### CLASSING OF HORSES CHANGED AT PITTSBURG

Class A and Class B Designated — \$500 Purse the Dividing Line — After Phoney Timing.

Pittsburg, Feb. 11—The meeting of the joint rules committee of the American and National Trotting Associations, resulted in the formation of one new rule and the changing of several already in force in both organizations.

It was recommended that in races where more than 12 horses were declared in, that the elimination plan be made mandatory upon the association.

That the three-heat-plan race end at the termination of the third heat and the horses tied by winning a heat divide the 10 percent allotted to the winner of the race and that the horse standing best in the summary be declared the winner of the race.

That parent bodies shall have the right to designate a timer for any meeting, that he shall take actual time of the races and report any inaccuracies in the time hung out by the timers. If the horse winning is given the benefit of any time accountable; should his winnings in a class slower than he is eligible to under the correct timing shall be redistributed.

For the purpose of classification that all horses without win races at a mile shall be divided into two classes, Class "A" to consist of all horses making win races after Jan. 1, 1926 in a race not to exceed \$500 for each event. The other class to consist of all horses making win races after Jan. 1, 1926 in a race not to exceed \$500 for each event. The other class to consist of all horses having win races on Jan. 1, 1926 and all horses making win races in purses and stakes of a value exceeding \$500.

When a horse in this class wins a race in faster time than his Class "A" win race, the latter shall be canceled and said horse classified by the same in all races, regardless of value of the purse.

### Montreal on Ottawa Trail and Boston Bruins Pass the Canadiens

Boston, Pittsburg and Montreal Won in N. H. L. Saturday Night—Canadiens Were Shut Out at Pittsburg.

Montreal, Feb. 14—Montreal can thank Vernon Forbes for their two-to-one win over the New York Americans here Saturday night.

The Gotham goalkeeper practically scored one himself four minutes before the game ended, giving the Maroons the deciding goal. 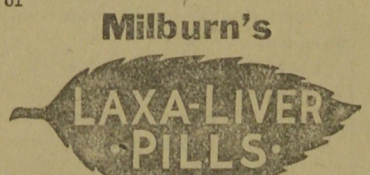
Western League Forfeits.

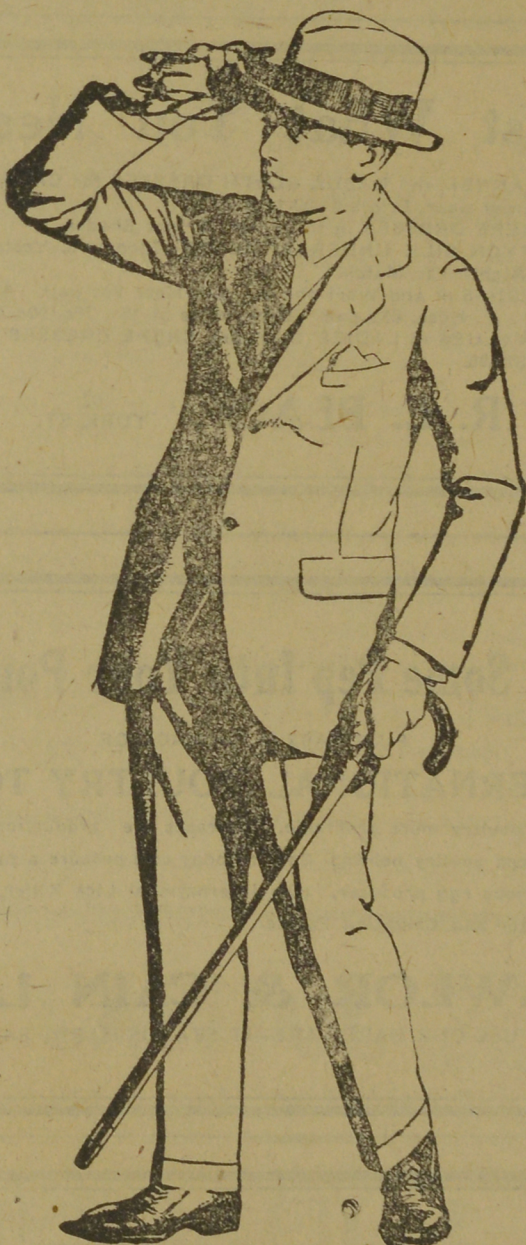
