urday.

The York and Sunbury Teachers' Institute which will be in session here next week will not have the pleasure of hearing Dr. Patterson, President of Acadia University, deliver an address. Dr. Patterson had been invited and was expected to attend. He informed the secretary of the Institute, J. E. Page of this city, that he had been called to the United States and would have to leave on Monday next.

The fact that Monday, November 8th is to be observed as Thanksgiving Day and Armistice Day, together with the two days taken for the Institute makes quite a break in the school term the schools in these two counties closing on Wednesday, November 3rd, and reopening on Tuesday the 9th.

Otto Miller of this city is president and will take the chair. He will deliver an address Thursday morning at the opening session and Dr. H. V. B. Bridges also is booked to speak.

Thursday afternoon Miss Pearl Ross is to deliver a paper on "Arithmetic" and the "Teachers' Tour in the British Isles" is to be discussed and described by J. E. Page, A. S. McFarlane and Miss Kathleen Woods.

Friday's Sessions.

Friday morning the papers will be "Word Building" by Miss Mabel Logan, "Primary English" by Miss Cecil Gallagher and "Constructive Criticism of the Curriculum" by James A. Hughes.

Friday afternoon will be devoted to an address by H. H. Stuart on "Current Events" and also to reports and to unfinished business.

About one hundred teachers are expected to be in attendance at the Institute.

FUR COATS STOLEN FRIDAY
MORNING FROM J. CLARK & SON
HAVE ALL BEEN RECOVERED

Two at Home of Stanley Colwell Taxi-driver, Four Hidden Eight Miles Out Hanwell Road by John McGoldrick, Five Hidden on Same Road Nearer City by Harry Mount — Telephone Call to Colwell's Residence Clue Which Solved the Case—Three Arrested Yesterday.

All the loot taken in the robbery of fur coats valued at more than \$2,000 from the premises of J. Clark & Sons, Limited early Friday morning, has been recovered. Two coats were found at the home of Stanley Colwell a taxi-driver. Four were found eight miles out the Hanwell Road where they had been hidden beneath brush by John McGoldrick. Five were found on the same road about two miles from the city having been hidden there by Harry Mount. All three young men were arrested Friday afternoon. The coats at Colwell's residence were found by search warrant. McGoldrick and Mount were implicated by Colwell after the coats were found at his home. McGoldrick disclosed where he had hidden his share of the loot but Mount who was partially under the influence of "canned heat" which had been lividified to make a beverage, refused to talk when arrested. This morning he was willing to disclose where the coats were and took the police to the spot.

Clue Found in Odd Manner.

The clue to the burglary was found through C. C. McLean a commercial traveller who was at another part of the premises of J. Clark & Sons, Limited, Friday morning. Upon hearing that a robbery had taken place he asked where and was told in another store "at the corner of York and King streets." Mr. McLean at once recalled that at about 1.30 that morning as he was eating in a quick lunch restaurant, he had heard a man inquire concerning the telephone number of a taxi-driver and after getting the number instructed the driver to have a car at the corner of York and King streets. He also was able to recall the telephone number. That number was given to the police and proved to be Colwell's number.

Colwell when arrested denied any knowledge of the matter but after the discovery of the coats at his house changed his attitude.

McGoldrick Telephoned.

It was found that the man who telephoned to Colwell from the restaurant was McGoldrick and his inquiries were made in such a way that attention was attracted to them.

All Young Men.

The men arrested are all young. Colwell is said to have come here from Saint John some years ago. He is a married man. The others have police court records Mount having been charged previously with burglaries. The men are expected to be examined next week.

Carried Loot Eight Miles.

Friday afternoon young McGoldrick started out Hanwell Road, it is said in company with a young man named

Chase. Ostensibly McGoldrick was going hunting. Really he was removing his share of the fur coats to a safer place. He placed them in a bag which he carried on his back to a point eight miles from this city. On the way he passed a pulpwood camp and several houses, so that he was observed. While he was absent the case developed so rapidly that his connection with the break was known and he was arrested on his return. The other two also had been arrested.

Coats Not Damaged.

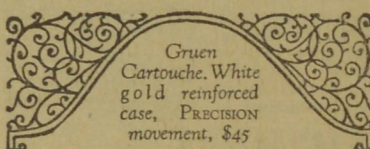
Fortunately no rain fell while the coats were hidden in the woods and they were recovered in good condition. Their concealment consisted of a little brush laid over them.

Prompt Police Action.

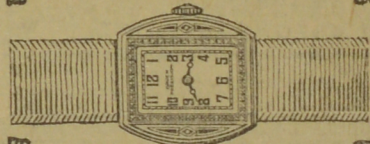

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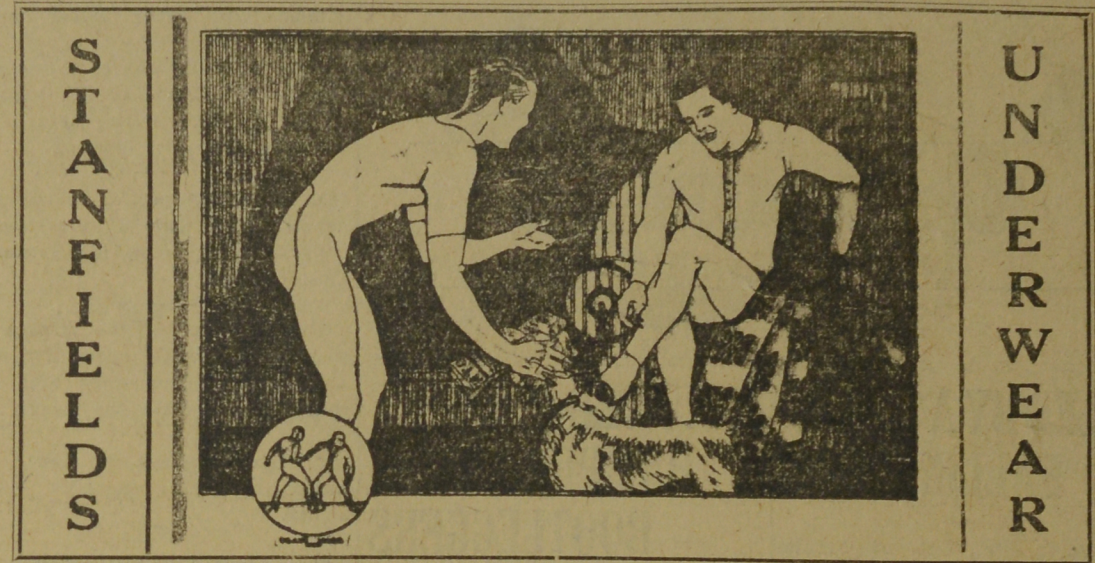
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
