

HOUSE MAY PROROGUE TONIGHT

WOMAN WAS SHOT TWICE BY ADMIRER

Drove to Hospital With Two Bullets in Body.

CONDITION IS CRITICAL

Man Who Did Shooting Was Caught by the Police.

Camden, N. J., June 30—Mrs. Harriet Vickers apparently did not mind two bullet wounds in her back Tuesday as she drove ten blocks to police headquarters and calmly announced she had been shot by an admirer.

At first she refused to disclose his name, but later said he was Paul Fuersten, director of the Camden Philharmonic Orchestra. Then she collapsed and was hurried to a hospital where she is said to be in a critical condition.

Fuersten was found in bed by police, his room littered with empty liquor bottles. Under his pillow was found a razor and on a table was a suicide note dated June 12.

PARLIAMENT WILL DEAL WITH ITEMS OF SUPPLY THIS AFTERNOON

As the Items Were Prepared by the Former Government No Serious Opposition is Looked For—Prorogation of the House May Take Place This Evening.

OTTAWA, June 30—With a Conservative government of a temporary nature installed in office and given a vote of confidence by Parliament, there is a slight slackening in political tension here today. The Customs report on the Stevens amendment censuring the former administration having been disposed of yesterday, the House when it resumes this afternoon will go into Committee of Supply. The items to be submitted were prepared by the outgoing administration and it is not expected therefore, that there will be any serious objection to them.

MAY PROROGUE TONIGHT

It was stated at noon today that other business remaining on the order paper will be dropped and that the House will be prorogued as soon as Supply shall have been disposed of. As the House will not sit on Dominion Day prorogation if it is agreed upon, will take place some time before midnight. Of course, it is difficult to forecast what may happen.

With Parliament out of the way Premier Meighen, so it is understood, will at once complete the formation of his cabinet and bring on the by-elections in the different provinces. With the possible exception of Quebec, it is not thought that there will be any great difficulty in reelecting the Ministers.

Ottawa, June 30—The new government secured a majority of 12 when the House this morning rejected by 119 to 107 a Liberal sub-amendment to the Customs Report. The sub-amendment had been moved earlier in the day by Fernand Rinfret, Liberal for St. James, Montreal.

The Stevens amendment carrying censure of the former King government shortly afterwards was carried by a vote of 119 to 103, a majority of 16 for the new government.

Ottawa, June 29—The tables were turned in the House today. A Conservative administration was in office, Liberals from Opposition benches opened their attack on the new Government and in the first division, with Liberals wildly cheering the Meighen government was on the losing side.

"Resign" shouted the Liberals amid a furious pounding of desks.

The division was on a private member's motion. Fernand Rinfret, Liberal for St. James, Montreal had proposed a sub-amendment to the Stevens amendment to the Customs Report. Sir Henry Drayton, acting Government leader, objected that the motion was not in order.

Speaker Lemieux ruled against him.

G. R. Geary, Conservative for Toronto South appealed on the ruling and the House divided.

In the vote the Speaker's ruling was sustained by 115 to 114. Liberals supported by the main body of Progressives the two Independents and the two Labor men formed the majority. Conservatives supported by Progressives, Messrs. Lucas, Boutilier.

USING A BIG SEAPLANE

Confident That He Will Make 26,000 Mile Trip.

London, June 30—Alan J. Cobham, English aviator hopped off at five a.m. today from Rochester on the first leg of a twenty-six thousand mile round trip flight to Melbourne, Australia. He is using a three hundred and eighty-five horsepower seaplane equipped with Duraluminum floats. He is confident that he will be able to complete the trip.

AN AVIATOR SAVES LIFE OF SWIMMER

Swooped Down and Placed Him on Wing of Plane.

THE MAN HAD TAKEN CRAMPS

Aviator Flew Off Before His Name Could be Learned.

New York, June 30—A modest aviator has become the flying life saver by swooping down in his hydroplane to the spot on Long Island sound where a soldier was drowning and placing him on the wing of the plane. Before the pilot's name could be learned he flew off in his privately owned plane, Tuttle 11. Private James Stanley, of the Fort Slocum Garrison was seized with cramps about 500 yards off shore. Over head in the air, buzzed the hydroplane. Undoubtedly the plane was seen swooping down skimming forward as it touched the water. The aviator jockeyed his ship toward the swimmer, leaned out from the cockpit, caught Stanley's arm and pulled him across one of the wings. The government launch Q-12 took Stanley aboard.

Ottawa, June 29—Right Hon. Arthur Meighen has formed a temporary cabinet to carry on the public business for the time being. In the House this afternoon the ministers who will constitute the temporary cabinet were announced as follows:

Sir Henry Drayton—Finance and Railways.

Hon. R. J. Manion—Department of Health, Soldiers' Civil Re-Establishment, Post Office, Immigration and Labor.

Sir George Perley—Department of Secretary of State and Public Works.

Hon. H. H. Stevens—Customs, Interior, Indian Affairs, Agriculture, Trade and Commerce.

Hon. Hugh Guthrie—Justice, National Defence.

Hon. W. A. Black—Department of Marine and Fisheries.

Hon. R. B. Bennett, it was stated is on his way to Ottawa from Calgary and will be asked to accept similar duties on his arrival here.

Mr. Meighen himself assumes the portfolios of Secretary of States for External Affairs and President of the Privy Council.

Sir George Perley, the statement announced will have charge of matters affecting these departments during Mr. Meighen's absence from the House.

DYKES ON THE DANUBE ARE THREATENED

Belgrade, June 30—Flood waters today threatened to burst through the Danube dykes here. The river is swollen by many days of rain.

ADVOCATED THAT BRIGHT PUPILS BE PROMOTED MORE RAPIDLY IN THE SCHOOLS

Dr. H. V. B. Bridges, Principal of Normal School, Advanced Arguments for Supernormal Children to be Given Greater Opportunities—Mrs. Susan K. Squires of This City Gave Interesting Talk on Practical Nature Study.

The regular biennial meeting of the New Brunswick Teachers' Association (organized in Albert County in 1902; reorganized in 1918) was held in High School last evening. President Dr. George J. Culton in chair.

Secretary reported that the committee who met with Sussex School Board this year, had a very satisfactory trip. Sussex Board had adopted a salary schedule providing for regular increase of salaries of the teaching staff.

Dr. Oulton reported that a committee had asked the Chief Superintendent for permission to have the association meeting during the institute hours. They had been received kindly but permission had not been granted on the ground that the Association did not represent all teachers.

The report was accepted as satisfactory.

The Secretary Treasurer reported a balance on hand June 26th of \$767.86. Ex-president Dr. B. C. Foster reported that the meeting of the Canadian Teachers' Federation he had attended had been very enthusiastic and representative. He strongly recommended affiliation with the Federation.
