Mlle. Lenglen AND HELEN WILLS TO MEET SOON

Match Next Month in England is Possible—French Girl's Health is Much Better.

Paris, May 28.—There is a strong possibility that the second meeting between the two queens of the tennis world—Suzanne Lenglen and Helen Wills—will occur in the finals of the international hard court championships which begin June 2.

While no definite announcement has been made that Mlle. Lenglen has reconsidered her first decision not to play in the singles in any tournament until Wimbledon, it was learned that her health has improved so rapidly in recent weeks that she again is ready to enter the lists. Her long rest has so improved her game that her name probably will be included in the draw for the international event which will be announced tonight or tomorrow.

HOFF THREATENS TO BRING SUIT

Pasadena, Calif., May 28.—Charles Hoff, suspended Norwegian pole vaulter has sent a telegram to Frederick W. Rubien, secretary of the A. A. U. in which he struck somewhat bitterly at the failure of the A. A. U. officials to give a decision on evidence and a plea for Hoff's reinstatement forwarded through the Southern Pacific branch of the A. A. U. The telegram also carried a threat of court action.

A few days ago, Hoff declared his intention of sailing within the next week for Norway.

WALKER PUTS IN FORMAL BID FOR NEW BOUT

Latzo is Expected to Accept the Challenge—Deposit Accompanied Offer as Bona Fide.

Philadelphia, May 28.—Mickey Walker who last week lost the world's welterweight championship made good his declaration that he would challenge Pete Latzo, his conqueror, for another bout.

The Jersey fighter appeared at the office of the State Athletic Commission here with Jack Kearns, his manager, formally filed a defiance and backed it up with a \$2,500 certified cheque as evidence of good faith. Pete Latzo is expected to lose no time in accepting the challenge.

RABBIT BALL IS MYSTERY

There is a suspicion that there is more or less "funny business" with regard to the quality of the balls introduced in the major leagues from time to time. Certainly there is something mysterious about it all. In the ten games played in the American and National Leagues on Tuesday a total of 122 runs was made and 210 hits resounded off the bats of the players. Eighty runs and 145 hits were made in the American League and 42 runs and 65 hits in the National. The American League teams have compiled a total of 131 home runs this season and the National 106. Does the American League record indicate better batters, poorer pitchers, or a more lively ball?

MATHEWSON MEMORIAL WAS UNVEILED

Impressive Ceremony at Boston Friday—Notables of Baseball Were Present—Memorial Fund Also.

Boston, Mass., May 28.—After the unveiling of a bronze memorial tablet to the memory of Christy Mathewson, who died last October while president of the Boston Braves, the home team proceeded to defeat the Giants 5-3 in the first game of the series here today.

Impressive ceremonies, prefaced the unveiling which was done by Mrs. Christy Mathewson, seated between Christy's father a civil war veteran, and young Christy, her son. Judge Landis, Governor Fuller, Mayor Nichols and President John A. Heydler of the National League were speakers. The proceeds of the game go to the Mathewson memorial fund, which is to be used for a clubhouse for the Saranac Lake, N. Y., American's Legion Post. Score R. H. E. CAMPBELLTON THINKS WELL OF HOCKEY PLAYERS

Presentation to Club Members Few Days Ago—Personnel of Team is Reviewed by Newspaper.

The Campbellton Hockey club N. B. and P. E. I. champions the players of which are well known here, were honored a few days ago by their fellow townsmen and given suitable gifts. The Campbellton Graphic reviews the team as follows:—

Defence Men.

In McLean the team has one of the ablest defence men in Maritime hockey. He is a good puck carrier and famous for his brilliant individual rushes on which he attains truly remarkable speed for a man of his weight. With Pete on the ice the other players always felt more free to attack trusting to his resourcefulness to cover up an unexpected and dangerous break.

In Sharp, Pete's partner, before the cage, the locals had a man who seemed to improve with every performance. Sharp has a lumbering style on skates that is very effective and when an opportunity opened he invariably made effective rushes. His ability at "breaking through" was often the delight of local fans.

