OTTAWA DURING COMING WEEK;  
ELECTION MAY COME IN JUNE**

Ottawa, Jan. 17—Canada's Parliament is sitting on a volcano which at any time may erupt and blow it to the people. Even though the 19 Progressives who voted with the Liberals on Friday morning have sought an understanding with the government for it means only a postponement of the inevitable. While practically every member of every group in the house is opposed to another general election this year, no one believes it can be averted longer than June unless there is a definite parliamentary alignment to the Progressives with the Liberal or with the Conservatives.

Certain members of the House see plausible objections to another appeal this year. One is that His Excellency the Governor-General would surely request from the major party leaders who asked for dissolution some assurance or proof that there would be a sufficient change of popular sentiment to warrant another election.

**Difficult to Give.**

Such an assurance at this time would be difficult to give, they say. Even then, it is argued, both Liberals and Conservatives in the country work equally diligently for a decision and the result might be similar to October, 20 last.

One fight for Parliamentary control ended last Friday morning, another will commence tomorrow afternoon with the opening of the debate on the Speech from the Throne, whose adoption will be moved by J. C. Elliott (West Middlesex) and seconded by L. Lacombe (Laval-Two-Mountains).

**Many Amendments Seen.**

Intimations have already been received from the Conservatives that they will do everything within the law to regain the position of advantage which it is conceded, they held last Tuesday night. There will be many opposition amendments to the Throne Speech motion, and there are likely to be many attempts at snap divisions because of the narrow margin now existing as a result of last Friday morning's vote of 123 for the Government and 120 for the opposition.

**Margin of One Foreseen.**

By the resignation of Charles MacDonald of Prince Albert, Sask., to vacate

his seat for the Prime Minister, that vote for the Government has now been reduced to 122 and should Arthur Chaplin, Conservative member who was seriously ill, and confined to a hospital during the division, return to the House within the next few days the Opposition vote of Friday would be increased to 121, making the margin between the two only one instead of three. That margin of one, too, would be contingent upon all the members of all the groups being in the House at the time of a division, and voting the way they did Friday morning.

**Meighen to Speak.**

Rt. Hon. Arthur Meighen, Conservative leader, will be the first speaker from the Opposition side of the House this afternoon in the debate on the address and will be followed by Hon. Ernest Lapointe, Minister of Justice, and probably Robert Forke, Progressive leader.

The Conservative chieftain, it is understood, will probably move the further proposed amendment in the course of his speech tomorrow afternoon, calling for a straight vote of confidence vote in the government. The moving of this second amendment will mark a renewal of the battle for political supremacy which was waged in the House last week, culminating in a vote of the first conservative amendment giving the government a close majority of three.

**Hectic Time Indicated.**

Political indications point to the continuance of a very hectic session and the opinion expressed among certain political circles is that the fight has just begun. During the past few days Conservatives, it is said, had under consideration the matter of a second amendment. The question, it is understood, has been whether this further amendment should call for a straight vote of non-confidence in the government or involve a vote of want of confidence. The decision arrived at, it is believed, is to move a straight vote of non-confidence in the question of the trustworthiness of the government to function under the existing political circumstances as a result of the recent general election.

**NEW YORK AUTO  
SHOW DRAWS  
BIG CROWDS**

New York, Jan. 14—The Italian setting of the National Automobile show now in progress has set a stage more like that of a flower show than an industrial exhibit.

In the colorful scene are roadsters touring cars, coupes and limousines, ranging from ruby-red to creams and toned generally by conservative blues and blacks. There are more than 200 exhibits which display new models and new accessories, providing greater beauty, luxury or comfort.

Closed cars predominate, with upholstery and interior fittings stressed in the exhibits. Inlaid rare woods are a prominently displayed feature, and mohair velvet is the selection of many manufacturers for upholstery.

Roadsters also are much in evidence, some with disappear-rumble seats.

**Predict New Peak.**

The attendance yesterday led leaders in the automotive world, who regard the New York show as a barometer for the industry, to predict that 1926 will see a new high peak of production.

Special trains have brought motor show crowds from Detroit, St. Louis, Chicago, Cleveland and Milwaukee. Two of the special trains from Detroit yesterday carried 1000 officials and dealers of the Dodge and Graham concerns.

Two hundred delegates from nearly 50 countries here attending the world motor transport congress, also attended. This is said to be the largest delegation of foreign visitors ever to come to an American automobile show.

The Society of Automotive Engineers, now holding its annual meeting here will visit the show today, and the annual dinner of the National Automobile Chamber of Commerce was scheduled tonight, with Secretary of Commerce Herbert Hoover as guest of honor.
