





BRIDAL GOWNS FOR

TRAVELLING.

Confetti and motor cars have replaced rice old slippers and the horse and buggy in the getaway of the newlyweds. There has been too a great change in opinion as to what constitutes a proper going-away gown. The suit has been replaced by the travel coat. Informality rules the day any smart sports costume being a candidate for the honor of cloaking the bride.

Just now with aris reports bristling with accounts of the amount of navy worn the bride may choose navy instead of gray or beige. It is quite likely that she can brighten her costume involving two or even more colors. Both red and green continue to be voted smart reds being newer and offering a wide range of tone. There are many novelty woolens and an equal array of interesting silks, including the latest moired effects one of the highlights of the Paris openings.

It seems almost superfluous to remind any woman who has the great advantage of assembling a complete costume that shoes, hats and handbags make a friendly gesture one toward the other. One may find the Paris fad of matching shoes to the color of one's gown a bit ultra but it is worth considering, and advisable always, provided one's circumstances warrant such extravagances as shoes and hats to match each costume. Many of the best dressed women manifest a preference for novelty Oxfords, especially with travel or trotteur costumes and for stockings which are tending to ward darker tones.

EGG BISQUE.

Half a dozen hard boiled eggs cut in half lengthwise half a can of tomato soup heated with half a tea spoon of Worcestershire sauce and a bay leaf. In another saucepan have a tablespoon of butter and a tablespoon of flour blended together add half a cup of cream thicken by cooking. At the last take the soup and cream sauce off the fire and pour the soup into the sauce. Have the eggs on a hot patten on toast or English muffins and cover them with the sauce. Sprinkle grated Parmesan cheese over the top and serve at once garnished with parsley. Remove bay leaf before serving. Thinly sliced broiled ham may be served with this if desired.

PEANUT COOKIES.

Cream 6 tablespoons butter substitute and add 3/4 cup sugar, the beaten yolks of two eggs and three tablespoons of milk. Mix together one and one half teaspoons of baking powder, one quarter of a tea spoon of salt, one cup chopped peanuts and 4 tablespoons chopped seeded raisins. Combine the two fixtures and rop by the spoonful onto a greased baking sheet, three inches apart. Place a whole nut in the centre of each and bake in a moderate oven.



CHICAGO HAD LESS CRIME DURING WEEK

Chicago, June 29—Despite the advantages offered criminals to work amid the confusion of crowds there were seventeen fewer major crimes committed in Chicago during the four days of the Eucharistic Congress than for the corresponding days of last year according to a report of Chief of Detectives Shoemaker. Only twenty-three major crimes were reported during the congress.

Warsaw, June 29—It is hoped that the Polish-German tariff war, which has lasted more than year, may be ended soon. Both sides are believed to be ready to make concessions. A solution of this problem would be of the greatest assistance to Poland economically and financially, because Germany is normally Poland's chief customer. The heavy burden of unemployment in Upper Silesia is due almost entirely to Germany's refusal to buy Silesian coal, which as a result, is piling up at the pits.
