STUMPAGE COLLECTIONS FOR PAST YEAR; BATHURST CO. HEAVIEST CONTRIBUTOR

The stumpage collections of the Department of Lands and Mines totalled \$790,526.52 for the past fiscal year according to the annual report of the department tabled Thursday before the House of Assembly. The largest contributor was the Bathurst Co. Limited with a total of \$96,000 in round numbers. The Richards Manufacturing Co. is second with little in excess of \$37,000. Fraser Companies Limited is third with \$50,000. The Nash-week Pulp & Pulp Paper Co. is fourth with \$46,400. Fifth place is taken by Stetson, Cutler Co. (Saint John) with \$38,000 and sixth by Stetson, Cutler Co. (Campbellton) with \$38,300. The Miramichi Lumber Co. contributes \$37,000 and the Louison Lumber Co. \$33,600. The Gloucester Lumber & Trading Co. comes next with about \$32,000. There are other amounts almost as great.

boys as their attention was directed toward the freight train or toward the other boys, were struck by the C. N. R. express. The crew of the latter was unaware of the accident until blood was observed on the engine in Fredericton station.

Surviving Relatives.

Gordon C. Blizzard is survived by his parents and by four brothers and five sisters. The brothers and sisters are Earle, Roy, Douglas, John, Elizabeth, Elsie, Frederica, Elvin and Winnifred. Mrs. Blizzard was attending an illustrated lecture in St. Margaret's Hall by Rev. A. F. Bate when some one rushed in inquiring for her husband and saying that one of his sons had been killed. The shock to her was severe. The funeral will be from St. Margaret's, Sunday afternoon.

Vincent D. Doherty is survived by his father, his mother having died some years ago, also by two sisters Mrs. Guy Hickey and Miss Lavina Doherty and one brother John. The funeral will take place Saturday afternoon with service at St. Dunstan's Church.

No Inquest Necessary.

Dr. D. W. Ross, coroner, visited the scene of the accident and decided that an inquest would not be necessary as no blame attached to the train crew and the deaths had been entirely accidental. Dr. Ross decided by the appearance of the bodies that death had been instant the boys being struck by projecting parts of the engine. They had not been under the wheels.

THE HOUSE GOT AWAY TO

A GOOD START YESTERDAY

In this province. It is with profound sorrow that I first speak of the death of Queen Alexandra, the loving and faithful mother of our reigning Sovereign, and it was with the deepest grief we learned of her death. In her passing the Empire sustained a loss which has reached out to all parts of the world and we, in the province of New Brunswick join in expressing our deepest sorrow for those she has left to mourn. Let her life, characterized by sympathy and devotion for her children be emulated by the womanhood of Canada.

Deceased Members.

Likewise, Mr. Speaker, in the brief interval of time which has elapsed since the general election, the hand of death has removed from our midst, Mr. J. M. Flewelling, representing the constituency of Charlotte, and Mr. F. L. Potts, member for Saint John county. Such has been the visitation of Providence on our numbers in the brief space of six months and we are called upon to lament their absence from our midst. It was not my good fortune to come closely in contact with the honorable members, however, measured by their consecrated devotion to their public, I formed of their characters a high opinion, and I am sure we all regret that such an occurrence has taken place and I am certain the honorable members, irrespective of their affiliations will join with me in expressing profound sympathy to the respective families of the deceased members in the great loss which they have sustained.

Policy of Economy.

From a business viewpoint the Speech from the Throne furnishes many substantial grounds for congratulations. It is gratifying to learn that the Government intends to make economy its policy in the administration of the various departments, and as the result of wholly extravagant obligations for which the previous Government is solely responsible the task thrown upon the Government is a very onerous one. But, Sir, it is pleasing to note that it is the intention of the Government to pay current expenditures out of ordinary revenue each year, rather than accumulating deficit after deficit until they reach such proportions as to require a bond issue to liquidate them. This unbusinesslike practice of the previous government has resulted in some measure of increasing the bonded indebtedness of this province to almost a startling figure. In order to accomplish this the matter of revenue will require careful consideration. Taxes are odious, but yet essential and they should be assessed and levied upon such people and enterprises best able to afford them. However, Mr. Speaker, from the sentiments expressed in the Speech from the Throne I have every confidence in the Government, that notwithstanding the unfortunate state of affairs that greeted them or assuming the reins of power; and after an honest and frank enquiry as to the present financial situation, they will establish the business of this province on a solid foundation.

Transportation.

Mr. Speaker, the matter of transportation is of paramount importance to the people of the Maritime Provinces today, and that the government has seriously considered this problem in conjunction with Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island, and have employed an expert in transportation questions is an achievement deserving of our commendation. The matter of railway rates, as they are related to the Maritimes will be argued at Moncton on April 6th and measured by the progress thus far developed.

I hope we can confidently look forward to such adjustments as will ameliorate the conditions that now exist.

The matter of transportation rates concerns the entire population, for if the manufacturer is unable to transport his products to the markets of Central Canada on account of excessive freight rates, and is unable to meet competition, it reflects upon the whole industrial life of the community. Therefore, it is my urgent wish that the hearing at Moncton will in some measure relieve these Provinces from one of our greatest drawbacks and we will be able to enjoy a greater measure of business relationship with the central markets.

Tourist Traffic.

It is exceedingly pleasing to know that the Government intends to devote considerable efforts in the matter of increasing tourist traffic in the provinces. In taking steps in this direction the Government is showing itself truly progressive, and I feel sure their efforts along this line will have a beneficial result to be enjoyed by all. The tourist traffic by automobile is practically only in its infancy and considering what this province has to offer in the way of facilities, natural scenery, and good roads, the possibilities in this effort are unlimited. Not only do tourists leave considerable money while visiting the Province, but many of them become attracted with our country, are better acquainted with our possibilities, and probably some may be induced to remain. And as quite a large percentage of tourists are representative of capital their visit may result in developing the industrial life of this province. Hence, I feel sure that any provisions that might be made in this endeavour will merit the approbation of all citizens.

Hydro Development.

The Government's hydro policy announced in the Speech from the Throne, will I apprehend, find the attentive ear of the people of this province. The Government, Sir, in the short space of time they have been in power, made a good beginning in this regard in their selection of the Hydro Commission, the personnel of which bespeaks confidence and business acumen in the administration of this important factor in the industrial and commercial life of the Province. It is but natural that in industry will locate, where power at a minimum cost can be secured, and with careful management the indications are that hydro can be developed in this Province at such a cost as will invite the establishment of progressive industries, and thus retain many of our young men at home. The proposed development at Nepisiguit by local capital, will be welcomed by the people of this province as well as those who reside in proximity to the undertaking. And more especially will it be welcomed in view of the fact that it will not cost the Province one cent, but on the contrary will contribute to the revenue.

Mr. Speaker, in conclusion, permit me to congratulate the Honorable member for Kings on his able and comprehensive effort in moving the Address, and at the same time to endorse the sentiments he so clearly expressed. There are other matters in the Speech from the Throne upon which I should like to comment, but this House has been so indulgent that I feel in duty bound not to trespass further upon its patience.

Debate Adjourned.

HON. MR. VENIOT moved the adjournment of the debate.

PREMIER BAXTER moved that further consideration of the proposition be postponed.
