OF COURSE IT'S NONSENSE.

Sir Oswald Mosley has a son who is married to a division of the Leiter fortune and, for diversion, is a parlor socialist.

Sir Oswald does not think much of his off-spring's sincerity. He says so frankly:

"His position is one bordering on hypocrisy. He has every opportunity to do good for his country. It is all very well for a young fellow born with a gold spoon in his mouth to go out preaching as he does, but he forgets that those he addresses face hunger and its hardships. Some day he will learn that constructive social work means more than the picturesque posture of the revolutionary."

The son, for his part, says that his father is talking nonsense, particularly so when in another broadside Sir Oswald suggested that the young man should give his money to the poor instead of seeking publicity. He is right. It is the rankest nonsense to think that any rich socialist, and the tribe is numerous, will make himself the beginning of the distribution of wealth he urges.

The English House of Commons is not well impressed by the proposal to broadcast debates and other proceedings by radio. A request for a refund must be accompanied by a sworn statement.

## IRISHMAN WHO THREW BOMB SENTENCED

London, April 28—Hugh Daly, a young Irishman charged with throwing a "bomb" at Prime Minister Baldwin during the St. Patrick's day banquet in the Hotel Cecil, was sentenced in old Bailey today to a year's imprisonment. He was found guilty of throwing the missile, which witnesses described as a piece of fireworks, "with intent to do grievous bodily harm."

Daly was employed in the kitchen of a hotel in Fleet street. On the same night as the Hotel Cecil "bomb" scare a similar incident occurred at a dinner of the Irish Club, where the Prince of Wales was a guest. In that case, the missile was an acetylene "bomb" made from a pasteboard box containing moistened calcium carbide.

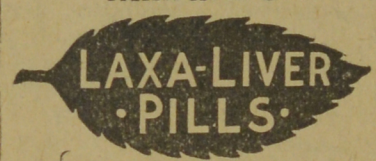

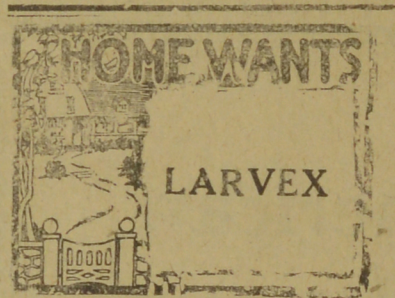
