POLL OFFICIALS
FOR TUESDAY

Some Selected as Deputy Returning Officers Unable to Act — Ballot Boxes Being Distributed.

Sheriff J. B. Hawthorne as Returning Officer for York-Sunbury in the Federal general election on Tuesday next, with his clerk, H. G. Fenety, are busily engaged today in lining up the Deputy Returning Officers for the various polling places of the two counties. They are upwards of sixty in number and the task of getting them is no easy one. The list was completed but in a number of cases those selected found themselves unable to act and so informed the Sheriff. That forced him to make other arrangements. It is believed that by Saturday everything will be ready.

Ballot-boxes to Go Out.

Another portion of the Returning Officer's duties is to distribute ballot-boxes to the various polling places where they are placed in the charge of the Deputy Returning Officers. Accompanying the ballot-boxes are the official ballots, and necessary books and documents.

The total registered electorate of York-Sunbury is not materially different in numbers from that of 1925. There was a reduction when the list first was made up but there have been substantial additions.

Portrait of Chief Justice Arrives But Time of Presentation Not Yet Known—The Barker House Case Appealed—School Teacher's Case From Restigouche County Also Appealed—Income Tax Case From Moncton.

The September Session, Court of Appeal, is to open here on Tuesday next, September 14th. The presentation of a portrait of the Chief Justice may take place at that session but definite word has not been received from Dr. F. R. Taylor, K. C., president of the Barristers' Society. The portrait is now here.

Large Docket.

The docket for the September Session is longer than usual including twelve cases in various divisions.

The fact that the day of the Federal general election and the first day of session, are the same may make some difference in the procedure but nothing is known concerning that yet.
