BRITISH FOREIGN OFFICE VIEWS THE FIGHT IN CHINESE WATERS AS ACT OF LOCAL BRIGANDAGE

London, Sept. 8.—The British Foreign Office considers Monday's incident on the Yangtse, in which three British naval officers were mortally wounded by Chinese troops, as "an act of local brigandage," it was stated today.

It is not expected to develop into a diplomatic incident, officials said, for the reason that China is in a state of complete chaos, owing to civil war.

Great Britain, they added, is an impartial bystander in this Oriental turmoil, as has been indicated by incidents involving British, both at Canton and on the Yangtse, within the last week.

One Drown; Rest Safe.

Latest despatches from China indicate that all the mercantile marine officers who were held by the Chinese near Wanhhsien now are safe on British ships, with the exception of one who was drowned.

Great Britain is not likely to suggest joint action by the powers because of the Kiawo incident, which is regarded as a purely British affair. It is much like a controversy at Canton over the landing of British naval forces to protect British subjects and property.

It is felt here that the Kiawo incident would not have developed as it did had it been possible to negotiate directly with Wu Pei-Fu. As that general, however, was busily engaged in retreating, it was necessary to deal entirely with General Yangsen, who is Wu Pei-Fu's commander in the Wanhhsien district.

7 Killed, 15 Wounded.

Shanghai, Sept. 8.—Three British naval officers and four seamen were killed and two officers and 13 seamen wounded by Chinese troops of Wu Pei-Fu's northern armies at Wanhhsien, Chechwan province, 1,250 miles up the Yangtse River. The British gunboat Cockchafer returned the fire, doing considerable damage to Wanhhsien a city of 150,000. How many Chinese were killed or wounded is not known.

The conflict was begun when a British naval party of 40 men on a river

boat attempted to release two British steamers, the Wanhhsien and Wantung, seized by the Chinese in reprisal for the alleged drowning of 56 Chinese soldiers, Aug. 29, when the British steamer Wanlu, in attempting to escape from Chinese captors upset three native boats.

Those Killed.

The British killed were: Commander F. C. Barley and Lieutenant A. R. Higgins, of the Gunboat Dispatch; Lieutenant C. F. Ridge, of the Gunboat Cockchafer, and Seamen Farmer, Haslam, Marrott and Farrow. Those dangerously wounded were Lieut.-Commander L. S. Acheson, commander of the Cockchafer, and Seaman Beese, of the Gunboat Scarab. Others less severely wounded were Lieutenant J. O. Fogg Elliott, of the Gunboat Mantis and 12 seamen.

The Chinese troops were commanded by General Yang Sen, an adherent of Wu Pei-Fu, war lord of the central provinces, who was at Hankow, hundreds of miles distant defending himself against Cantonese forces. Yang's men had seized the British steamers Wanhhsien and Wantung, refused negotiations and threatened to fire upon the officers of the Gunboat Cockchafer.

Officers Rescued.

The British retired but the next day, Sept. 6, the small river steamer Niawo with 40 men of various British gunboats aboard, succeeded in rescuing the officers of the steamer Wanhhsien before the Chinese lining the banks of the Yangtse cease firing.

The British party under fire attempted to reach the Wangtung but 22 of the 40 men of the British navy were killed or wounded. They stood by however, with their unprotected native boat while the Wantung's officers leaped overboard and rescued all of them from the water except Chief Engineer Johnson who was wounded or drowned.

The British gunboat Cockchafer then bombarded the city of Wanhhsien, its shells doing much damage, with an undetermined number of Chinese casualties.

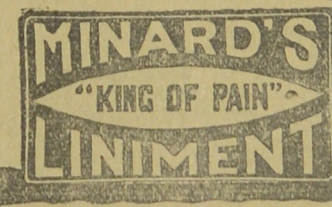

The plot in this picture is about a bad man who was mean to his dog.

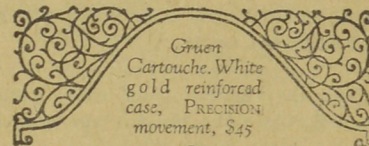
But there was a good man who saw the dog in trouble.
