FROM HUNTER OF IVORY BECOMES FOOTBALL COACH

Shaugnessy Who is Coaching McGill University Has Been a Scout for Detroit Tigers This Year.

Montreal, Sept. 16—McGill University's football squad got under way for coming season with a light workout Wednesday. The lengthy coach, Frank Shaugnessy, returned this morning from a summer at Detroit. Shaugnessy resigned his position as coach of the Reading Club in the International loop early in the season and become a rookie scout for the Detroit Tigers hunting up material for Ty Cobb amongst the minor leagues "in the sticks." The veteran scout says major league ball material is mighty scarce in the minor circuits this year.

The football coach grew out of the baseball scout on the long train journey, with the result that when Frank hit town this morning he went straight out to the Molson Stadium to give the turf the once over and to confer with Major Stuart-Forbes. The coach is optimistic though he knows little of any newcomers. The boys will have to hustle some to get in shape for their first game, which takes place on October 2, against the Old Boys. The following week they face Varsity.

DETROIT AFTER RECRUITS NOW

Detroit, Sept. 16—Frank Navin, President and Ty Cobb manager of the Detroit Baseball Club, already are laying plans for an improved pitching staff next year.

The club has just purchased two new pitchers, both of whom will report to Cobb in training camp next spring. They are Donald Hankins of Newark International League Club and George B. Lyons of Columbus American Association.

Both are righthanders and big fellows. Hankins has a record to date of 14 wins and six losses, while Lyons has won nine and lost ten games. It must be said in behalf of Lyons however, that he has been on a fall-end team all season. He has won almost one third of the games taken by his team proving he must be a pitcher.

The Tigers have several other pitchers in view to bolster up a weak staff and it seems certain that the flinging department will be improved.

WESTERN GIRL IS HIGH JUMPER

The next time Canada sends a women's track and field team to England there will be a capable applicant for the high-jumping job from Saskatoon. At Regina on Labor Day Ethel Catherwood smashed the world's record for women by doing 5 feet 2 7/16 inches. The mark formerly was held by Miss Eva Green, British champion at 5 feet 1 1/2 inches. The Saskatoon girl is slightly more than six feet in height and is a star basketball player and sprinter.

FRENCH TENNIS STARS TRIMMED AMERICANS

Both Tilden and Johnston Went Down — Cochet and Borotra Won Five-Set Matches.

Forest Hills, N. Y., Sept. 16—The downfall of "Big Bill" Tilden, six-time champion, today at the hands of Henri Cochet, of France, in the quarter finals of the National Tennis title tournament was followed by the defeat of "Little Bill" Johnston by Jean Borotra, another French star.

Both of the United States Davis Cup stars were victims of sensational five-set reverses.

Tilden was put out of the running for his seventh straight title by scores of 6-8, 6-1, 6-3, 1-6, 8-6, while Johnston lost to a startling come-back by the "Bouncing Basque" at 3-6, 4-6, 6-3, 6-4, 6-4.

WESTVILLE READY TO PLAY N. B. CHAMPIONS

New Glasgow, Sept. 16—By defeating Springhill four runs to one, Westville today won the championship of Nova Scotia and the right to enter the play-offs for the Maritime title. Lefty Albion, on the mound for the losers, pitched masterful ball, holding Westville to three hits, and deserved to win, but his mates failed him in the pinches.

CARDINALS NOW TIED WITH CINCINNATI

Beat Philadelphia Twice While Cincinnati Won One Game From New York — Row With the Umpire.

New York, Sept. 16—Although the Cincinnati Reds stretched their winning streak to eight in a row and goose-egged the Giants, 3 to 0 today, the St. Louis Cardinals went into a tie with the Reds in the pennant race by taking two games from the Phillies at Philadelphia.

The New York game was a brilliant pitching duel, in which Pete Donohue, Red hurler, conceded only four hits while his mates picked Virgil Barnes for six scattered ones.

