The ceremonial attracted a large number of people who motored from various parts of the Province to the scene. The granite cairn is situated at the roadside on glebe land and is in plain sight.

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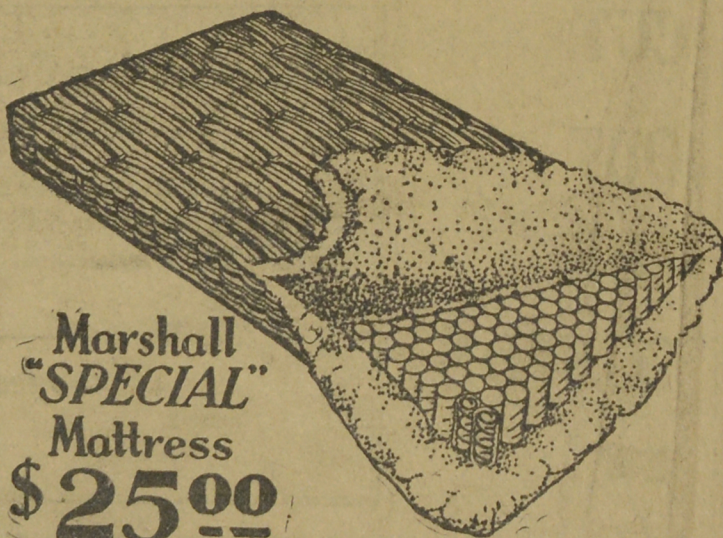
