A Canadian, heachieved world-wide notoriety 15 years ago by going over Niagara Falls in a steel barrel. When the barrel was drawn ashore and Leach was released he was battered in even the horn of plenty unless it and exhausted, and one of his legs played jazz. was at first thought to be broken. It wasn't, however, at that time; but, perhaps it was that same member that figured in his death in far-off New Zealand. According to the news dis patch Leach died from injuries tecrived when he slipped on a piece of orange peel in the street. That fall cessary to read from left to right. shattered his leg so badly that it was found necessary to amputate it. Fate plays many ironical tricks upon man, but not many so striking as this.
