CANADA'S BIRTHDAY.

The Dominion of Canada will celebrate its fifty-ninth birthday tomorrow. Fifty nine years is not a long time in the life of a nation, and people can be found in every city, town and hamlet of the four original provinces who had long reached the age of maturity, before confederation became a reality. In 1867 Canada consisted of four provinces with a sparse population today there are nine extending from ocean to ocean, having a population in excess of nine million people. The fondest dreams of the Fathers of Confederation have been more than realized. Largely as a result of their wisdom and foresight there has been built up on the northern half of this continent a nation within the British Empire, a nation composed of an industrious and God fearing people who have proved their faith in the heritage by more than in the heritage by more than the word of mouth. The Dominion of Canada has made substantial progress along all lines and it will continue to forge ahead. It is a great and wonderful country, with unlimited resources the development of which has scarcely yet begun. There is not the slightest doubt but that Canada, judging by the rate of progress it has made during the past fifty-nine years, will at the close of the twentieth century have a population of at least seventy-five millions of people.

There has been a lot of history made at Ottawa during the past six months. When Parliament met in January a Liberal government was in power, the Premier was without a seat in the House and there were numerous vacancies in the cabinet. Yesterday the House met with a Conservative administration in power but with a Premier without a seat in the House and not a single minister holding a portfolio. While the Conservatives have the largest group in the House, they lack seven of an actual majority of the members. If the King Government was able to carry on under the conditions which prevailed the Meighen administration with a larger parliamentary following should be able to do so for a time at least.

In the Parliament of Upper Canada in the days before Confederation some public men of the day executed what was known as a double shuffle. A government resigned and then a new administration was sworn into office. While the members were seeking re-election, the opposition seized the reigns of power, and the ex-ministers by taking different portfolios from the ones they had vacated, did not have to seek re-election. It was a rather clever trick and the government succeeded in holding onto office for a time. The law was afterwards changed and it would be impossible today to execute such a stunt, even if there were public men who would be disposed to do such a thing.

Premier Meighen in forming a temporary cabinet to meet the House and complete the work of the session seems to have made the best arrangement that was possible under the circumstances. The House met yesterday afternoon and adopted the Stevens Amendment to the customs report by a majority of ten. An amendment by Mr. Renfret was declared out of order by the Speaker and the House by a majority of ten sustained his ruling. According to today's despatches there

is not likely to be an election in the near future. The ministerial by-elections will be held and the government may attempt to carry on for another year at least.

Right Hon. Arthur Meighen is the only Premier of Canada with the exception of Sir John Macdonald to take office a second time after having been head of a government which lost public confidence. Sir John became premier at Confederation and held office until 1873 when his government resigned because of the Pacific scandal. In the election which followed his party was defeated. In 1878 the Conservatives won the election and Sir John again became premier holding office continuously until his death in 1891. Hon. Mr. Meighen succeeded Sir Robert Borden as Premier in 1921 but soon afterwards his government met with defeat.

City of Fredericton Notice of Assessment.

The Assessment Roll for the City of Fredericton for the year 1926 is now in the hands of the City Treasurer for collection, and all persons therein assessed are hereby required to pay the amount of their respective taxes to the City Treasurer at his office in the City Hall, Fredericton, N. B., within thirty days from the date hereof.

A discount of five per centum will be allowed on all taxes paid in to the City Treasurer within the period of thirty days from the date hereof, after which executions may be issued and proceedings had thereon as by law provided.

All persons assessed in the City of Fredericton who do not pay their rates within the said period of thirty days shall have added to the said rates one-half of one per centum per month or part of a month until the said rates are paid.
