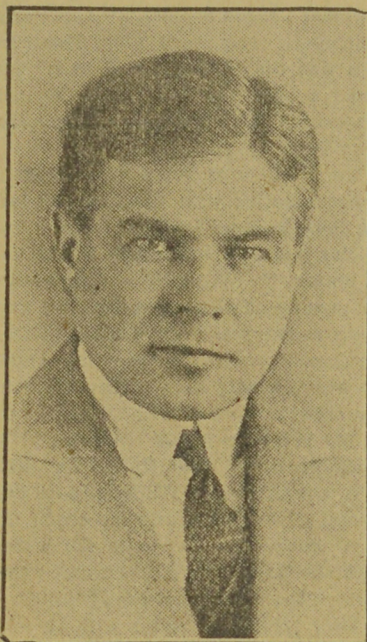

# PRESIDENT BEATTY OF THE C. P. R. SEES EVIDENCE OF PROGRESS IN WEST; BUOYANT FAITH IN CANADA

Montreal, Sept. 9—"I have made regular and frequent trips to Western Canada during the past ten years, and I can safely say that at no time have I seen greater evidence of its progress or more confidence in the future than was observable on the trip which the directors have just completed," said E. W. Beatty, president of the Canadian Pacific Railway Company, on his arrival here yesterday afternoon from a tour of inspection over Canadian Pacific lines as far west as Victoria, B. C., it was announced today.

"It is true," said Mr. Beatty, "that weather conditions on the prairies during the past week have not been satisfactory and that cutting and threshing operations have been gen-

erally delayed, but this circumstance has had no other effect among the farmers than temporary disappointment that they cannot have their grain ready for shipping as soon as was expected.

## Buoyant Faith in Canada.

"Throughout the prairie provinces there was no other feeling than that of buoyant faith in the country and its future—a faith which is amply justified by the really remarkable recovery the whole west is making."

Mr. Beatty said that British Columbia is notable for the improvement in general conditions there.

"Vancouver," he said, "is flourishing and it is, without question, one of the busiest cities in the whole of Canada. Trade through the port, which has increased very greatly during the past few years, still continues to show improvement and the three major industries of the province, lumber, fruit raising and mining, are in a better position than they have been for some time past. While it is quite true that the lumber business must of necessity fluctuate in accordance with the changing market conditions in the United States and Canada, the quietness is usually only temporary and it is one of the conditions of the trade which is never unexpected. The fruit crops have been uniformly better than last year and the mineral development is progressing satisfactorily. Improved processes of ore reduction and extraction will undoubtedly bring into operation many properties, the character of the ore of which would not permit of profitable development in past years and it is beyond question that only an infinitesimal part of the wealth of that province has yet been developed.

## Decisive Result Wished.

Mr. Beatty found upon all sides a profound desire that the elections should have a decisive result.

"The feeling among the business men of the west," he said, "is the same as that of the east, namely, that given a government capable of functioning fully, both administratively and legislatively, Canada would enter upon a period of prosperity which has no parallel in the past.

"I have rarely seen," said Mr. Beatty, "such quiet but universal confidence expressed nor at any time has there been, I think, such a widespread demand for immigration measures. It is felt that immigration to an extent that will meet the country's needs can result only from two causes, one, a general balanced prosperity within the country itself, and the other, effective, efficient and active efforts by the government and by the colonization organizations working in conjunction with the government.

## Geographic Fight.

"The old fight against geography will always be maintained in Canada," he said, "but the success of our efforts

in meeting the geographical disabilities will be greatly expedited by more people, and what now appears to be a problem embarrassing to our progress, will disappear when our population exceeds the present by a few more millions. Canada is a very great country and its widely separated territories require more than usual mutual understanding by its people. Prosperity generally begets a more tolerant feeling towards the needs of other parts of the country and I found nothing in western Canada that indicated any lack of appreciation of the needs of the east, though of necessity and quite naturally, local interests are not lost sight of. One of the factors which has contributed to this result has, I think been the travel of easterners to western Canada which is yearly becoming more extensive and which has the dual result of supplementing the easterner's knowledge and therefore making him a better Canadian and of adding to his appreciation of the value and national importance of western industry and enterprise.

## Sentiment Better.

"It appears to me," said Mr. Beatty, "and this view is shared by the directors of the company, that a better, real Canadian sentiment is developing throughout the whole country, and this in spite of the rather disturbed atmosphere which is incident to a strenuous election contest.

