

VOCATIONAL
DIRECTOR IS
NOT YET NAMED

Board Adjourned Last Evening After Clearing Up Accumulated Routine Business and Organizing.

The New Brunswick Vocational Board which was in session here on Thursday, made no appointment of a director in succession to Fletcher Peacock now Vocational Director of Saint John. The matter is still awaiting action on the part of the Board. J. D. Palmer, chairman of the Board, announces that the session was spent in clearing up accumulated routine business and organizing for the future. The Board will meet from time to time but the date for the next meeting has not been set.

The Department has functioned for some time without a Director and it is likely that it will continue to function so for some time longer. By legislation passed at the last session of the House of Assembly the connection between the Vocational Department and the Education Department has been made closer, the Vocational Department being subordinate to the other. Formerly it was practically a separate department. It is expected that the change will produce good results.

With the withdrawal of the Federal grants at the expiration of the set period, all towns, cities and villages in the Province which desired to come under the Vocational Act as far as financial aid was concerned have done so. Practically all buildings erected under the Act are now completed and in use.

TWO BRIDGE
CONTRACTS ARE
AWARDED

Hon. D. A. Stewart, Minister of Public Works of New Brunswick, who was here Thursday engaged in departmental work, awarded the contracts for two bridges while here. The awards are as follows:—

Northwest Miramichi Bridge (Sinclair's), Parish of Newcastle, Northumberland County, contract awarded to Dennis LeBlanc, Legerville, Kent County. Price about \$6,000. Five tenders. Contract calls for reduction of grades and replacing of cribwork with stone.

West (Henry) Concrete Box Culvert and Roadway Embankment, Parish of Dundas, Kent County, contract awarded to Harold N. Price, Moncton. Price about \$1,500. Nine tenders.

Much Deadwood Stricken From the Lists—Revising Officer is to Hold Court Here Next Week.

Registration of voters for the urban district of Fredericton has been completed and the lists are now ready for the revising officer, Hon. A. R. Shipp.

A decrease of six hundred in the total registration in Fredericton compared with 1925 has been found. This is not due entirely to the removal of people from the city but largely to the fact that deadwood had been allowed to accumulate over a period of years in the city assessment rolls which were used as the basis of the electoral lists. These names are now struck off.

Revising Officer's Court.

Judge Shipp will hold court as revising officer next week beginning Tuesday. Those who have objections to make as to omissions or other errors may appear before him and register their complaints.

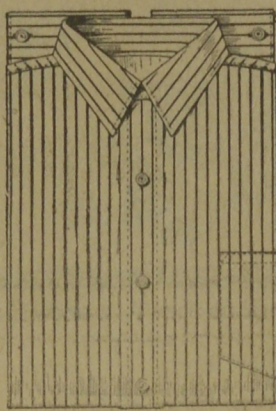
