### ENTERTAINING TOO STRENUOUS IS THE ALIBI

**Amerian Golf Team After Walker Cup, Had Luncheon With Premier Baldwin—Lost on Match.**

London, May 21—America's members of the Walker Cup golf team tonight slept aboard the "Flying Scotsman," speeding towards Edinburgh and the British amateur conflict, which starts Monday at Muirfield.

Their heads were weary for they have been through some strenuous affairs since their arrival in England. On six of the seven days they played golf, three of the six under cruel weather conditions and every night they raced about the countryside in automobiles or sat at festive board with British golfing notables.

But Bob Gardner of Chicago captain of the team, told "The Associated Press" before leaving for the land where golf was born that he believed the team was rounding into shape and that he had the greatest confidence that the Americans would be thoroughly acclimated and accustomed to British conditions of play for the Walker Cup contests at St. Andrews more than a week away.

Yesterday's defeat by "The Moles" at Woking may have been attributable to the large number of engagements the Americans had kept, but after the matches English hospitality showed no signs of relenting. The team went to the Houses of Parliament and dined in state with Premier Baldwin and Ex-Premier MacDonald among the guests.

After the feasting the players sat in the gallery for distinguished strangers in the House of Commons and at midnight explored the dungeons of Westminster.

### HAGEN WILL MEET MITCHELL FOR BIG PURSE

**One Thousand Pounds Up for Match Between Two Great Professional Golfers — Mitchell Strong.**

London, May 21—Walter Hagen, former American and British open golf champion today accepted by cable a challenge for a 72-hole match with Abe Mitchell of England with a purse of £1000.

The challenge was issued last Winter by a British golf magazine. A. W. Wallace, Detroit business man is reported to have taken the American end of the wager.

Hagen has planned to sail for Europe May 26 to participate in the open again this year and his match with Mitchell will be played June 18 and 19 the first 36 holes at Wentworth and the second at either Oxhey or Moor Park.

The American is expected to receive the largest fee ever paid to a professional golfer in England where remuneration is much lower than in the United States and seldom has been as much as £100.

British experts regard Mitchell as the greatest match player in the world.

New York, May 21—Georges Carpentier, soldier fighter from France and Eddie Huffman, blonde Californian fought a 10-round draw at Madison Square Garden tonight in a fight which bubbled with action from the start. The decision met with general approval from the 14,000 spectators. Huffman weighed 175½ pounds and Carpentier weighed two pounds less.

### REPORTED FIFTEEN-YEAR PACT IN N. H. L.

**Newly Expanded Organization to Remain Intact Until 1941 — Three New Clubs are Taken in.**

New York, May 21—Clubs in the National Hockey League, including three admitted at a recent meeting of the circuit in Toronto have signed ironclad agreements to keep the league intact for 15 years, it was learned today.

The new teams in the organization are the New York Rangers, Detroit and Chicago. The Chicagoans will be recruited from the Portland, Ore. Rosebuds, brought by interests headed by "Tack" Hardwick, ex-Harvard football star.

New York, May 21—With the exception of a match between Spain and Ireland the second round of the European zone Davis Cup tennis tournament has been completed with Argentina, Great Britain, Italy, South Africa, Sweden, France and Czechoslovakia advancing.

Argentina, victor over Hungary by 8 to 2, will meet the winner of the Spain-Ireland match, while Great Britain will oppose Italy, whose team defeated Holland 3-2. These matches will decide the semifinalists in the upper half of the draw.

In the lower half, South Africa which advanced by a default from Austria, meets Sweden victor over Switzerland by 3 to 2.

The favorite team of France which won all its matches against Denmark, is bracketed against Czechoslovakia, which defeated India, 4-1. Third-round matches are required to be played before May 21.

### CARPENTIER TRIES TO REGAIN LOST LAURELS

**Is Looking for Light-Heavy-weight Title — Young Stribling May be Opponent of the French Boxer.**

New York, May 21—A picturesque figure in pugilism for almost two decades, Georges Carpentier of France today shadow-boxed through the last workout of a long training grind which he hopes will put him back on the light-heavyweight throne.

Although the popular orchid man has seen only 32 Summers his appearance in the Madison Square Garden ring for a 10-round battle with Eddie Huffman of California will mark the opening of his 19th season as a boxer.

His long ring campaign has left few marks on one of the finest physiques of pugilism. Carpentier still is considered one of the handsomest men in the game and a pugilist whose prestige has been shaken only slightly by his knock-outs at the hands of Battling Siki, Gene Tunney and Jack Dempsey.

Carpentier looks upon his fight with the rugged Huffman as a stepping stone to the throne from which he was tossed by Siki four years ago.

Boxing men consider Tex Rickards coup in signing Young Stribling to box his first match after the Paul Berlenbach title fight of June 10 a link in the chain which Carpentier must complete by a comeback to win back his laurels.

If Stribling succeeds in dethroning Berlenbach a triumph by Carpentier over Huffman will set the stage for a championship fight between the Georgian and the Frenchman in the belief of close followers of the game.

In the semifinal to Carpentier and Huffman, Jack Kearns, erstwhile pilot of Jack Dempsey will have on display for the first time his new heavyweight prospect, Napoleon Doral, who will be seen in a bout with Dan Lieber.

When John Kuck threw the javelin to the new American record of 214ft 2 1/8in Saturday the big Kansan also put the shot 50ft 5 1/2in and threw the discus 133ft 6in.

### DAUGHERTY FREED ON BAIL

New York, May 20—Harry M. Daugherty, former United States Attorney General, who was indicted for alleged conspiracy to defraud the government in the American Metals Company case, which involved the irregular return of \$7,000,000 worth of alien property, appeared in federal court today, pleaded not guilty and was released in \$5,000 bail.

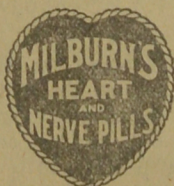