Giants' Errors Costly.
Hendricks' men performed in impeachable style, committing no errors but two Giant mistakes, one in the first and another in the fourth inning, accounted for the scores.

The Cards smothered the Phillies in the first Philadelphia game, 23 to 3, and took the second game in easy fashion by the score of 10 to 2. St. Louis' 23 runs is the season's record in the senior league. The previous record for the season was made by Cincinnati, 21 runs, also against the Philadelphia team on Aug. 11. The first game was poorly played and the second was little better.

Umpire in Dispute.
The only pleasure the fans appeared to get out of the double-header was a dispute between members of the Philadelphia team and Umpire Klem in the sixth inning of the second game. Catcher Wilson was put out of the game for making a protest to Klem and in the argument that followed Manager Fletcher was also sent from the bench.

Then a yellow sign bearing the words "Catfish Klem" was hung from a window of the clubhouse and Umpire Klem held up the game until it was removed. Who hung the sign there could not be learned by the umpire.

Cleveland cut New York lead to four and one half games today by defeating the Yankees in a double bill, 2 to 1 and 5 to 0. In the first game Levens outpitched Reuther and won his own game with a single in the ninth inning.

SEAGER AND LANE ARE OUT WITH MONTREAL

Calcutta Fifteen Will Play Montreal English Again Next Saturday — Montreal Pulling Team Together.

Montreal, Sept. 15—The British Navy and Montreal will meet again in rugby matches twice this week. Tomorrow night the navy men of the squadron now in harbor have arranged for a match with Sun Life English Football Club to be played on the latter's grounds near Snowdon Junction. On Saturday afternoon the officers and men of H. M. S. Calcutta will play against the Montreal English Rugby Club at the M. A. A. Westmount grounds at 3.15.

Lieut-Commander Hallaran, former famous Irish International, will again captain the naval side, while Surgeon Commander Devas has again been extended an invitation to act as referee. The naval side will be much strengthened by their extra training and practices which they have been holding for the past week, and will field a formidable team.

Seager Back Again.

The Montreal English fifteen will be considerably stronger than they were last Saturday by the re-appearance of their captain, J. C. Seager, the brilliant half-back, while Temple Lane, well-known Halifax Wanderer has decided to turn out with the Montreal club, and will make his first appearance in the match with the Navy on Saturday. He has already been out to practise with his new team mates. He appeared last night in very fine condition, and will prove a valuable addition to the fifteen. In the match on Saturday he will in all probability play at centre three-quarters. Edwards, Montreal full back is rapidly approaching his very best form, and increased his length in kicking at the work out last night.

TILDEN LOOKS VERY OFF COLOR

Forest Hills, N. Y., Sept. 14—Exhibiting the most erratic tennis he has shown since becoming national champion six years ago William Tilden limped to his second victory today in the little tournament at the West Side Club.

"Big Bill," still favoring his strained knee, had as much difficulty overcoming his young protegee, Neil Sullivan of Bethlehem, Pa., as he did in disposing of John van Ryn Princeton youth. The titleholder was given a lively tussle before he gained control sufficiently to pull over the match at 4-6, 6-4, 6-2, 6-1. With Tilden still off form and his bid for a seventh championship apparently fading, the other fifteen tournament survivors reached the third round in a series of hard fought matches that produced numerous upsets.

ANOTHER INJUNCTION ON RICKARD

Philadelphia, Sept. 16—Legal action to prevent Tex Rickard from paying any prize money to Jack Dempsey or Gene Tunney until after the fight Sept. 23 was filed in the office of the prothonotary of common pleas court late today by the investigator of a Philadelphia law firm, who called himself a "taxpayer and ticket-holder."

Sol Wittenberg, the plaintiff, alleges that the Pennsylvania boxing law of 1923 forbids any payment of prize money being paid before a fight and provides that it shall be forfeited to the state if the fight is not on the square.

If Rickard has paid either Dempsey or Tunney any money his Pennsylvania license may be revoked by the Boxing Commission. Wittenberg's petition said.

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
