to Philadelphia, Boston, Pittsburgh, Buffalo, and other offices under his jurisdiction. T. J. Wall, Chicago, handled it in the same way for Cincinnati, Cleveland, Atlanta, Milwaukee, Kansas City and other points.

The message was cabled to Sir George McLaren Brown, European General Manager of the system, who relayed it across Europe to all cities where Canadian Pacific Railway has offices. Every ship of the Canadian Pacific fleet whether at dock or at sea was wireless or wired the message yesterday and it was prominently displayed on each of them. Trains travelling across the continent also carried it as part of their equipment.

A cable copy of the message was sent for the Orient, to Allan Cameron at Hong-Kong and was distributed by him to all points where the Canadian Pacific Railway has interests in China, Japan and elsewhere.
