Aldermen in Clash at Meeting of City Council

Ald. Goodspeed's Remarks About Leasing City Property Displeasing to Ald. Mitchell—Council Votes Down Suggestion of Mayor Clark Relative to Ban on Shingled Roofs—Test of New Pumps.

The monthly meeting of the City Council Tuesday night produced some excitement in the form of a clash between Ald. Mitchell and Ald. Goodspeed in regard to the proposed lease of the old street lighting plant in Carleton street, to the Fredericton Ice Cream Co. Ald. Mitchell pressed for the lease to be given and Ald. Goodspeed took the view that city property should not be leased to a new organization which was to compete with established business. The matter was allowed to remain in the hands of the Finance Committee.

An abrupt adjournment when Ald. Goodspeed was desirous of bringing up a matter connected with Hospital also caused some irritation.

Opposition to the Building Law.

When the report of the Committee on Legislation was presented the proposed bills were read. That to amend the Building Law in a number of particulars caused some discussion and both His Worship the Mayor and Ald. Goodspeed expressed the opinion that provisions were drastic and would probably be opposed before the Legislature. The Mayor objected to the section banning shingled roofs in the entire fire district. He had expressed opposition to that measure before. Ald. Goodspeed expressed the opinion that the section banning any wooden structure within the area bounded by Smythe, Brunswick and Saint John streets and the River Saint John was much more drastic.

The views of the Mayor in regard to the section to which he objected were embodied by Ald. Mitchell in a motion that the change be not effective until January 1st, 1927. Ald. Thompson seconded the motion but all the other members of the Council opposed the motion and defeated it.

It was decided that the entire Council be notified of the time of testing the new pumping units at the Pumping Station F. A. Barbour of Boston is to represent the city and Prof. A. F. Baird is also. The representative of The Canadian Fairbanks Morse Limited is L. C. Laing.
