

RICE MOLD WITH RAISINS.

Boil one cup of rice as usual; put into Turk's head, which has been rinsed with cold water; set aside until cold. Turn out on large plate, fill the centre with raisins and

place raisins around the edge Raisins: Wash one cup raisins put into saucepan with one cup cold water; bring to boil; add one teaspoon cornstarch mixed with a little cold water and a pinch of salt; boil five minutes. One tablespoon of sugar may be added if desired.

PEACHES AND RICE.


