N. B. TEACHERS' ASSOC.
TO AFFILIATE WITH CANADIAN
TEACHERS' FEDERATION

Decision Reached at Meeting Held Tuesday Night After Long Discussion—H. F. G. Bridges, Principal at Campbellton, Elected President—Permission Not Given to Hold Meeting in Institute Hours.

The thirty-first meeting of the Teachers' Institute of New Brunswick closed this afternoon when elections were completed and other business done. The total registration at the Institute as reported at noon today was 814 the largest on record by well up to one hundred.

Two papers were heard this morning and discussed. Dr. H. V. B. Bridges dealt with the problem of the supernormal pupils advocating that those who might be able to omit certain grades in promotion Mrs. Susan K. Squires of Fredericton well known as a naturalist and observer of nature, was heard in a interesting talk on practical Nature Study observation. Each paper was discussed.

The slowest pupils are best tended by the conscientious teacher should not the more clever pupils be allowed to go ahead as fast as possible and be trained for leadership? Feeble mindedness is the chief product of poverty and crime and must be controlled.

Wednesday Morning.

Dr. H. V. B. Bridges, Principal of the Normal School, gave an address on "What Shall We Do for the supernormal child."

Dr. Bridges said marvellous improvements had been made in elementary education the last fifty years. It is objected that present schools are deficient in the three r's and spelling. But is scarcely so owing to compulsory attendance, the average of education must necessarily be lower but that shows no deterioration, rather the reverse—there being large percentage of good scholars than ever. In all countries until lately—those who

went to school were comparatively free and of the upper classes. Now everyone goes to the primary schools.

More Flexible Grading.

Naturally there would be a great difference in pupils. Cleverer pupils should be advanced at end of the term instead of always being held in the grade a full year. Grading should be more flexible. Sometimes it is all right for a clever pupil to jump a grade.

Dr. Mabel Hannington.

The discussion was led by Dr. Mabel L. Hannington, Medical Inspector of Schools in Saint John. She endorsed Dr. Bridges' idea of grading supernormal pupils more rapidly. For every child 10 or 30 percent. below normal there will be a child 10 or 30 percent. above normal.

The text paper was on "Nature Study Observations," by Mrs. Susan K. Squires of Fredericton. To study nature, use your eyes and ears, said the speaker. She then described at length, and very interestingly her observations of birds, insects and plants. Blackbilled cuckoos had come to her garden. They built their own nest, ate tent caterpillars, and showed no bad habits. They were rarely like their European cousins who rob other bird's nests. Altogether she had found over 100 species of birds in the city.

Mr. Barker, Dominion Government Bird Protection officer, read a paper on birds. On Aug. 16, 1916 hostilities against friendly birds ceased in Canada and the U. S. A., under the Migratory Birds treaty. Mr. Barker described the operation of the Migratory Birds Act which he said was well observed in this Province. The Game Act was not so satisfactory and should have the bag limit reduced.
