## PROVINCE HAS BEEN DIVIDED INTO PROHIBITION DISTRICTS; LIST OF INSPECTORS NAMED

Saint John, Feb. 15.—Announcement of the division of the province into 52 districts for prohibitory purposes was made from provincial headquarters last night. The new alignment was made in accordance with the Intoxicating Liquor Act of 1916 and is effective from February 1. Each district is the charge of a sub-inspector.

Chief Inspector W. L. McFarlane and his clerk, S. H. Hanson, have been busy for the three weeks in subdividing the province as required. The districts are recommended by them have been approved by the Executive Council.

Saint John City has been divided into six districts, to each of which one inspector has been assigned. Each district consists of two or more wards. The inspectors are not limited to the section specially given to them, but can act anywhere in the province.

## GAS IS STILL SUPREME FOR LIGHTING

Paris, Feb. 15.—After a quarter of a century of struggle for supremacy in Paris honors are easy between gas and electricity. The electric lamp has not the best of it in Paris homes. It was the gas lamp that caused Paris to be called the "Ville Lumiere," and the older method of lighting has always been preferred for public thoroughfares.

Nine-tenths of the public lamps of the capital burn gas. The great avenues are illuminated by gas. So is the Rue de la Paix, the first street in Paris to be so lighted. The centenary of the origin of the gas industry in France was celebrated in 1924 and this year is the centenary of the first trial of gas for lighting purposes in Paris.

When new this method of illumination met with violent opposition. Even the great Guy Lussac declared that wax candles were better.

## WHITE STAR LINE WILLING TO GO TO ST. JOHN

Montreal, Feb. 12.—The White Star line is quite prepared to make either Halifax or Saint John the western terminus in winter for its vessels provided that sufficient cargo is offered to enable it to operate a service to the United Kingdom from one or other of those ports economically. This was an opinion expressed today by Major P. A. Curry, manager of the White Star line Canadian service, when his attention was drawn to the utterance of Dr. O. P. Price, M. P., (Conservative, Westmorland) made Thursday in the House of Commons. It was stated that every possible means should be used to persuade the White Star line to make Saint John and Halifax its winter ports of call.

Major Curry stated that apart from sentimental and patriotic reasons, the company would rather use Halifax or Saint John as its winter terminus for the reason that ships are handled more cheaply there than at Portland Me, which is at present the Western terminus for their freighters and a few of the passenger liners.

There would be no necessity for their going to Portland if it was possible for them to obtain sufficient cargo at Canadian ports, where they would be willing to remain a number of days so long as they got the cargo. Calls are made as it is, at Halifax for general cargo and for cattle when such is offered or available.

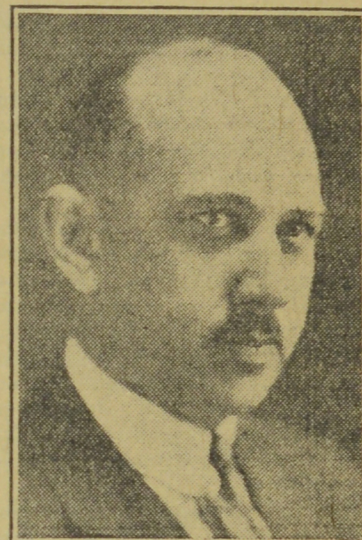
