## CHAMPIONSHIP FIGHT PICTURES PLEASED MANY

**Tunney a General Favorite — Films Showed All the Outstanding Features of the Match.**

Big houses saw the Tunney-Dempsey fight pictures last night at the Gaiety Theatre. They will be shown again tonight. The films were all that could be desired and gave the spectators an excellent idea of how the match went.

Tunney evidently was the favorite in Fredericton as well as at the ring-side. His skill in handling the mitts was well shown by the pictures as well as Dempsey's desperate attempts to overcome years of easy living and the superior skill of an opponent.

To those who had followed the bout by radio the pictures explained everything which they had received. Tunney's outstanding rounds could be picked out easily and also the few times in which the defending champion showed something of what he used to be.

There was no doubt in the minds of those who saw the pictures that the world's heavyweight title had passed legitimately to the young marine. The latter had the physical condition and also the skill and endurance to outfight the champion in ten rounds.

## HOFF SUES FOR ONLY \$502,000

Los Angeles, Oct. 11—The long promised suit of Charles Hoff, Norwegian vaulting champion, against the Amateur Athletic Union was filed in Federal Court here today, the vaulter asking \$502,800 damages for an alleged attack upon his character and athletic standing and expense money due him.

The suit names as defendants the Athletic Union, William C. Prout, F. W. Rubien and Robert Weaves, officials of the A. A. U. the Melrose Athletic Club, and four other persons, members of the A. A. U. Foreign Relations Committee. Of the total asked in the suit \$250,000 is listed as damages to character and athletic standing a like sum as punitive damages, and \$2,800 as due Hoff an expense money on his tour which was halted after he refused to appear at a meet in San Francisco last spring.

## PENNOCK AND O'FARRELL ARE MEN OF VALUE

New York, Oct. 11—The brilliant World Series performances of Herb Pennock, New York southpaw, and Bob O'Farrell, Cardinal backstop, have emphasized the likelihood of their being officially recognized as the "most valuable players" of their respective leagues for 1926.

Pennock has capped his consistent work throughout the pennant season by registering two fine victories over the Cardinals, giving him a record of four triumphs altogether in World Series play, without a defeat marked against him.

Pennock won 22 games and lost 11, leading the Hugmen's curving corps and ranking second on the American League pitching list to George Uhle, Cleveland star, who won 27 and lost 11. Experts figure Uhle and George Burns, Indians' first baseman as Pennock's only outstanding rivals for the American League player award.

O'Farrell, a tower of strength all season to the Cardinals, has been a sensation in the series so far. His defensive play and handling of pitchers have stood out, while he leads both teams at bat with a mark of .437 for five games. O'Farrell caught all but nine of the Cardinals' games in the pennant campaign and was declared by Mornsby to be the team's most effective performer.

## N. B. RUGBY LEAGUE FORMED FOUR CLUBS

**Dr. D. C. Malcolm of Saint John, President —Two Colleges, Mt. A and U. N. B. Included.**

Saint John, Oct. 12—A New Brunswick football league is now assured after a meeting held in Saint John yesterday afternoon with delegates present from Mount Allison, University of New Brunswick and Saint John Trojans.

Officers elected for the season are: President, Dr. D. C. Malcolm, Saint John; vice-president, Gregory Bridges, Moncton; secretary-treasurer, Gordon McPhail, Rothesay. An executive to be composed of one member from each of the clubs is yet to be appointed.

At the meeting it was decided that the regular Union Rugby rules would be observed with one exception, viz., any player incapacitated by injuries may be replaced. Only two such replacements may be made during a game.

In the case of referees, the home team shall notify the visiting team six days before the scheduled game and the visiting team shall reply within 48 hours whether the choice is satisfactory. Failure to agree on a referee shall mean that the president of the league shall determine the arbiter for the game.

**Arranging Schedule.**

University of New Brunswick were in favor of home and home games between the teams but rather favored a two-section schedule. Moncton made it known at the meeting that they wanted the straight schedule and the University of New Brunswick delegate asked more time to take it before the athletic council for consideration. Two schedules were drawn up at the meeting and should U. N. B. agree to a straight schedule it will mean that home and home games will prevail.

Failure of a team to appear for a regular scheduled game shall mean a fine of \$50 to the offending team.

**Opens Saturday.**

The league will officially open here next Saturday afternoon, when U. N. B. oppose the Trojans, while Moncton plays Mount A. at Sackville. In the case of the home and home games between U. N. B. and Mt. Allison they will be considered as regular league games in the Intercollegiate League as well as Provincial League. This will mean that the result of the games between the two colleges will have a double bearing the Intercollegiate League and Provincial League. It amounts to nothing more nor less than a league within a league.

## NEW TRACK RECORDS MADE IN ENGLAND

Four new track records for sprints and middle distances have been set in England this season and two of them are world records. The Old Country in the athletic doldrums for several years, is coming back to its own. One of the new marks that for the half-mile, was set by Dr. Peltzer of Germany. It is a world mark too, and that is something new for Germany. The second British mark of the year, which is a world record, is that at 600 yards by Dr. D. G. A. Lowe, member of the British Olympic team of 1924. Following are the record-breaking performances in England this year: 600 yards—1.10 2-5, by Dr. G. A. Lowe at the London Athletic Club meeting June 26. This also beats the previous record, and will be submitted as such, 380 yards—1.51 3-5, by Dr. O. Peltzer, Germany at Stamford Bridge, July 3. This has already been accepted as a world's record, 300 yards—30 3-5, by G. M. Butler at the London Athletic Club meeting, June 26. 440 yards hurdles—54 4-5, by Lord Burghley at Stamford Bridge, July 3.

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
