

ROAD-MAKING  
MACHINES TO BE  
DEMONSTRATED

Infield of Race-track to  
be Used for Purpose—  
Auto Polo Matches are  
to be Played There  
Also.

The space inside the main building at the Fredericton Exhibition has been pretty well allotted to date but applications still are being made in interest in the fair being greater than ever on the part of exhibitors. One of the most recent applications was for space for the exhibition and demonstration of road-making machinery. The company which wishes to exhibit selects Fredericton as the capital of the Province as the most suitable place for the demonstration. The machines are motor-driven and considerable space would be required for demonstration. It is probable that the northern end of the infield of the half-mile race track will be used. That ground is low and it will be for the benefit of both exhibition and exhibitor to have the work done there.

**Auto Polo on Infield.**  
The exhibitions of auto polo which are to be daily features are to be given in the infield of the race track on the area used for baseball and football. In other places the matches have been played on the race track but it is feared that the cars would do such damage to the track that it would be to the disadvantage of the races.

**Rushing the Work.**  
With the opening only a week from Saturday work at the fair grounds is being rushed and everything done to have the exhibition complete for the formalities of the night of the 18th. The usual arrangement for flood lighting the grounds and the stage in the race-course on which the open air attractions are to be shown, is to be put in effect.

**For the Free-For-All.**  
Negotiations for outside horses for the free-for-all event of the races are being continued. The announcement that the Reed interests of Fort Fairfield have bought two new horses is taken as meaning that one will be a competitor for Bessie McKillop the Presque Isle free-foraller.

SEIZED RIFLES  
ATTRACTED MANY  
BIDDERSTODAY

Crown Land Office the  
Scene of the Liveliest  
Sale on Record—Good  
Prices Realized for  
Weapons.

The biggest sale of seized rifles, shot-guns and other weapons which ever took place at the Crown Land Office in the matter of attendance and keenness in bidding, was held today. The office was thronged by those interested in the sale the greater number coming in from fairly distant points. The total secured by the Department of Lands and Mines for twenty-seven lots including rifles, guns, automatic pistols and revolvers, was \$229.60. In addition a large number of seized traps were sold Louis Farrell of this city bidding in the lot for \$6.25.

Some of the Bidders.

The highest price was \$21.50 bid for a Winchester .32 rifle by John Dalton of Chipman. He was the heaviest purchaser of the sale buying seven rifles and guns. Jacques Vermeeran, second-hand dealer of this city purchased five. Various purchasers took the others. For some of the rifles the prices received were considered high.

The weapons and traps had been seized at various times by game wardens from persons who were violating the Game Act in various ways. It is said that in one case the original owner of a rifle was on hand to bid it in if possible.

Put Up Big Fight.

The record salmon caught at the Hartt's Island pool on Tuesday by Mr. Perry B. Perkins of Saint John tipped the scales at 25½ pounds. Mr. Perkins hooked the fish at the head of the bar and it led him a merry chase for nearly half a mile. Being without a gaff he succeeded in beaching the fish after a battle which lasted nearly an hour.

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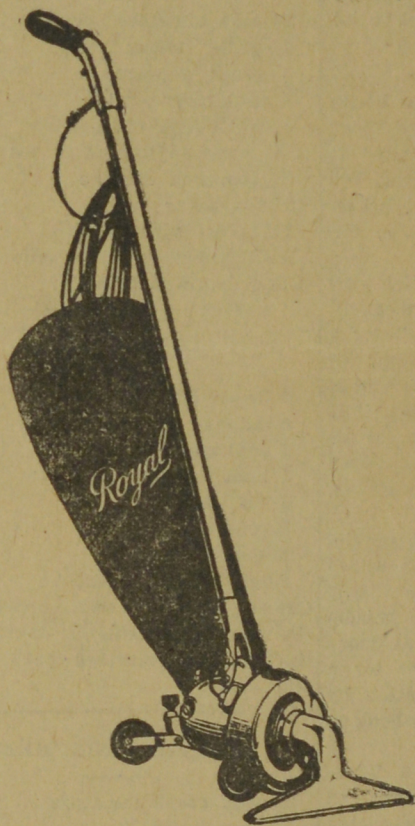
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
