HON. MR. STEVENS PROMISES TO PUT A STOP TO SMUGGLING OF LIQUOR TO UNITED STATES

Toronto, July 8.—Declaration that Hon. Jacques Bureau had "debauched the customs department" while minister of customs, and emphatic promise of war to the knife on the Canadian liquor smuggler if he were minister of customs, featured the address of Hon. H. H. Stevens, Vancouver, B. C., before the Conservative Business Men's Club of Toronto today.

Mr. Stevens made it clear that he proposed to wipe out the smuggling of liquor into the United States if he remained head of the Department of Customs. He told his audience that Canada could not ignore the laws of business any more than the moral code and if the country looked lightly on liquor smuggling, as he accused Hon. Jacques Bureau of doing, then the country must expect that there would be looseness in all lines of commercial life. It was looseness that had broken the morale of the customs department, he claimed.

Bars Bogus Papers.

The acting Minister of Customs proposed to treat liquor just the same as any other line of goods and business and it must be on a bona fide basis. There must be no bogus clearance papers for shipments to the States.

About 500 Conservatives of Toronto and surrounding points were present at the luncheon. H. S. Gooderham presided.

"I have been asked what is the issue in this campaign," said Mr. Stevens. "It is not a legislative issue—that I can say. Every movement by Mr. Meighen and his assistants was in accord with precedent. We acted in all points on the advice of the law of Canada."

Asks For Precedents.

"Where in all the legislative history of the British Empire can Mr.

King produce precedents where a government three times defeated on motions involving its honor and integrity has been able to ask for dissolution?"

Dealing with the customs investigation, Mr. Stevens said it had been an important factor in bringing about the dissolution of Parliament and the overthrow of the King Government.

He paid a tribute to the business men of Toronto, Montreal, Winnipeg, Hamilton, Vancouver and other large centres for having, "in default of proper administration," organized themselves into a corporate body and put up their own money and conducted an investigation into the administration of the customs department which had resulted in the appointment of the commission.

Praises Sparks.

"I say without hesitancy that to Mr. Sparks much more than to myself or my colleague is due the splendid results achieved."

"A word about the losses. It is impossible for me or anyone else to say what direct losses to the public have been in regard to this matter, but I think a moderate estimate of those losses would be \$330,000,000 annually."

"This thing should have been stopped, not only because of the losses to the public exchequer," said Mr. Stevens, "but because of the high loss to the business men of Canada, due to unfair competition. It was utterly unfair when business men, trying to carry on and observing the law, were outbid and overdone by others operating in open and flagrant violation of the laws. The loss to business men in Canada alone is estimated at from \$100,000,000 to \$200,000,000 yearly."

King's Admission.

"I think that is a conservative estimate because in isolated cases there were losses shown of hundreds of thousands and even millions of dollars," Mr. King himself admitted some time ago that the loss would be \$100,000,000.

"For eighteen months or more Mr. King and his ministry knew of these conditions and did practically nothing to remedy them. He notified the Board of Trade of Toronto, Montreal and other cities that these conditions would be remedied. The act that the King government took was to dismiss the noted Bisalle in Montreal, after we had asked for an investigation, and Bisalle has openly stated that after the probe was over he would be returned to his position."

Failure From Top Down.

"The failure of the Customs Department was not from the bottom up, but from the top down," declared Mr. Stevens. "The failure of the minister to appreciate his responsibilities was what began this corruption. It gradually percolated down to the under officers and throughout the whole preventive force."

"I say advisedly that Mr. Bureau, when Minister of Customs, debauched that department, and it was largely through this that the collapse came," said Mr. Stevens.

"Other causes were the government's failure to remedy things, the Volstead Act in the United States, automobiles and good roads."

Brunswick among the Federal Conservatives is very good," continued Hon. Mr. Baxter affably. "It is every bit as good as it was at the last elections. We will not lose any seats."

Hon. Mr. Baxter was in the best of spirits, chatting of the days when he was a newspaper reporter but insisting that his present visit to Montreal was a purely private one. He remarked that he was unaware that the Rt. Hon. Mr. Meighen was in the city.

In speaking of the Aziz case which brought about the vote of censure passed in the House of Commons on Hon. George Boivin, Hon. Mr. Baxter was asked if he had received a complaint that after the arrest of Moses Aziz he was not put in jail but had been seen driving with the sheriff through the streets of Bathurst.

"That information did not come to me as a complaint," replied the Hon. Mr. Baxter, "but I have heard of the alleged incident."

Temporary Residence.

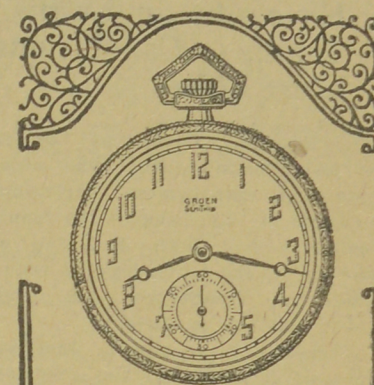

Forest Travel Permits Are Cancelled And No More Will Be Issued In New Brunswick Until The Present Forest Fire Menace Is Relieved.

Under authority vested in the Minister of Lands and Mines, all forest travel is hereby prohibited and all registration certificates are hereby cancelled until further notice in the counties of: RESTIGOUCHE, GLOUCES-TER and NORTHUMBERLAND.

This action is made necessary by the seriousness of the forest fire situation. The extremely dry windy weather of the past week has fanned fires, started by the carelessness of people in the woods, into conflagrations which are devastating the forests. The only way to save our forests at such a time is to prevent fires starting. This can only be assured by prohibiting forest travel.

Violators of these instructions are subject to immediate arrest by fire wardens or other law officers in accordance with the regulations of the Forest Fire Law.
