**The Invitation of Mayor Accepted—City Clerk C. F. Chestnut is Senior Ex-President of Union.**

In connection with the announcement made here by His Worship Mayor Clark that the Union of New Brunswick Municipalities had been invited to meet here in annual session in 1927, it is of interest to note that C. Fred Chestnut of Fredericton at present filling the office of City Clerk and Treasurer, is the senior ex-president of the organization. He was preceded in office by A. I. Teed of St. Stephen and Edward Sears of Saint John who were mayors of their respective municipalities at the time. Mr. Chestnut was mayor of Fredericton when elected.

His Worship Mayor Clark states that the invitation has been accepted and that the Union will meet in Fredericton next year. The Union met in this city shortly after its organization.

Although a bone of one ankle was broken Mr. Lyons escaped without more serious injury.

## BIG BURGLARY OF FUR COATS LAST NIGHT, ELEVEN STOLEN FROM J. CLARK & SON

**Value Placed at \$2,000 and Upwards—Entrance Effected by Means of Skeleton Key and Side-door—Selection Made of Stock in Showroom—Bold Proceeding—Car Evidently Used to Make Getaway.**

The biggest burglary which has taken place in Fredericton in many years occurred Thursday night or early this morning when the premises of J. Clark & Son Limited, at the corner of King and York streets were entered and eleven ladies' fur coats were stolen. Mayor W. G. Clark, president of the firm, who returned this morning from Saint John where he had been attending the annual convention of the New Brunswick Union of Municipalities placed the value of the goods taken at \$2,000 or upwards.

Entrance to the building Mayor Clark said as far as could be learned, had been made by means of a side door on York street, a skeleton key being used.

### Eleven Coats Taken.

The eleven coats stolen were in the main showroom of the premises which is the head office of the firm which has branches in many places throughout the Province. Some were in the window and others were on hangers along the walls. A street light threw its rays through the large windows into the front part of the showroom and the thieves must have worked in its light.

It is considered probable that a car or truck was used to get away with the stolen property the entire robbery being carried off with great daring and evidently well organized.

Mayor Clark said that evidently a selection had been made among the fur coats as those which were taken were of good value. A number of fur coats in the showroom were not touched. The selection was made by someone with knowledge.

The police were notified of the burglary which follows a number of breaks at drugstores in which liquors and small articles were taken.

### Commission to Meet.

It is expected that the Police Commission will meet shortly and consider the robberies which have occurred and means which may be taken to prevent repetition. Mayor Clark ex officio is a member of the Police Commission.

### Carelessness of Merchants.

Carelessness on the part of merchants has been very apparent to the police at various times when they have discovered the doors of business premises unsecured at night. Only the night before the burglary at J. Clark & Son's the police had to secure one of the main doors of the building which had been left unlocked. The number of doors which have to be so secured is remarkable.

Robbery of business houses is not very difficult in a place like Fredericton where it is very easy to watch the patrolmen and keep a check on their movements and where automatic burglar alarms are missing and night watchmen are kept only in a few places largely as a safeguard against fire.

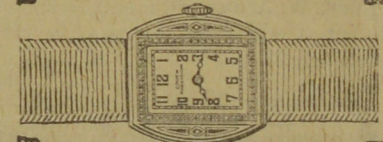
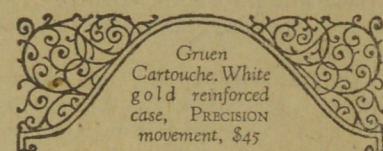
## J. H. CONNELLY WELL KNOWN HERE HAD CLOSE CALL

After the boat was swamped Wednesday morning Mr. Connelly hung to the boat and drifted ashore. Mrs. Connelly formerly was Miss Mayme Roberts of Fredericton.

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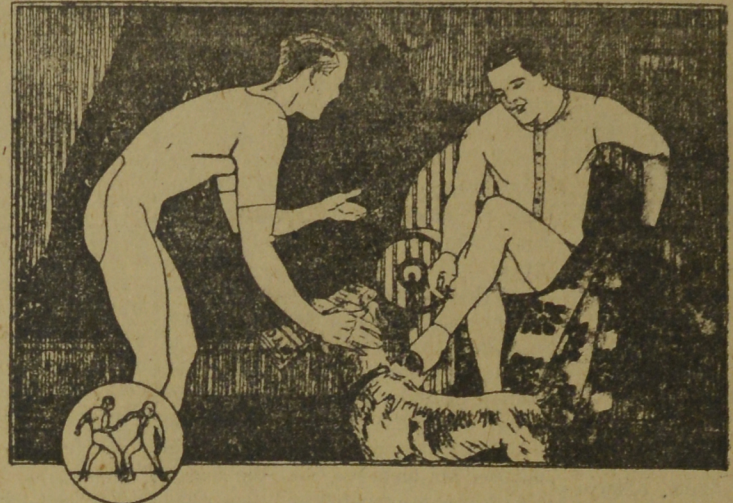
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
