

ADJOURNMENT IN SOWERS CASE FOR WITNESSES

Alban Leger, Informant on Stand This Morning—No Bill in Case Against Watson Brewer.

This morning before the York County Court adjournment was made in the case of The King on the information of Alban Leger vs James Sowers until Thursday morning to permit of additional witnesses being produced. The informant was on the stand this morning and was subjected to a searching cross-examination by J. B. McNair counsel for the defence. The cross-examination dealt chiefly with the identification of the accused as the man who had presented the cheque on Abram D. Bailey of this city to Leger in payment for purchases at the store of W. E. Farrell where the informant is employed.

The Grand Jury brought in a true bill against Sowers Tuesday afternoon. The accused who is a resident of McLeod Hill, York County, was not sent up by Police Magistrate Limerick, before whom his preliminary examination took place, but was held by him in bonds for the Grand Jury. The line of defence in the preliminary examination was an alibi.

No Bill Against Brewer

The Grand Jury found no bill against Watson Brewer defendant in the case of The King on the information of W. D. Hagerman vs. Watson Brewer. This went to the Grand Jury Tuesday afternoon. The defendant was charged with attempted theft of gasoline from a tank at the store of W. D. Hagerman at Burt's Corner. The evidence offered did not satisfy the Grand Jury that the accused should be put on trial.

J. B. McNair appeared for the accused. C. L. Dougherty clerk of the court acted for the prosecution in each case.

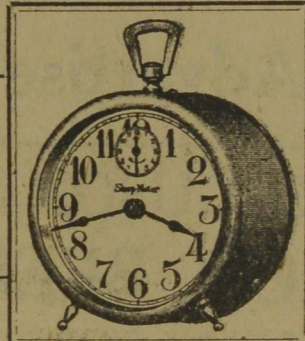

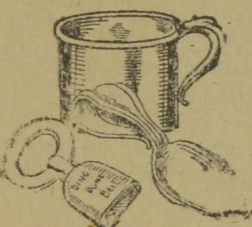
