SNUFFING A WAR SPARK.

Strained relations between France and Italy have resulted from the attempted assassination of Mussolini, a few days ago, by an Italian who came over from France to kill the duke.

Mussolini's subsequent warning to governments to be careful about harboring the foes of fascism was taken to mean France—as doubtless it did. But Mussolini was talking for effect among his black-shirt followers and listeners; he may have forgotten that France would pick up the remark, and that fascist newspapers in Italy would make it an excuse for much loud speaking.

France is handling the situation wisely. The French press has been requested by the government not to get excited; and for the most part it is heeding the advice. The press points out that France cannot treat Mussolini's enemies who may have become residents there as Mussolini would like to have them treated. But there is a general avoidance of counter threats.

Some of the French people are worried, saying that Premier Briand was off parleying in Geneva and by his soft words, inviting other nations to insult France! All the same, the present temper and self-restraint of France, derived from Locarno and Geneva and similar "parleying" will ease over the present crisis more effectively than the older spirit of retaliation.

It seems rather difficult to satisfy the people of the noble county of Westmorland in a political sense. In 1921 with a Conservative government in power they elected the present Senator Copp by 7000 majority. Had Mr. Copp been a candidate at the election of October last with a Liberal government in power he would probably have been beaten by 7000. He got out from under, however, and Dr. E. A. Smith took the beating intended for him. Dr. O. B. Price, Conservative was elected by a majority of 4000 as an opponent of the then government. At the election on Tuesday Dr. Price appealing for support as a supporter of a Conservative government had his majority cut from 4000 to 500.

Hope is held out that paresis, one of the heretofore hopeless manias of man, may be cured when the patient is infected with malaria germs.

If the surplus votes which the Conservative candidates secured in the protectionist cities of Toronto and Hamilton, Ontario, had been distributed over the province Premier Meighen would have had 82 supporters from Ontario. The trouble with the high tariff vote is that it is hived in the large centres of population.

The present standing of parties in the Senate is Conservatives 53, Liberals 39, Progressives 1 and three seats vacant. When the vacancies are filled the Conservatives will have a majority of ten.

Nine Liberal candidates running in Toronto constituencies lost their deposits in Tuesday's election. In Montreal constituencies six Conservatives met with the same fate. There is much food for thought in this.

The latest summary of the election results gives the Liberals 119; Conservatives, 90; Progressives, 8; Liberal-Progressives, 11; U. F. A., 11; Labor 3 and Independent 2.

Hon. Beniah Bowman, a former minister in the Drury government, and until recently a member of the Ontario House captured East Algoma for the Liberals in the late election, defeating Mr. G. B. Nicholson.

Larry Wilson of Montreal, who during the recent session announced his retirement from public life was prevailed upon by the Liberals to contest Vandreuil and came out a winner with a majority of 3,500.

THE OXFORDS HAVE ELECTED TWO LIBERALS

Woodstock, Ont., Sept. 16—The people of North and South Oxford are only today realizing to the full extent the victory of Liberalism in the general election in the two ridings. The final figures for South Oxford, giving Cayley 6,083 votes, and Hon. Donald Sutherland 5,339, a majority of 744 for the sanguine predictions of the Liberals. Commenting on the result of the election, Hon. Donald Sutherland today made the following statement.

"While our efforts yesterday were not successful, the results of the election throughout Canada, so far as is known at present, indicate the prevalence of sectionalism and provincialism to a degree which must be viewed with alarm by all, and is likely to result in a continuance of the bargaining and bartering which characterized the last Parliament. Time will justify the cause we represented. Indeed, the results of yesterday's election have already done so in a marked degree."