The Forwards.

In the past season George Wilkins on the right wing, established himself as one of the hardest pluggers and steadiest players in provincial hockey. He is one of those men who have a mysterious supply source of dynamic energy and who regardless of the odds, are in the game every moment of play. His checking at times was uncanny and frequently broke the spirit of many a dangerous opponent.

Fred Thomas, on the opposite wing, is a real hockey player. He has a certain style all too often missing in the amateur, and is an excellent "shooter." Thomas has been playing for several years but the strain of the game has not detached from his ability.

Howard at centre is, considering his youth, one of the most promising younger hockeyists in the province. He is a clever stickhandler and a tricky man in the fast play. Added to this his bursts of speed are frequently brilliant.

Miller, relieving on defence, has all the requirements of a prospect for professional hockey. He is a born player and to his other qualifications is added speed that is truly amazing.

In Lavolette the local squad has an artist in poke checking and a hard-working hockeyist who is always eager to put his best into the game.

Colombe the most recent addition to the reserve, is a rugged and fearless player and one who never showed signs of fatigue even in the fastest play.

The most prominent feature of Shannon's appearances was his desire to do his part in an unobtrusive way. Unlike many younger players, he never went in for grand stand tactics and seemed content to co-operate with his team-mates in the most effective way. This quality alone deserves praise.

Goal Tenders.

In Campbellton's two goal tenders McKenzie and LeBlanc, the team had, during the past season, two of the best net minders in the New Brunswick leagues. LeBlanc gave many a brilliant performance in the local cage and never loafed on the job. McKenzie is as cool as the proverbial cucumber and it is a question if even the noted Finnigan could do better if he were a member of the Campbellton squad. In the hardest games McKenzie did some really marvelous work and his style of guarding the twine won the praise of every local fan.

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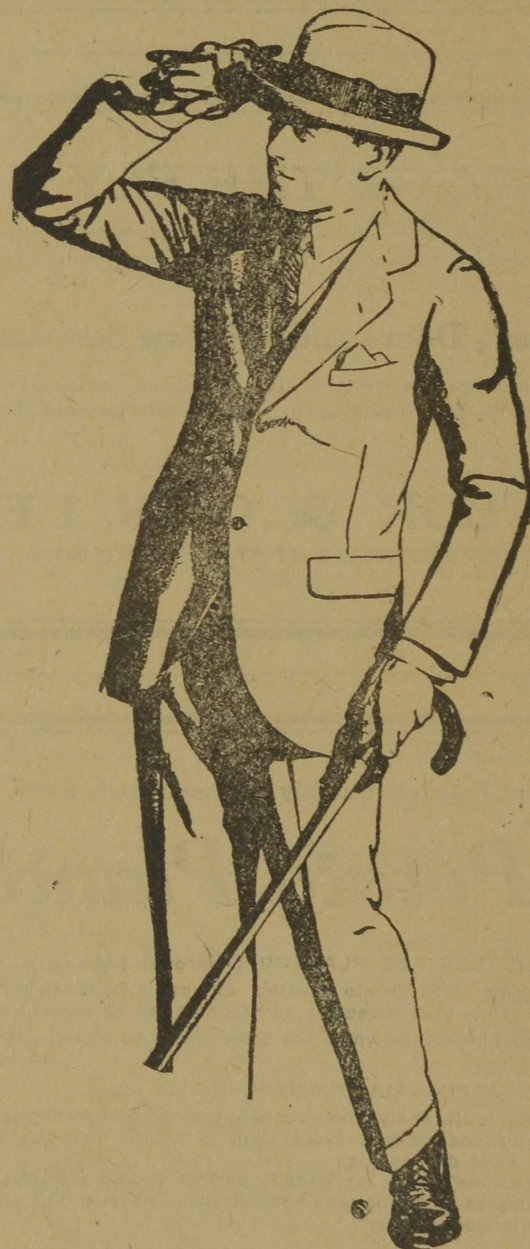
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