"Railway facilities to ensure the movement of the crop are already provided," he said, "and given fair weather conditions, the crop will be large and its transportation expeditious."

## HON. MR. BAXTER CAMPAIGNING IN NOVA SCOTIA

### Premier Discussed Maritime Rights Before Big Audience at Amherst.

Amherst, Sept. 9—Premier J. B. M. Baxter of New Brunswick, tonight spoke before 1,300 people, in the first mass meeting of the campaign held here in the Liberal-Conservative candidate, Robert K. Smith. Associated with the two speakers, Premier Baxter and Mr. Smith, was Hon. Percy C. Black, Minister of Highways for Nova Scotia. Dr. J. A. Munro was chairman.

Premier Baxter gave a complete resume of the issues of the campaign dealing with such matters as Maritime Rights, the customs scandal, the Robb budget and other important matters. He also referred to the remarks of Hon. Charles A. Dunning, agent the people of the Maritimes and answered the live, marry and die statement of the former Minister of Railways. "Is this the proper return to be made by an immigrant boy to the people who made possible for him the creation of a home and the hospitality of a free land, in the Dominion of Canada," said Premier Baxter. In this connection he desired the instrumentality of the people of the Maritime Provinces in the development of western Canada.

## Customs and Budget.

Premier Baxter spoke upon the appointment of Hon. Jacques Bureau to the senate and dealt briefly upon the monies lost by the Dominion through the weaknesses of the customs department. He also took up in detail the various items on the Robb budget dealing with reduced taxation. He stated in particular that the workmen of the Dominion, who were not affected by the reduction in income tax still found it necessary to pay for necessities of life through the medium of the sales tax.

In reviewing the question of Maritime rights he took up the remarks offered on the previous evening by Senator Robinson of Moncton who had declared Maritime rights to be an epidemic that had affected the minds of the people in the election of 1925. "It must have been widespread," was the assertion offered by the New Brunswick Premier, as it had effect upon the people of Ontario, British Columbia and the western provinces.

Barker House to the Queen. The verdict in favor of the plaintiff is being appealed by the defendant.

## School Teacher's Case.

The only County Court Division appeal, Desrosiers vs. Trustees of School District No. 1, Balmoral, arises out of the action of Madame Desrosiers against a school board for salary. She was engaged by certain members of the Board but others did not wish to engage her and another teacher took her place. Madame Desrosiers winning her case the Board is appealing.

## First Prohibition Appeal.

In the Crown Paper the case of The King on the information of Arthur H. Hiltz vs. George F. Crawford, the appeal is the first to be taken under an amendment passed last session by the Legislature which places in a member of the Supreme Court the power to permit an appeal on "substantial and meritorious grounds".

The case comes from St. Stephen where a vendor alleges that he was supplied with liquor by the N. B. Liquor Commission but afterward was deprived of his vendorship. No legal means were given him to dispose of his stock which the Commission refused to repurchase. He then was prosecuted for having liquor in his possession illegally, was convicted and fined and his stock was seized.

## Moncton Income Tax Case.

From Moncton comes the other Crown paper case, The King vs. Robert Ed, which concerns the Dominion Income Tax. The defendant was charged with failing to make a return of his income. The appeal is taken from the Moncton Police Court.

The first two cases of the King's Bench Paper were entered at a previous session.

## INDIAN GUIDE TO GET AFTER J. A. STILLMAN

New York, Sept. 9—The New York Times says today that Frederick K. Beauvais, the Indian guide, named as co-respondent in James A. Stillman's suit for divorce, came to New York and announced that he was suing Mr. Stillman for \$500,000 for "libel and slander and defamation of character."

A copy of the summons and complaint, has already been served on Mr. Stillman, through his attorneys, who accepted service for him.

The principal allegation in Beauvais' complaint, his attorney said last night, described an alleged offer to the guide of \$250,000 if he would consent to aid Mr. Stillman in his efforts to get a divorce from Anne U. Stillman, which the guide refused. Beauvais contends that the unfavorable publicity he received from the divorce suit, has caused him to lose money, since people no longer will employ him as guide and shun him. Beauvais returned to his home in Montreal last night.

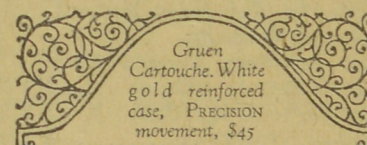
