Western Section Title; Among Colleges Won At Truro by U. N. B. Team

Score 5 to 2 — Red and
Black Took Good Lead
and Held It—St. Francis
Xavier to be Played
Tonight for Mari-
time College Title.

University of New Brunswick hockey team came through at Truro last night winning the title of the Western Section by beating Acadia University 5 to 2. That the news was pleasing to the supporters of the Red and Black hardly needs saying. The final result was no surprise when the score of 4 to 0 was announced at the beginning of the last period. U. N. B. evidently made their score and lay back on the lead.

The result leaves no doubt as to the superiority of the local college team as in two matches at Fredericton and Truro U. N. B. has scored ten goals to Acadia's five.

The hope of the U. N. B. fans now is that the Red and Black come through tonight in the inter-sectional match with St. Francis Xavier at Truro. Scoring is not much in comparing the two teams. King's College and St. F. X. drew the first time they met and the second time St. F. X. won 2 to 0. King's tied Mount A. at Sackville and beat Acadia at Wolfville by two goals. U. N. B. has beaten Acadia twice and lost to Mount A. by one goal at Sackville. The dope would indicate that the Red and Black and St. Francis were evenly matched. "Chuck" McDonald seems the dangerous man on the Blue and White team.

KEENE SCORED FIVE.

Red and Black Had Acadia Easily—
Individual Play.

Truro, N. S., Feb. 24—Hockey players of the University of New Brunswick tonight defeated Acadia University 5 to 2, in the sudden death battle for supremacy in the Western section of the Maritime intercollegiate hockey league.

The play was fairly rough but with fast spots and excellent individual work by Keene and Steen, of U. N. B. and Wright and Johnston of Acadia. Hickson of the New Brunswick team in goal, did fine work while McKenna, in the opposing nets, had a hard game to handle.

Keene scored the five goals for U. N. B. and Wright and McLatchey both scored one for Acadia. The first period opened slow and continued ragged throughout. Keene rushed up the ice with the rubber and scored to first goal a few minutes after the whistle. A dingy battle ensued for a time, when Keene again slammed the disc past McKenna for the second tally. The period ended with both teams working hard.

The second period was a little improvement over the first. Missions were numerous both sides being the offenders. Steen made a pretty rush up the ice and slammed the rubber at the nets. At first it looked like a goal, but the goal judge declared it no tally. After a few minutes of the best brand of hockey handed out during the evening Keene secured the rubber and drove the third goal home, followed shortly after by another fast run up the ice. With good stick-handling he scored again.

J. N. B. Lay Back.

The third period showed Acadia to advantage over U. N. B. The Wolfville players put up a determined fight from the opening whistle. A little combination work was introduced and as a result Wright poked in the first tally for Acadia on a pass from R. C. Johnston.

The game proceeded fast for a time and Keene again caught the rubber and skated through the entire Acadia team for his fifth goal of the game. With about two minutes to go Acadia put on a fresh burst of speed and McLatchey scored with a pretty shot from the wings.

Wilkie Fails to Arrive.

Eric Dexter refereed. Will Wilkie of Halifax was to have handled the game but did not show up.

A special train from Wolfville brought hockeyists and about 175 fans to back the Acadia team.

Consider the pin—its head keeps it from going too far.

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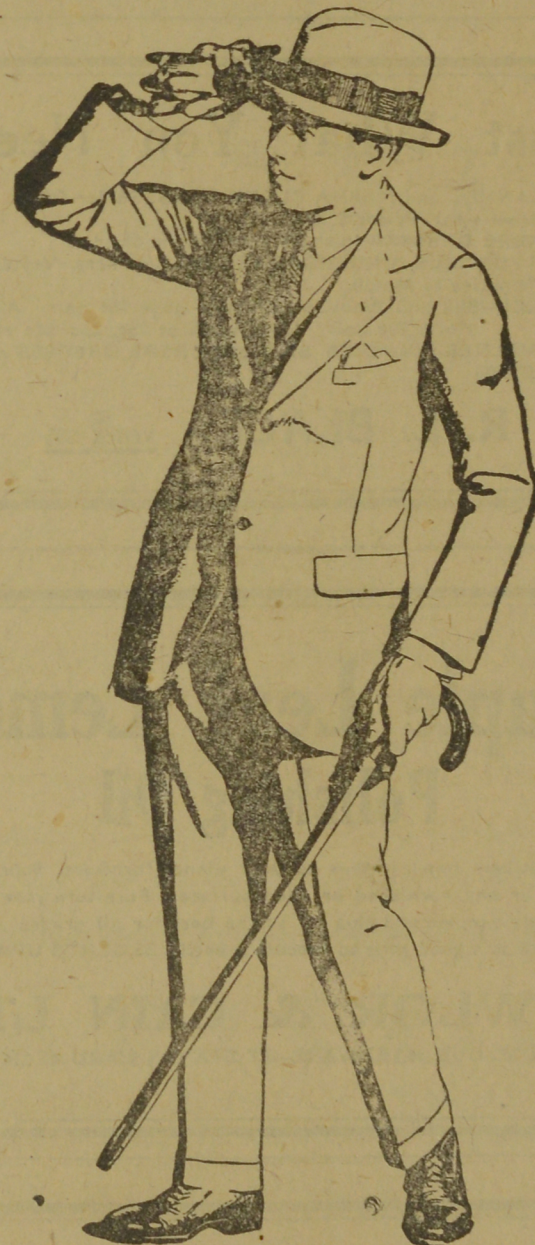
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
