### CANADA'S BIRTHDAY.

The Dominon of Canada will celebrate its fifty-nigth birthday tomorrow. Fifty nine years is not a long time in the life of a nation, city, town and hamlet of the four Robert Borden as Premier in 1921 original provinces who had long but soon afterwards his government reached the age of maturity, before confederation became a reality. In 1867 Canada consisted of four provinces with a sparse population today there are nine extending from ocean to ocean, having a population in excess of nine million people The fondest dreams of the Fathers of Confederation have been more than realized. Largely as a result of their wisdom and foresight there has been built up on the northern half of this continent a nation within the British Empire, a nation emposed of an industrious and God fearing people who have proved their faith in the heritage by more than

in the heritage by more than the word of mouth. The Dominion of Canada has made substantial pro gressed along all lines and it will con tinue to forge ahead. It is a great and wonderful country, with unlimitable resources the development o which has scarcely yet begun. There is not the slightest doubt but that Canada, judging by the rate progress it has made during the past fifty-nine years, will at the close of the twentleth century have a population of at least seventy-five millions of people.


