## FREDERICTON PRES BYTERY OF UNITED CHURCH MAKES CONFERENCE ARRANGEMENTS

Maritime Conference at Sackville Beginning Next Tuesday—Rev. James W. Howe of Stanley to Return to Active Ministry—Reports Received.

The Fredericton Presbytery of the United Church of Canada was in session here Tuesday, the session which was a special meeting, taking the place of the June session, because of the Maritime Conference which opens at Sackville on Tuesday the 25th. The Presbytery met morning and afternoon. After adjournment in the afternoon the delegates attended a supper served in St. Paul's Church by the ladies of the Presbyterial.

The Nominating committee of the Presbytery was elected as follows:—Rev. J. M. Rice, Rev. W. A. Patterson, Rev. A. E. Chapman, H. S. Campbell and William Harvey.

Conference committees were named as follows:—Nominating Committee, Rev. A. T. King, Rev. J. B. Gough; Settlement Committee, Rev. Dr. J. S. Sutherland, Rev. F. H. Holmes.

Harold J. Rowley was examined in reference to theological studies and was recommended for ordination at conference next week.

### Afternoon Session.

## THE PREMIER AND HON. R. B. BENNETT TAKE PART IN THE BUDGET DEBATE; LARGE CROWD IN ATTENDANCE

Ottawa, May 18—Final day of debate on the budget brought a swift change.

Since debate opened a month ago, speeches have dragged along in a half-empty house and with sparsely attended galleries.

Today, members crowded the house. Galleries were packed. Premier King held the floor for over three hours. Rt. Hon. Arthur Meighen, Opposition leader, was absent. Mr. Meighen has been confined to his room through illness for a week past and Hon. R. B. Bennett, of West Calgary spoke in his stead.

Premier King spoke of the Mansion amendment to the budget resolutions as a "milk and water" amendment. It meant nothing for good or ill, did not touch on vital questions of tariff at all but dealt merely with incidental procedure.

### Sharp Comments.

There were some sharp comments across the floor when Premier King referred to Mr. Meighen as having said at Kitchener during the campaign that the British preference was wrong in principle and unjust to the workers of Canada.

"I wonder what would have been said," proceeded Mr. King, "if I had made a statement like that in a community which has the largest number of Germans in it, I believe of any community in Canada."

Dealing with the tariff advisory board, Mr. King said that the Government had promised its appointment. But every time it had been mentioned it had been made quite clear that tariff in the last analysis had to be settled on the floor of Parliament and that the appointment of the board would in no way tie the hands of the Government. In its appointment of the board the Government fulfilled its pledge.

"I would have preferred that before the changes were made in the automobile tariff that it could have been referred to the tariff board," stated Premier King.

Hon. R. B. Bennett.

"I rise to support the amendment," said Hon. R. B. Bennett, at the opening of his speech. "In clear and unambiguous language it is a challenge to this House and to this nation. It sets forth that promises made in Speeches from the Throne should not be made to be disregarded."

Mr. Bennett was early in conflict with Liberal members. He charged that Mr. King had made statements meant to mislead. There were loud

cries of "order" and appeals to the Speaker. Mr. Bennett withdrew the words and went on to quote other reports of Mr. Meighen's Kitchener speech to show that what Mr. Meighen had advocated was preference for preference. "This," said Mr. Bennett, "has long been the doctrine of the Conservative party."

When the government had threatened to reduce the agricultural implement duty that gentleman who had been defeated in Durham county as the government candidate had almost cried. But if that gentleman would permit the withdrawal of the personal restriction upon a letter written by him to the leader of the opposition, the people of this country would have a clearer understanding of his position. When he and Mr. Bradshaw of his company came to Ottawa declaring that their industry was to be ruined, the government then placed the material going into the implements upon the free list and now the industry is prospering. Mr. Bennett declared it was duplicity and hypocrisy. By that action of putting materials on the free list a natural market for Nova Scotia iron and steel was lost. And what did the Maritimes receive for it? A Royal Commission.

## GAUTHIER IS TOLD TO PRODUCE HIS FIRMS BOOKS

Was Given 48 Hours to Do So—Must Report Daily to the Committee.

Ottawa, May 18—J. H. Gauthier, a partner in the R. & G. Company of Rock Island, Que., manufacturers of overalls and shirts, was today given 48 hours to produce books and documents which the auditors of the customs inquiry committee have been unable to locate. In addition he must report daily in the room where the committee holds its sittings.

Chairman Paul Mercier first suggested that Gauthier go down to Rock Island and endeavor to find these books and documents. Other members of the committee objected to his leaving Ottawa and conferring with his partner in the business. It was then decided that Mr. Gauthier would remain here.

### Stevens Protests

At one point Hon. H. H. Stevens protested that Mr. Gauthier was "just trifling with the committee." This was when the witness answered, "I don't remember" to the question whether or not he ever smuggled goods into Canada. Later the witness admitted that his firm had been requested to make a settlement of \$1,656 with the customs in connection with a seizure of smuggled goods. The witness said this amount was paid to J. E. A. Bissillon, former customs preventive officer at Montreal.

Gauthier was called to tell where the committee might obtain the missing books and documents of the firm, which the auditors have been unable to find. He was unable to shed any light on the mystery, neither could he tell where the cancelled checks of the company for 1924 and previous to that year were to be found.

### Firm Suspected

"Is there anything that you do know positively," asked F. L. Calder, commission counsel, with impatience, at one point.

Hon. H. H. Stevens informed the witness that his firm was suspected of engaging in smuggling.

He pressed to find if the witness had destroyed or hidden the missing books and papers, but Gauthier persisted in his statement that he could not remember.

"Don't pull that silly stuff here," retorted Mr. Stevens, but the witness would admit nothing.

"Do you often engage in smuggling?" he was asked.

"It is not my custom to do that," replied Gauthier.
